Taking Steps to Good Health with Health Walks

Walking is good for you and what's more it's free – that's the message to residents in Basingstoke and Deane looking to get active in 2013.

Through the Walking for Health initiative, a partnership between the Ramblers Association and Macmillan Cancer Care, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council supports a series of walks throughout the borough.

The walks offer routes and speeds for all levels of fitness. They are led by a trained walk leader and have a back marker to ensure no-one gets left behind.

Those walks currently available in and around the borough include routes from Eastrop Park, Basing Wood, the Gill Nethercott Centre in Whitchurch, The Square in Kingsclere, Church Street in Hurstbourne Tarrant, Basingstoke Aquadrome, The Walled Garden in Down Grange, Shakespeare Medical Centre in Popley, Tadley Library and Oakley.

Cabinet Member for Partnerships Cllr Cathy Osselton said: "Getting people to become more active doesn't mean they have to run a marathon or join a gym. There are plenty of enjoyable ways to exercise and health walks is one of them.

"Our aim is to support the work of the health service by providing activities that enable people of all ages to improve their fitness and wellbeing, both exercising and socialising at the same time."

Super-Fast Broadband

At least 90% of all Hampshire premises will have access to super-fast broadband by the end of 2015, following the signing of a £13.8 million contract with BT. The first communities to benefit from this project are expected to have access to the high-speed technology by the end of this year, with the programme due to be completed by the end of 2015. Hampshire County Council together with district and borough partners has invested £5 million in the project and were awarded the same figure from BDUK. BT is contributing an additional £3.8 million towards the cost of installing the new fibre infrastructure bringing the total investment in the project to just over £13.8 million. We have been working with officers to get our area on a priority and so signing up with the campaign is still vital

As many people as possible need to continue to sign up to the campaign for faster broadband so that we can demonstrate that there are plenty of potential customers who want to make use of this service. Over 19,000 have already signed up and evidence of high demand will help the programme funding go further, increasing the number of locations we are able to reach with the limited funding available. News from Your Local Councillors

Your Local Councillors have secured S106 funding for improvements to the Dryden Close Play Area and the Dell at Chaucer Close / Shakespeare Road. Both areas are long overdue for regeneration and substantial changes are planned for the Dryden Close area which will make it safer and more user friendly for young people and residents. It is intended to improve the gradients of the area so that parents will feel more confident of the site lines whilst maintaining privacy for surrounding residents. The proposed improvements will be the subject of consultation with local residents and community groups and provisional arrangements are being made for this to be launched at the Popley Festival in May. More areas in Abbey Road, Tintern Close, Popley Community Park and Pershore Road will follow.

Improvements at the Dell which is not a prelaid out play area it will be in the form of soft landscaping and the proposals will be put to local residents prior to the scheme being worked up and developed. All being well the work to the Dryden Close and Dell schemes will commence in early September, some improvements to the Dell are already under way.

There is also good news to follow on much needed path improvements in many areas in Popley with the programme to tarmac the uneven unsafe concreted slab paths. The flooding is also to be addressed in stages.

Popley residents have been subjected to enormous upheaval over the last decade and significant work is required to improve the overall fabric and wellbeing of the area. The Kiln Farm appeal by David Wilson Homes is due to start on Tuesday 30 April 2013 at the Civic Offices and will last for about 8 days.

David Wilson Homes are appealing against the Council's decision to refuse permission for them to build 450 houses on Kiln Farm and is proceeding despite the massive opposition from all parts of the community who believe and know that Popley has been saturated with housing development for a decade and cannot take any more at this time.

There is an overwhelming view that the infrastructure including schools, medical centres, shops, roads and other community facilities cannot cope with a further increase in population. the impact on one of the few remaining open spaces where local people can exercise and enjoy undeveloped green space will be devastating.

David Wilson Homes have shown themselves to be immune to these arguments.

Unfortunately due to the current administration not having a local development plan this will not help in our appeal.

We need to get local people/organisations to say heartfelt things about their local community and the fears they have about further mass development in Popley. Saying these things to the Planning Inspector at the appeal will have a huge impact.

Everest Autism and ADHD Club

Everest Autism and ADHD Club has a vision; to become a centre of excellence in our community for those affected by Autism and ADHD. We are an activity provider for children with Autism and ADHD and open every Sunday. Our club runs for two hours on a Sunday and is a mixture of sport, ICT, Music, Arts & Craft, Media, Dance & Drama. We have in place a number of Parent Administrators and Parent Helpers, who provide a supervisory role and also act as play leaders.

We provide numerous opportunities for off-site activities such as farm visits, horse riding, swimming and, for parents, coffee mornings.

Our families can access social and communal events in a safe and non judgemental environment. We are a parent support network for families in an atmosphere of understanding, where parents are able to access information and gain emotional support. We provide children with a social environment where they are able to express themselves through sport and of other activities.

Our children are able to access events which will stimulate spacial awareness and coordination in a controlled environment. We encourage children to partake in a number of events they would otherwise have difficulty attending due to their social/communication and coordination difficulties. We give families of these children the opportunity to meet other families in similar situations and provide a shared learning opportunity. Our club brings families together and provide children with friendships within their own peer groups. Everest Autism and ADHD Club thrives on friendship.



