

Terry's Memoirs Chapter Part 1

I should have been called "Trouble". It has followed me throughout my life, and has redoubled in my time of retirement, "Sod's Law" they call it!

I had just left school, and employed in the Brompton Road, Kensington, branch of W.H. Smith.

Three weeks later, (in to my term as a boy I was considered a safe pair of hands), and left to manage the shop whilst the manager went out on business call, Enter a fully opened copy of The Times on legs that faced me across the counter. Little did either of us know what we both had in store for each other, with an uncle and aunt managing the Fred Ponting, Bracklesham Bay Camp. I got closely involved in the board's desire to sink bore holes in the adjoining field. For a prospective nuclear power station. I made myself a bit of a nuisance trying to, covertly, gather intelligence and pass it down to Pontins, this got myself something of a reputation.

My company Christmas festivities arrived and my colleagues, the boss ex - army, plus an ex-Chief Petty Officer, an ex-commando, Bill Foxley, an ex - RAF Wellington navigator, a member of the famous Guinea Pig club. In the canteen they insisted I drank ""a man's drink", and brought me a double whisky each. My first introduction to alcohol to cries of "Down the hatch", it brought the room spinning round, and amid laughter and cheers, I somehow, found the door, making a swift, but ungainly exit, only to find myself facing the oncoming company Chairman Sir Christopher Hinton. He advanced on me looking at his watch and setting the scene was this set for a series of incidents involving both him and me, the highest, and the lowest with home trouble brewing, But that's another story.

Popley Safer Neighbourhood Panel Fact Sheet



What is the PSNP?

The PSNP or Popley Safer Neighbourhood Panel was set up in 2007 by PC Dan Carter of the Popley Safer Neighbourhood Patrolling Team. The Panel was part of a government driven initiative to allow communities to have a say in how the multi agencies dealt with issues such as anti social behaviour and crime in their area. Most beats in Basingstoke now have panels with various given names but all do the same job (work towards a safer neighbourhood)

Who is in the PSNP?

The PSNP is made up of several agencies such as Police, PCSO's, CSPO's, Sentinel Housing, Basingstoke and Dean Council, HFRS. Our panel also has teachers, a vicar, two councillors, and other key community leaders. Most importantly the panel has local residents. (more needed)

What do the PSNP do?

The PSNP meet quarterly at the Popley Fields Community Centre to discuss current issues and to vote for three core priorities for the Panel to tackle. Each member of the Panel is able to bring issues to the table that they have heard of from the community. One of the ways in which the Police find out local concerns is by holding street surgeries in different locations in Popley. So by the time of the PSNP meeting there is always a list of concerns to vote for. So what happens to the issues that are not voted as Core priorities? The patrolling officers from the Panel such as Police, PCSO's and CSPO's are constantly monitoring Popley and are flexible in the approach to tackling the issues. The three core priorities however are the ones that will be evidenced and resulted to the community. this could be via the Popley Matters news paper or Twitter or the Hampshire Police Website.

Can I join the PSNP?

If you live in Popley or have a vested interest in the community of Popley and you are concerned with the welfare and safety of the residents then the answer is yes! You must also be 18 or over.

How do I apply to join the PSNP?

Anyone wishing to join the PSNP will need to complete an application form. The application form can be emailed to you but if you do not have access to a computer it can be delivered via post and hand written. The application is very simple and mainly asks why you would like to join the PSNP. A good reason could be that you would like to help the residents feel safe in their homes and to give back to Popley. A bad application may include...I don't like my neighbours and I want to get them in trouble etc.



Child Trust Fund

The UK government has announced that it's going to reduce and then stop all its payments to the Child Trust Fund.

The Child Trust Fund is a savings and investment account for children. If you have a child, you're issued with a voucher which you can use to open the account. The UK government makes an initial payment into the account when your child is born and a further payment when your child turns seven.

Child Trust Fund vouchers are currently worth £250 for better off families and £500 for families who are getting Child Tax Credit whose income is less than £16,190.

From 1 August, Child Trust Fund payments will be reduced:

- from £250 to £50 for better off families, and
- from £500 to £100 for low-income families.

