The CSPOs are provided by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and Hampshire County Council. Our role in Popley is to work closely with the community and partner agencies, such as the police and housing associations.

We identify and tackle local issues, reducing crime, deterring anti-social behaviour and dealing with environmental crimes, to make residents feel safer and happier about their neighbourhood..

We work closely with the police with daily combined briefing meetings and shared information through innovative use of technology. As patrolling officers we can use enforcement powers to tackle offences such as graffiti, littering, dog fouling or confiscating alcohol from underage drinkers.

Bin Collections over the Festive Period

Rubbish and recycling collection crews will be taking Boxing Day (Monday 26 December) off but will work the next Saturday (31 December) to catch up, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council has announced.

If your normal collection day would be: put your grey bin (and green bin if your recycling week)

Monday 26 December
Tuesday 27 December
Wednesday 28 December
Thursday 29 December
Friday 30 December

Out instead on:
Tuesday 27 December
Wednesday 28 December
Thursday 29 December
Friday 30 December
Saturday 31 December

Christmas can mean extra rubbish, for example wrapping paper that can't be recycled, Therefore, in the first collection after Christmas ONLY extra sacks will be collected. Unless adverse weather affects bin rounds, collections should return to normal from Monday 2 January 2012.

Councillors Page: There is a meeting with the Portfolio Holder responsible for the allocation of approved sites, the Head of Planning, Councillors, and residents that spoke against the planning application to start to build on the fields next to Jersey and Guernsey Close and directly behind Marnel Park, known as Kiln Farm. All those protesting against the 450 more dwellings agree that David Wilson Homes should listen to the residents and the recommendation of the Planning Inspector. At the last Local Development Framework, He recommended that Popley and Sherborne St John should have time to settle as a community. The committee that the residents came and spoke to said that "the planning application should be put back to the end of the Local Planning Framework. In 10 to 15 years time". The building has not finished in the old John Hunt site nor on Popley Islands. If you also add in the plot of land owned by the Fire Authority and 784 due to start next year in Merton Rise it is obvious to all except David Wilson Homes and developers, that ENOUGH is ENOUGH. I suppose there's little hope of them considering the residents before their profit? The planning application called The Spinney in Popley West was rejected as there was no provision for social housing and little chance of people getting on to the first rung of owning their own home. There is also a meeting with David Wilson Homes at the very end of November we will report back to you on this and the December meeting in January.

We continue to fight for the reinstatement of the "Hospital Loop" and I had a meeting with Cllr Mel Kendal and the officer who is the "Head of Transport". They have promised to go back to Stagecoach and ask them to look at re instating the service. Both Hampshire County Council and Stagecoach are adamant that the bus service is hardly used. So please write, email or phone and let them know that you do use it and it is a valued service, especially in the winter.

Popley East: David Wilson Homes are now meeting with the council Planning Officers about submitting their planning application to the council for another 450 homes on the Kiln Farm site, known as BAS104. Along with many local residents, I am opposed to these plans. I am not against development but Popley has had more than its fair share in recent years and it is time to say enough is enough. We really need as many residents as possible to send objection letters to Giorgio Frammalicco, Head of Planning, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, Civic Offices, London Road, Basingstoke, Hampshire, RG21 4AH. Myself and the other Popley Councillors will be looking at what steps we will take next and we will keep you updated with the timetable for making a decision.

On a more positive note, did you know that it's Keep Britain Tidy month? As part of this a national Love Where You Live campaign is being run that aims to inspire, encourage and enable us to make where we live, work and play the kind of place we really want it to be. It's about making a difference ourselves, whether as individuals, groups, local authorities or companies. Complaints about litter and untidy areas feature frequently in my mailbag as a local Councillor, and although our Streetcare team at the Council do a fantastic job of keeping our area looking good I thought it might be nice to lend them a hand. Therefore, I have organised a community litter pick in Popley- 'The Big Popley Pick'- on Saturday 26th November from 12pm – 2pm. Anyone who wishes to take part should meet at 12pm outside Marnel Junior School. It would be helpful if you could contact me first on 07834818489 to let me know you are coming.

Finally, last weekend I went to see the fantastic production of Romeo and Juliet by local young people at the Spotlight Centre. A big well done to all those who helped to organise it and took part, you were great!

Café Dome is the name of the community café managed by The Café Project. It is located behind Gillies Health Centre next to the Driving Test Centre at Brighton Hill.

The Café Project is a charity trust with the primary aim of supporting learning disabled people with training and employment in Basingstoke and the surrounding area.

