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

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

Following consultation with residents, youth, youth workers, Police and Councillors in Popley. It is suggested that the new facility for youth be located adjacent to the ball courts on the western side of Popley Fields this was very much the proffered scheme.

The only houses that are remotely located near to the scheme are in Pitcairn Close. These however face side on to the playing field and so would not overlook or be overlooked. There is also a steep bank and tree planting that would also screen these houses which are about 90 meters away from the multiuse courts. The beat Officers Matt Deery and Paul Thorn say that they have not had any problems reported with residents complaining with reference to youths using the courts.

The next stage is to ask the play area consultant to draw up the final scheme which will have a shelter, Tarmac base, seating and litter bins.

WALKING THE WAY TO HEALTH

Following the successful trial of a Health Walk in the Popley area, we are pleased to announce that we will be continuing the Friday morning at 11 walks throughout the summer. Everyone is welcome, the more the merrier! Get some fresh air and enjoy all the open spaces in Popley and the surrounding areas.

A "health walk" is a short local walk, normally about an hour in duration. The aim is to eventually encourage walkers to walk at a pace that will give maximum health benefits. The pace is one that will make the walkers feel a little warmer, breathe a bit deeper and make their hearts beat a little faster. For people who want to increase their exercise levels it is an ideal introduction! Any walking is better than none, and gentle strolling is a great start for people who are not used to exercise, it is also very sociable and a good way to meet people and make new friends. You do not have to commit to come every week, just turn up on the day! The walks are non-competitive, everybody is welcome and you can have a cup of tea or coffee in the community centre afterwards.

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
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A meeting of the Popley Forum was held at St Gabriel's Church Hall on Wednesday 19th May with three topics discussed: the new John Hunt school, the Abbey Road pharmacy application, and Community Wardens.

Louise Hague and Andy Pritchard of Hampshire County Council gave us a presentation on the North Popley development and new school. The new build is split into 3 sites:

North of Popley Way (land owned by Hampshire County Council),

Popley Fields (west of Carpenters Down, owned by David Wilson Homes),

The current John Hunt site (owned by Hampshire County Council). Outline planning permission for all 3 sites was granted by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council in March. The School is the responsibility of Hampshire County Council and will go through their committee. It is hoped to be ready by 2007

The project depends on the existing John Hunt site being developed, along with contributions from Basingstoke. The school itself will cost £25m.

It is very rare for Hampshire to build secondary schools these days. This will be only the second secondary school in 30 years.

Once detailed planning permission is granted for the existing John Hunt site, part of it will be developed to free up funds to start on the new school. About £10m needs to be spent by Hampshire County Council on water mains, drainage, sewerage, power lines, gas, phone lines and roads north of Popley Way. Hampshire need sequential sales of land over the next 6-8 years similar to what happened in Chineham.

David Wilson homes will be moving a bit faster and hope to be on the Popley Fields site in Autumn 2004 with new houses being built in 2005.

Andy Pritchard then gave a presentation with architectural drawings of the new school. Essentially the school will be in one building with three wings, with a satellite building. There will be extensive community facilities such as a multi-use games facility and Astro turf pitches.

Nayna and Dev Vayas talked about the Abbey Road pharmacy application. The Primary Care Trust do not see the need for a second pharmacy in Popley, saying the existing one in Shakespeare Road is under-used. Residents say they are getting an inadequate service. A petition was presented to the chairman.

Finally, the Community Wardens did a brief talk on what they did, with a question and answer session at the end. The Community Wardens started on the 31st December. They are employed by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council with partial funding from Sentinel and Kingfisher Housing Associations. They have been very busy in the community with football projects, visits to schools and youth clubs, plus dealing with crime and anti-social behaviour. They have only been in post a short while but have been very popular with residents and went home with a few extra cases to work on at the end of the meeting!



Councillors Page

There have been masses going on in Popley these past few months. Outline planning permission was granted for the New Popley developments which have been zoned into three sites: John Hunt, Popley Fields (which is to the west of Carpenters Down) and North of Popley Way. It is good to know that some of our residents will be able to get housing there and live near their families.

There will be about 2000 houses built from 2006 onwards, new shops, a new community centre, doctors surgery and other facilities, closures to Chineham Lane and Sherborne Road, and a brand new John Hunt School costing an estimated £21m, due to open in January 2007.

The Popley Festival was brilliant this year. With 10,000 people attending, it was the biggest ever. Everyone I spoke to had a really good time. As a member of the committee it meant a 6am start on the day helping set up the site, and taking things down afterwards, by the time we went home at 6pm I was feeling incredibly tired!

Congratulations to George Potten on winning Best Citizen in the "Basingstoke a Place to be Proud Of" awards. You deserve it George! George won his award for the Millennium Garden project in Dryden/Chaucer Close. He has also been instrumental with other residents in the East Popley Place Check scheme, and as a result we have seen two new gardens go up at Shelley Close and Keats/Milton Close. There will be footpath improvements at Burns Close.