Payments for children when they turn seven will also be stopped from 1 August.

From January 2011, all Child Trust Fund payments from the government will be stopped.

POPLEY schoolchildren went hammer and tongs to start work forging a new sculpture for the £40m Popley Islands regeneration project.

Sentinel Housing Association's commissioned artists – Anwick Forge – set up a mobile forge on Tuesday 13 and Wednesday 14 July at Marnel Junior School so pupils could fashion the steel for an 'optical puzzle' art feature called 'Parallax'.

The sculpture is based on the quotation "No man is an island...", and forms part of a council-backed initiative to brighten up Popley – an area that's seen major investment in recent years.

Sentinel's Executive Director Val Bagnall said: "There's a big effort going into improving Popley, and while it's great we're a major part, we're very pleased to see local children rolling their sleeves up to help us revive community pride in the area."

The £40m regeneration of the area around the Maldive Road shops is the latest in a decade-long investment programme for Popley by Sentinel and follows on from the £15m regeneration of Longfellow Parade (off Shakespeare Road), plus around £3m spent on new windows, kitchens, bathrooms and boilers in Popley in the last year.

Community artist Anwick Forge said: "This is a fantastic opportunity for local children to see how 'big art' is made as well as having the chance to learn new skills and see a traditional craft like blacksmithing in action- something very few people get to experience these days".

Simon Taylor, Education Manager from local arts education charity The Making, is managing the project on Sentinel's behalf and added: "We are ensuring that local residents are part of the whole design process, from helping to shortlist and interview the artists, to meeting them, hearing about their ideas and making their own contribution towards the finished product. Plus we hope the children will have a really memorable day and enjoy getting to grips with all the unusual tools and the exciting way Anwick Forge work with bits of metal!"

Meanwhile, the demolition of the outdated 1960s maisonettes is now complete, and everything is on track for the first new residents to move in next January.

The sculpture will be installed next April, with an official unveiling and community event planned for May 2011.

Camping & Caravanning

When caravanning, or camping make sure you take appropriate fire safety precautions when you arrive:

- Find out what the fire-fighting arrangements on the campsite are and where the nearest telephone is.
- Keep a torch handy for emergencies. Do not use a lit candle.
- Fit a smoke detector in your caravan.
- Keep caravans and tents at least 6 metres apart.
- Do not use a naked flame in or near your tent.

Gas Cylinders

- Change cylinders in open air.
- Make sure the appliance controls and cylinder valve are turned off before you change the cylinder.
- If you think there might be a gas leak in the cylinder connection or pipes - extinguish all naked flames, brush soapy water over all the joints and then look for bubbles. Tighten (but do not over tighten) leaky joints.
- Always ensure LPG regulator is compatible with your appliances.
- Unless designed to be left on, ensure all appliances are turned off when not in use.



Neighbourhood Watch

A local neighbourhood watch is a group of like-minded neighbours getting together to help reduce crime and make their community safer.

The aims of Neighbourhood Watch are:

- To prevent crime by improving security, increasing vigilance and maintaining a caring community.
- To assist the police in detecting crime by encouraging prompt reporting of criminal or suspicious activity.
- To reduce undue fear of crime by providing accurate information about risks and by promoting a sense of security and community spirit.
- To improve communication between police and the community. How Neighbourhood Watch works
- Schemes are run by their members and led by a resident volunteer co-ordinator, whose job it is to get people working together and make sure things get done.
- The co-ordinator liaises with the police and acts as a voice for the community. Some schemes also have a committee that meets regularly to plan which problems to target and what actions to take.
- Schemes are supported by the police, the local authority and their local Neighbourhood Watch associations.
- Neighbourhood Watch schemes vary in size they can be large, covering most of the houses on an estate, or they may involve just a few houses. How to join or set up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme.



Phillips' Legal Corner



Question: We're thinking of buying a new house. What should we know?

Answer: Alex Preshaw, head of residential property at Phillips solicitors, replies: The property market has always been one of Britain's national obsessions and it's proving very difficult to predict what will happen to prices. But if you are thinking of buying a house - one of the biggest financial decisions you may ever make - then here are some tips to help you become better informed.