We maintain our funding through individual, public, and corporate grants and donations; however we heavily rely on volunteers to support the training of our students in food preparation, cooking, cleaning, customer service, and online trading.

Your custom is much appreciated and helps to support the ongoing work that we do. It will help to maintain the longevity of this facility for learning disabled people in the area. A huge thank you to all our customers who come along for meals, snacks and drinks and make Café Dome a community charity on a mission to support some of the more vulnerable people in our town.

As customer demand grows along with our student and volunteer capacity, we expect to extend or change our opening hours and even include a Saturday opening, along with some seasonal events.

Something of interest to our local residents is the fact that we now have a very smart venue facility that is available to hire at evenings and weekends from only £10ph on a Sunday.

Critical to the success of our charity is supporting our students in the activities of the café and we continue to need the help of volunteers who can commit a minimum of 3 regular hours a week to buddy up with one of our students or help out at peak periods such as lunchtimes.

The trustees continue to need help with things such as designing marketing materials, delivering café flyers, help with getting our online trading initiative up and running, and other fundraising activities.

I have been asked about the speed limit changes both as a councillor and as the Editor of Popley Matters so I asked officers, and checked the Highway Code myself. The officers answer was “The Traffic Signs Manual from the Department for Transport clearly states you shouldn't use speed limit reminder signs in a 30mph zone with street lights (for example the whole Popley area) as "it would be impracticable to place 30mph repeater signs on every road. To do so in some cases, but not others, would result in inconsistency and driver uncertainty. This is therefore prohibited.”

So unfortunately, we cannot put speed limit reminders in a 30mph zone with street lights, as doing so would invalidate that speed limit and make it unenforceable by the police. It would also create uncertainty for drivers, as on some roads they were being reminded, but on others there was nothing. The street lights themselves are the effective 30mph signs, unless there is another sign telling people otherwise”.

Please see below details below for extract from The Highway Code.

It is 30mph down Popley Way and Carpenters Down and there are signs at all entrances. Popley Way and Carpenters Down was the last residential road to get formal 30mph. However I have asked for some gateway features as you come into Popley Way so that more noticeable 30mph signs can be erected on them.

Highway code section on speed limits

Speed limits and speeding

There are different speed limits for cars, vans and towing vehicles on different types of roads. Make sure you know the legal speed limits for your vehicle, the penalties for speeding and when to slow down to suit the road conditions.

National speed limits for different vehicles and types of road

You must not drive faster than the speed limit for the road and your type of vehicle.

A limit of 30 miles per hour (mph) or 48 kilometres per hour (km/h) usually applies to all traffic on all roads with street lighting. This applies unless you see signs showing otherwise.

Celebrate Safely

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service urges everyone to celebrate safely this Christmas

People often get distracted by the hustle and bustle of Christmas and are unaware of the potential fire hazards and toxic threats that can lurk in fairy lights, candles and flammable decorations.

Latest figures from the government fire safety campaigns show a rise in the number of accidental fire deaths and injuries over the festive period. In recent years there were 33,000 accidental house fires, 10% of which occurred in the run up to Christmas Day.

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service wants everyone to have a happy and safe Christmas this year and is urging the public to take fire safety seriously - plan escape routes, install smoke alarms, and test them weekly.

Assistant Chief Officer Bob Rattcliffe, Head of Community Safety at Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service, says:

“The risk of fire in the home is an all year round issue - however people are particularly vulnerable at Christmas for many reasons ranging from unsafe electrical decorations, unattended candles, through to cooking whilst drunk.

“People also vastly underestimate the deadly strength of toxic smoke and overestimate how long they have to escape should a fire break out. The reality is that just two to three breaths of smoke in a fire can render a person unconscious. Christmas should be a time for celebration rather than tragedy and for this reason we’re urging people to be fire aware and stay fire safe.”

Here are Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service’s top tips to stay safe from fire this Christmas:

- Ensure you have a working smoke alarm installed on all levels of your home. Test your smoke alarms weekly and never remove batteries to power presents!
- Never leave cooking unattended and avoid cooking whilst drunk. The majority of fires start in the kitchen so this is a high risk area. Always turn off kitchen appliances when you have finished cooking.
- Never leave candles unattended. Keep decorations, cards and wrapping paper away from candles, fires, lights and heaters.
- Ensure you switch off fairy lights and unplug them before you go to bed, or leave the house. Check your Christmas tree lights conform to the British Standard (BS EN 60598).
- Always use an RCD (residual current device) on outdoor electrical equipment (a safety device that can save lives by instantly switching off the power if there is a fault).
- Don’t overload sockets - ensure only one plug per socket. Always turn off plugs when they are not in use, except those that are designed to be left on, like freezers.
- Make sure cigarettes are extinguished properly and never smoke in bed. Put it out, right out.
- Check on older relatives and neighbours this Christmas, as they are at greater risk from fire.
- Ask the experts - Fire safety in the home is the primary concern of Hampshire Fire and Rescue’s Community Safety department. Visit our website at www.hantsfire.gov.uk for information on how to protect yourself and your home from fire.
- And finally, in the event of fire: get out, stay out and call 999.