Parking: we are going to introduce yellow lines at key points (Not the whole road) in Abbey Road and Shakespeare Road as a result of the Borough's Parking Strategy. We are also looking at Shetland Road and trying to do something about the dangerous practice of parking on the bend at Carpenters Down.

We are also sending out tenders for the refurbishment of the old Bermuda Close surgery. This will be turned into a community centre and will house the Marnel Explorers pre-school, which will expand from 18 to 24 places.

The play area in Trinidad and Tobago Close is finished and it is great to see it being used, it is next to the Popley Pond where the group of volunteers have made a real difference and it is looking really tidy and welcoming now. *Cllr Andrew McCormick*

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

John Hunt is truly a community school we now have a range of users operating on our site including the Youth Service, Community Wardens, Connexions, local Police and Basingstoke Consortium in addition to other business users and the day nursery. This has opened opportunities for us to develop the citizenship curriculum in a very active way. Recently some of our students were used to help to promote the work of Connexions acting as ambassadors for the school across the county and interviewing potential new Personal Advisors. A different group of young people were actively involved in the launch of the Community Wardens Scheme and this is now being developed further in the school with the Popley Community Wardens, Stephen and Lesley.

Our long term aim is to be a specialist college for Business and Enterprise. Many of you will be aware that we have earned quite a reputation for our involvement with the local business community. We currently have over 35 members of the business and local community mentoring students in the school, to date over the past three years in excess of 400 students have gone through the scheme. We see this scheme as an important part of our overall vision for the school. The presence of adults on a daily basis in the school forms an important part of our student's social development. We are always looking for new businesses and local organisations to help us mentor our students. Our aim is that every single student in the school will have had the experience of being mentored.

An integral part of the school's philosophy is to involve and work with the community. Helping us to achieve our aim is our Parent Group. This group of dedicated parents is going from strength to strength. They are always looking for new members and are still small in number. However, the impact they have had is considerable. In addition to a presence at all our parents evenings they have organised highly successful quiz nights, a pamper evening and run the BBQ at the Popley Festival and the group are working with the Community Manager in developing a range of family learning programmes. Family learning is expanding with courses ranging from magic tricks, aerobics, street dance to boat making in a weekend.

As a community school we are keen to ensure activities are available throughout the year and as a result we have been working to develop a comprehensive programme of activities for our young people to run over the holiday period. Over 135 students attended the scheme last summer which included drama, dance, football and trips. A similar programme will be available this summer.

John Hunt is a fully inclusive open school and we are really looking forward to the opening of our new school. As this becomes a reality we would like to involve not only members of the school community but the local community too. Look out for further news in Popley Matters. Our moto is 'Working together to achieve success for all' and we welcome all visitors to the school. NEWS FROM JOHN HUNT OF EVEREST COMMUNITY SCHOOL

We see John Hunt of Everest as a part of the community and welcome this opportunity to have a regular slot in Popley Matters. This is now my third year as Headteacher of John Hunt of Everest and I have met many of you but you may not be aware of how the school has developed over this period. This is only a snapshot and it is always difficult to single out one event or achievement above another. However part of our vision for the school is to develop the leadership qualities of our students and I am delighted to see our students taking the lead in so many different ways.

Our Young Enterprise team have been incredibly creative over the past year with their programme of events including the Bingo Night for our more senior users of John Hunt. Those of you who attended our 'Pamper Evening' will I am sure agree with me, that this is definitely an event we wish to hold again. In the North Hants Regional finals the team won 3 awards, best stand, best company and best report and accounts. On 12th May in the County finals the team won the Best Innovation Initiative.

Last week Andrew Hunter MP presented Daryl Woodruff and Katherine Brown with the very prestigious National 'Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Award for Young People' for their outstanding contribution to the school and community'. And many of you may have read, in the Basingstoke Gazette, his comment that "these are remarkable achievements and reflect well on the school, both pupils and staff."

We are also delighted to see that another one of our students Gareth Johnson has been elected on the Basingstoke & Deane Supreme Youth Committee this is part of the Borough's drive to listen to young people.

Many of you who access the school will be familiar with the sounds of steel wafting across the campus. John Hunt was established as the North East centre for steel pans in 2001 with the aim to establish a variety of bands including a community band. It has taken a while to get the school pans band established but it is now flourishing with demands from many quarters for them to perform at a variety of gigs, including festivals, local fetes and supporting our local primary schools.

Last month our Steel Pan Band students got up at the crack of dawn to travel to Trowbridge for 'Music for Youth Heats' and then on Sunday to Chandlers Ford to play at the Hampshire Steel Pan Festival. Our students as always were fantastic and excellent ambassadors for the school.

Forthcoming events include performances at the Anvil and Wokingham Festival. The continuing success of the group depends upon the dedication and commitment of staff members and parents.