You don't have to offer the asking price – you can always make an offer below the asking price and then negotiate, right up to when contracts are exchanged.

Once you have exchanged contracts, theoretically there's no going back. But if for some reason you back out as the buyer, then you would lose your deposit which may be up to 10% of the purchase price. Further, if the seller has incurred other expenses as a result of your breach of contract then you may be liable for those as well. Conversely if the seller backs out then you, the buyer, have various options including suing for breach of contract, forcing the seller to comply with his obligations under the terms of the contract. But, beware, this is fraught with difficulties and should be a last resort.

As a rule you can't move into your new house until the sale has been completed – but you can have access by arrangement to measure up or view the property again.

If you are buying in joint names, consider whether you need to own the property as Joint Tenants or Tenants in Common

A joint tenancy is where the property is owned by all joint owners but with none of them having a separate and distinct share. If one owner dies, their share automatically passes to the survivor(s), despite the terms of the deceased's will. The alternative is to hold the property as 'tenants in common' where each owner has a separate and distinct share, for example 50/50 or 75/25. So if one owner dies, his/her share will pass to whoever it has been left to in the deceased person's Will, or if there's no will, to the next of kin under the intestacy rules. It can be complicated, so do take advice from your solicitor.

You don't have to take out buildings and contents insurance with your lender – get proper independent advice on insurance and shop around for the most competitive deals.

Consider what would happen if you lost your job, couldn't pay the mortgage or if your partner/spouse died - ask an Independent Financial Adviser (IFA) how you can protect your mortgage payments if the worst should happen.

Finally, concludes Alex, don't forget to make a will or update the one you have. You'll want to be sure your assets go to your loved ones, but it's also sensible to have your will properly drafted by your solicitor so that it can be tax efficient and avoid the inheritance tax trap.



DIARIES FROM THE OLD CODGER

When I was out the other week, a very pleasant woman stopped me. "Good morning" she said, "I know who you are". I said "I am sorry but I must have forgotten your name". "Oh no" she said "we have never met before it's just that I know you as the Old Codger". She, like a lot of people, looked back on what they did as youngsters and compared it with today. We had a long chat. Mind you, I still do not know who she was, but we shared a few good



laughs on the things we did as kids. Another time a woman stopped me when we went to Popley Festival just so she could take a picture of my number plate on my scooter. Well it was the back of me so I take it the photo must have been all right.

I just want to say a few words about a man I knew at the hospital that retired just a few months ago. His name was Mr Ward. In my eyes one of the kindest people you could have ever met. Yes he could be abrupt and looked aloof, but he was old school and a gentleman with a great sense of dry humour. I for one wish him well.

I would like you all to help, if you can, before next spring to put up nesting boxes in your gardens. There are some very good ones you can buy, but also if you or a relative are handy workers you could make one. There are plenty of guidelines on how to construct them. Remember do not just make them for the tit family sparrows also need them. Declining numbers mean in a few years our grandchildren will only see some of our garden birds in books. The practice of mist netting birds on the continent is still going on killing thousands of our birds that migrate, and the powers that be in Europe are hopelessly unable to stop this practice. Do not forget robins like nest boxes, or an old flowerpot under a bush, also the wren and tree creepers the website for the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds show you how to help. If you have a good hedge in your garden, great, keep it as thick as you can so cats can't get at the nests. I put two inch chicken wire about a foot away from the bird box. If it is close to the ground it stops the cats getting at the birds. This year in my garden a cat has taken two doves that came in to feed and drink. We can't stop them, just deter them the best we can. Remember to keep bird baths clean or they get contaminated. The drinking water must be clean.

September sees all the kids go back to school, except our beloved Chineham Park School. To all, do the best you can, learning can be fun and enjoyable. To all the young men and women that left school to go on to college, I hope that you achieve your ambitions in life.

Now, just an idea I had the other day, and that is why do our council not promote the history our town? 