When to Use 999 and 101 Numbers

When you should use 999 instead

You should call 999 if:

- violence is being used or threatened
- there is danger to life
- a crime is in progress or offenders carrying out a crime have recently been disturbed
- there has been a road accident where people are injured, or there has been an accident that has affected traffic

If you call 101 but you are reporting an emergency, you will be directed to the 999 service.

What you can report using 101

The 101 phone line can help you with advice and information on community safety and anti-social behaviour issues. The service is different depending on where you live.

In Wales, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, call 101 if you need to:

- report a non-emergency crime
- report anti-social behaviour
- report drunken or rowdy behaviour
- report dangerous driving
- speak to the police about a general enquiry

Tips and Advice on Clearing Snow and Ice

- Start early - it's much easier to clear fresh, loose snow compared to compacted ice that has been compressed by people walking on it.
- Don't use hot water - this will melt the snow, but may replace it with black ice, increasing the risk of injury.
- Be a good neighbour - some people may be unable to clear snow and ice on paths from their property.
- If shovelling snow, think where you are going to put it so that it doesn't block people's paths or drainage channels.
- Make a pathway down the middle of the area to be cleared first, so you have a clear surface to walk on.
- 'Spreading some salt on the area you have cleared will help stop ice forming'
- Table salt or dishwasher salt will work, but avoid spreading on plants or grass as they may be damaged by it.
- Pay particular care and attention to steps and steep gradients.
- Use the sun to your advantage - removing the top layer of snow will allow the sun to melt any ice beneath; however you will need to cover any ice with salt to stop it refreezing overnight.
- If there's no salt available, sand or ash are good alternatives.

DO NOT USE CAT LITTER The clay granules in cat litter soften when they absorb moisture and turn into a watery sludge. Although this sludge may freeze at a slightly lower temperature, the clay content acts as a lubricant with the ice, making the ground more slippery and longer to thaw. It also walks into your house and stains and rots your carpets.

We as a family have gone through a tough few weeks and, as OC often writes about, it is our family that have helped us both through this difficult time. Either directly or indirectly but it is those strong family ties which always come to the fore in times of need.



Our next hurdle is to get the OC back to strength again. He has lost a stone in weight, much needed I might add, and is wobbly on his pins. The physio and Occupational Therapists are working hard with us to achieve this. We are hoping that the wheelchair assessment will happen very soon as he needs to get a much better-suited chair. Over the last 16 years we have adapted our home to suit OC’s need so the additional aids will not be major but should help to make life a little easier for him and those that have to care for him.

Week four and still in hospital and although he was improving, his seizures have started again. The “good” news is that his brain scan does not show any cause for concern and there is no evidence of a bleed. The bad news is they cannot get the seizures fully controlled. His medication is being reviewed and OC still has the fighting spirit and humour we all know and love

Phillips' Legal Corner

Do I need a lawyer?



Not always is the answer - having said that, if you have a problem that involves the law then it really is best to speak to a solicitor. There are many ways to resolve legal problems and most of those thankfully don't involve going to court.

The benefit to you of seeing a solicitor early is that they will be able to advise you on your options, what the consequences of inaction are, and of any deadlines that you must meet. You won't be under any obligation to use their help further, following your initial meeting, but at least you'll know where you stand.

Many people feel that the prospect of consulting a lawyer is daunting - the legal system is confusing, complex and changing. So before you take the plunge, take a close look at your problem and work out which area of law you think you need. This may be obvious in the case of a divorce, a property transaction, a Will or a business matter (you will need a family lawyer, a property lawyer, a Wills and Probate lawyer or a commercial lawyer).


If you're not sure you could take advantage of advice centres such as Citizens Advice which will help you free of charge. These services will often advise you to consult a lawyer, but they can be a useful starting point to steer you in the right direction. Don't forget you may have rights and duties that you are unaware of, and a solicitor may be able to help you with these.

Always bear in mind that it can be more expensive not to instruct a lawyer than to instruct one and have the correct advice. For example, buying a DIY 'will writing kit' could seem a cheap option but may not be suitable for you if you have remarried or have complicated financial circumstances and might leave your family in a mess.