Three of our Year 11 boys have demonstrated their leadership skills by helping to train Marnell pupils to develop their football skills. The students have been giving up their Wednesday lunchtimes to coach them.

Further links have been developed with our local primary schools through the Family Literacy and Numeracy on Ice Project where we have linked with the Bison Ice Hockey team. Further links have been developed through the new Study Support Centre which is a unique project with Southampton Football Club, local business and Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council. The Study Support Centre has yet to be officially opened but is actually fully operational. Discussions are about to take place about what the Centre should be called—the hot favourite at present is the Matt Le Tissier Study Support Centre.

News from Marnel Junior School

Dear Friends,

I'm writing this the day after my first Popley Festival. It was an excellent day and blessed with really good weather. What struck me about the festival was the very real sense of family and community together enjoying a good day out. It comes as no surprise to me. Having lived in Popley now for three months I'm beginning to appreciate how strong that sense of community identity and family is in our new parish. It is that same sense of family and community that first drew me to St. Gabriel's, where there is a faithful reflection of what makes Popley the grand place it is to live.

In this, the first of what I hope will become a regular feature in Popley matters; I just wanted to expend a few lines introducing myself to the wider community.

I was born and grew up on the outskirts of Manchester before leaving to join the Royal Air Force. After a career of fifteen years serving in places as diverse as Berlin and Cyprus I left the RAF in 1986 to pursue a new career in IT Sales and Marketing working for companies in Basingstoke and Hook as well as serving as Managing Director of a small software company.

I became a Christian later in life than many, in 1988, while living in Portsmouth. I joined our local church and it was not long before I really felt that God was calling me to serve him in a different way, as an ordained minister in the Church of England. So in 1998 we left our home in Portsmouth for Nottingham and two years at theological college – a hard slog after leaving school so long ago. In 2000 I was ordained in Winchester Cathedral and served for three and half years as Curate in Hartley Wintney before coming to Popley as your new Vicar. I dislike labels but many have asked me about my background and I am what is commonly referred to as an evangelical which simply means I believe in God's word in the Bible and that forms the basis of much of what I do, but ultimately we must be careful not to confuse church-ianity and Christianity the essence of which is God's love, open and available to all who would seek Him.

So there you have it! I'm fairly new to being a Vicar but there is wonderful warmth and strength of family at St Gabriel's and I hope over the next months and years to get to know many more of you. Our services take place at 10.30 a.m. on a Sunday morning and 7.15 p.m. on a Wednesday you will always be warmly welcomed at either. Beginning on 30th May we will be introducing a Family Service once a month – please watch out for further details. Interviews for baptism and marriage now takes place in church on a Saturday morning between 9.30 and 11.30 a.m.; no appointment needed.

Popley Festival

The Popley Festival was the biggest ever this year with 10,000 people attending. Being on the Committee it meant an early start (6am!) setting up the site: bringing tables and chairs out, and staking out the car park and car boot areas. The weather could not have been better, which brought out the residents in their droves. The doors opened just before 11am and we had over 3000 people in the first hour.

The car boot was bigger than ever this year with well over 100 booters. We also had nearly 50 stalls, two stages (a main one and a Kestrel FM one), and a beer tent (which ran out of lager, such was the demands placed on it by thousands of thirsty people in the hot sun).

Nobody ever starves at the Popley Festival and we had no less than three barbecues this year provided by John Hunt School, the Air Scouts, and Popley Action Churches Together. The queues for each were invariably huge and the people running them did well all day, in the heat it must have been incredibly hard work and thankfully they didn't run out of food or cold drinks. The ice cream vans must have done very well.

For the first time we had the Community Wardens provide a stall which went down well with the youngsters as they were providing mocktails (non-alcoholic cocktails) at 50p a pop. The Police also had their customary display with a couple of vehicles and we had a couple of fire engines as well.

The main stage had a packed entertainment program, with the John Hunt Steel Pans Band, Chineham Park Choir, Moses Kitchen Folk Band, Vandeville, Gospel Rap and a Gospel Choir.

On the sports front we had the Sentinel Challenge 6-a-side football competition, kick-boxing and judo.

Youth organisations were well represented with the Scouts, Boys Brigade and Adventure Rangers all in attendance. Connexions, the youth advisory service, also had a stall in the playground.

By the time the festival was over, most of us early starters were pretty much dead on our feet, but we still had to clear away the tables, the rubbish, and the car park ropes and stakes. By 6pm it

was all packed away, and we could all go home and get ready for work the next morning. The festival takes a huge amount of organising with things being planned months in advance, but it is worth every effort, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank Suki, Shola and Lesley for the organisation, The Police for the security, Ben at Sentinel for the web site and programs, and all the other staff and volunteers for all the hard work they put in over the past few months to make this year's festival the outstanding success it was.