Dear Editor, On 30th June, the 2nd meeting was held at the council offices with regard to the Traveller problems in the Basingstoke area. Because of all the complaints to Basingstoke Council, the police and local councillors over the past years, the council were expecting a very large turnout of residents at this hearing. A room adjacent to the council chamber was set up with screens and audio to accommodate this. However, when my husband and I arrived there were only a handful of residents, not even sufficient to fill the one committee room. After all the hype from residents! Although we can appreciate it, because of various circumstances not everyone can attend, we found this very disappointing as a larger volume of people would have stressed the point more strongly. As a resume, these are our 'taxpayer/resident' thoughts on the meeting. It was informative and interesting as, apart from myself and another resident, speakers came from former Travellers (who basically said that small sites should be provided by local councils - funded from our rates?? - and run by themselves). Other speakers were: Wiltshire Council, the Police and Hampshire County Council Traveller Liaison Officers. Unfortunately, we feel that ordinary taxpaying residents who listened to the Wiltshire officers explaining how they have spent thousands of pounds setting up a permanent and transit camp, including CCTV because of all the problems, then admitting that they still have a large expensive problem with the illegal sites, would have wondered why our council would even now bother trying to set up one in this area. It obviously does not cure the problem, but continues to be a drain on finances. Although during Question Time Jane Frankum asked specifically

about conformation that there would be no proposed site in this area, we felt the answer was still non-committal. The petition signed by a vast number of Popley residents was handed in at this time, so hopefully this will show how strong we feel with regard to a possible camp being set up in this vicinity. The next meeting is scheduled for September when, after their debates, the council will give their findings, so please watch out for the next, and hopefully, final installment in this saga in your 'Popley Matters' magazine. Councillors Page: Work has started on the much needed road and path improvements after long battles by your local Councillor team. There will be some disruption but access should be available. Popley West: The new street lighting has been welcomed by most residents but we have been dealing with some complaints as to where some of the lamps were to be sited. It seems that there are two separate contracts one for by the paths and another doing the roadside lamps. On the whole we have managed to come to some agreement with the majority of complaints to the contractors. There is always going to be conflict when the positioning of the lamps was done via maps on a computer, rather than the previous method of on-site surveying!

We have had complaints about litter, but mainly about discarded cigarette ends. There seem to be areas near shops or entrances to flats in particular that people just throw them on the ground. It is an offence to throw litter of any sort, all it does is annoy residents and give the street cleaners extra work. It takes many years for the filters to biodegrade. Throwing lit cigarette ends from windows, be they from a building or car, and can and often are dangerous.

We have also received complaints about inconsiderate and illegal parking especially across dropped kerbs, preventing disabled wheelchair users and buggies from being able to get around. Pushchairs can be bumped down and accessed by going around in the possible dangerous traffic, but electric buggies can not. Also parking on T junctions and preventing drivers and pedestrians alike from seeing it's safe to cross. If it causes an accident I wonder if the irresponsible person can be prosecuted or sued? Popley East: On August 10th we had a meeting in Civic Offices about the Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA). This is looking at identifying pieces of land to be used for future building.

The Council wanted to cram 8 flats onto the small bit of land by Tobago Close, Carpenters Down and Popley Way. This was a very bad idea, as there is hardly any room there to build anything, and the green space is used by children who are surrounded on 3 sides by busy roads.

We argued the site was unsuitable for building because of lack of space and road safety issues, and thankfully, the Council has now listened and rejected the site.

Carpenters Down is due to be widened at the junction with Popley Way, which is being turned into a crossroads. The new road will link Popley Way with Shakespeare Road. The new build on the John Hunt side will be served by this road.

Work will be starting on a series of roadside works over the next 12 months, with new cycleways and crossing points being installed in Popley Way and Carpenters Down. The bus stop near the roundabout at Carpenters Down will be moved from its current awkward position virtually right on the roundabout, to a bit further away, thereby allowing cars to pass the bus more safely.

We are expecting a revised planning application for the shops area of the Faroe and Maldive regeneration to be submitted in September. We need to check with Sentinel what exactly is contained in the plans, especially the shops layout.

Longfellow Regeneration will be finished next month, after nearly 3 years. We are looking at any outstanding issues to finish by then – if there is anything you want looking at, please let us know. We have already raised the issues of drainage in Shelley Close and Dryden Close