Remember that solicitors are strictly regulated by the Solicitors Regulation Authority, and have a professional duty to advise you of your options, including likely costs and the risks involved with any course of action. After that the decision on what to do is yours.



Avoid being caught up in a loan scam

The Office of Fair Trading (OFT) is warning people to watch out for companies offering to lend you money who ask for fees in advance. This often turns out to be a scam. You pay the fees and you never get the loan.

Look out especially for companies which call you out of the blue, don't ask about your credit history and ask you to send them upfront fees by money transfer.

The OFT has the following tips to help you stay out of trouble:

- **never send money up-front** before you get the loan
- **never send upfront fees to a loan company by money transfer**
don't get taken in by adverts offering a **guaranteed loan**
- **check out the loan company's details** – ask for their landline number and full address to be sent to you in writing
- **check that the loan company has a licence to give loans.** This is known as a **credit licence** – you can look it up on the government's Consumer Credit Register at: www.offt.gov.uk/ConsumerCreditRegister. Don't go with a company which doesn't have a licence
- **don't give out your credit card details** 'for security reasons' as they might use this to take money from your account without you knowing.

If you've been approached about or tricked by a loan scam, you should report it to Consumer Direct on 08454 040506.

No man is an island

Residents of Sentinel Housing Associations new Popley Islands development looked on as an “optical puzzle” art feature called Parallax was erected in pride of place in November.

Local people were part of the whole design process, from helping to shortlist and interview the artists, to meeting them, hearing about their ideas and making the final decision about awarding the commission.

Last year as part of this project, Popley schoolchildren got a chance to have a go at the traditional art of blacksmithing. Sentinel Housing Association’s commissioned artists – Anwick Forge – set up a mobile forge at Marnel Junior school where pupils got some hands on experience working with metal.

The sculpture, forged in steel, is based on the quotation “No man is an island...”, and now forms part of the newly created area of open space in the centre of the new development. We hope this sculpture will be a focal point for the community for many years to come.

The £40m regeneration of the area began in January 2010 with the first keys handed over to new residents just a year later. The new community is expected to be fully established by March 2012.

Sherborne St John Parish Council

At the October Meeting PCSO (Police Community Support Officer) Ben Howard, who will be working the Tadley Beat, reported that, following break-ins, a new burglar alarm has been fitted at the Dancers Meadow's garages. He also advised there had been a theft of building material from a house in Spring Close. A discussion regarding Speedwatch, a facility to enable communities to monitor traffic and report speeding motorists to the police, concluded that as local volunteers are required it may be difficult to set up in the village.

Following the letter from BDBC to all parish residents regarding the future make up of the parish wards and boundaries, two **BDBC Governance Review** roadshows were arranged at Everest Community Academy and The Chute Pavilion. Apart from Paula Chatterton of BDBC and two parish councillors, there were no attendees at the ECA meeting. Approximately a dozen residents and some councillors attended the Chute presentation. Ms Chatterton advised that following evidence received she will be recommending to BDBC that the parish of Sherborne St John be split from Popley Fields ward. Residents of Popley Fields will now receive a further letter summarising their options; to form a parish, or to become part of Basingstoke town.

Despite numerous written representations by parish residents and speeches by our councillors at BDBC offices, development approval has been granted for BAS104, the **land north of Marnel Park**. To avoid a future 'Governance' problem the PC is requesting that the BAS104 land is transferred from SSJ Ward to the Popley Fields ward.


In view of the considerable pressure for more **development south of the village**, Cllr Golding (BDBC) has offered to meet with both Cllr Leek and Julian Crawley with regard to the release of development sites in and around Sherborne St. John. Cllr Leek reported that David Wilson Homes have registered a scoping request for the land on the old Park Prewett golf course and additionally he advised that HCC has a potential buyer for the Merton Rise site.

The tenders for the installation of **solar panels on the Chute Pavilion** were discussed and it was agreed that Cllr Abrahams would chair a small sub-committee to review the specification and confirm the preferred bidder. At the time of writing the project is on hold awaiting an imminent government announcement which may effect the rate of feed-in tariffs and the financial viability of the project.

The PC has received an independent report on the poor state of the **Chute tennis courts**. The Council agreed to support the proposal to complete long-term remedial repairs to the courts and make available a sum of £6,000 from current and future reserves, which together with SSJ Tennis Club funds and receipt of grant funding would allow the project to proceed.

And finally, I am sad to report that after seven years Clover Morgan is to stand down as our **Parish Clerk**. On behalf of the Council I should like to thank Clover for her helpfulness and dedication during this time. We have all enjoyed working with her.