You may have noticed that environmental improvements have been taking place across the Poets estate during the last month, with new fencing and planting. We are happy to report that later this year the play area in the middle of the estate, between Dryden and Browning Closes, will

be massively improved, and more will be done in the Dell between the entrances to Chaucer and Dryden Closes. We are also pushing to get improved access into the Chineham Park play area for wheelchairs and pushchairs. These environment improvements are the first of many projects we have been involved in with our local Councillors, and there are more to come. Thank you to those of you who have answered surveys and sent emails making suggestions, as your responses have directly influenced these projects. Children at Marnel schools have also been telling us what they like and don't like, and what they would like to see in our patch. Their ideas were inspiring – including a crocodile in the paddling pool! We will be looking for more input from you soon, in choosing what type and style of equipment you might prefer for the central play area.

If you would like to know more about us, what we do, or would like to get involved, please contact me or come and meet us in person on Thursdays between 11am and 2pm at Popley Fields Community Centre. We will also be at Popley Festival next month.



Firefighters Appeal for Scrap Cars for Regional Training Event

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service is urgently seeking scrap cars to use at a regional multi-agency training event, being held in Winchester on Saturday 27 April 2013.

The project team behind the event is appealing to Hampshire residents who may have an old car or van in the garage, or on the drive with grass growing under it, to come forward and donate it to the fire service and help the county's firefighters improve their skills.

Hampshire extrication team leader, Watch Manager, Steve Barrow, said: "We have had previous appeals for scrap cars and the public have always been very generous in the knowledge that the 'end of life' cars are being put to good use."

"Any scrap vehicles donated will be allocated to the event and any surplus will be used by firefighters around the county who will use them in order to learn the important skills they need when they attend life-critical road traffic incidents."

Silverlake Garage is working in partnership with Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service to support the Winchester event.

Members of the public are asked not to contact their local fire station. Roadworthy and legal 'end of life' vehicles can be driven to the Silverlake site in Botley Road, Shedfield, from 10am to 4pm, Monday to Friday or 10am to 1pm on a Saturday.


Clockwise buses will run as 4 and anti clockwise as 4A.

Getting help with a civil litigation matter

I am often asked what legal matters come under 'Civil Litigation', which is defined as a legal dispute between two or more parties that seek money damages. In brief, it includes all disputes that are formally submitted to a court, dealing with a subject in which one party is claimed to have committed a wrong, but not a crime. In the UK, the civil litigation process is governed by the Civil Procedure Rules. Some of the more common matters that may be dealt with

through Civil Litigation include:

- Problems with contracts
- Disputes over a Will
- Professional negligence
- Problems with debt repayment
- Landlord and tenant disputes
- Boundary and property disagreements
- Conflicts with retailers, suppliers or service providers

It is always advisable to seek the advice of a solicitor with experience of civil litigation and he/she will look at the relevant facts and decide whether you might have a valid claim against another party. If appropriate, your solicitor will also try to find a suitable expert witness who will testify about technical issues. Generally, in less complex cases both parties will agree on and share one expert witness.

It is important to realise, however, that going to court may not always be in your best interest and that your solicitor may advise you to consider settling your dispute

through negotiation. This is known as Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) and involves methods known as Mediation and Arbitration. In reality, the vast majority of cases settle before they get to court.

DIARIES FROM THE OLD CODGER

Many of our senior citizens suffer memory loss. It is sad, the thing that I get upset about is when they do not know who they are or what they are doing. Recently I had an idea that might be helpful. If they had a band on their wrists, I don't mean the ones like you get in hospital, but one of these charity bands people buy, with family consent they could have a microchip in the band; they would not look out of place as so many people of all ages wear them nowadays. With the cooperation of police, local shops as well as hospitals if a person is lost and confused they can scan the band and will



help find the person's relatives or home. I know that if I had a fit when I am out and I have got lost, when I come round again and I dont know who I am. If I had a band like this I would willingly wear it I would put one on for the safety of myself and peace of mind for the family.

When our family had to move out of London in the war my mother had three children. As she put it bombing was so bad that she could not get everyone in the coal shed under the stairs. The house would shake with every thump and by the time she came out they would be covered from head to foot in coal dust. In the back yard was our air raid shelter, most of the time it was under a foot of water as the river was close by and the rain would soon fill it up. When we were evacuated they sent our family to Surrey. The thing was it was by an airdrome so the bombs still kept coming. My dear old aunt May stayed in the East End and still worked at Tate and Lyle. She lived to a good age of 95.

On writing this it came to me some time ago that again I had an idea, for all our kids to stay safe on our roads and out playing. I named it as a bit of a catch on a TV programme they watch so would be called The Three Bees Club.

It is a very simple way for children to learn about road safety and also being safe when out at play. It is sad as the old Green Cross Code has gone and if children are not taught in a fun way they soon forget. We have seen around the town children being knocked over. Perhaps not so many would if we could reintroduce something to help them. So I would hope our local schools look at this idea along with our county council and road safety teachers that come to schools. You know me, I do try to think of things that could help. Both the ideas I have talked about this month when mentioned to friends, family and others they think have been good simple ideas that may be of great benefit to our community.

We see so many people that cannot afford decent housing; it is a disgrace to our society by government after government. It is as usual the people that are well off that gain and the poorer that suffer, I have been taking a great interest in the building program our council is debating. Kiln farm is 450 homes, yet only a handful of these are for social housing, so those with the greatest

need will not gain by this build. Many landlords buy houses in bulk then let them back to housing associations to let out. But again most can't benefit from this. In my own opinion the thing that makes me so mad (as reported in the papers) is that our government can give alleged undesirables houses costing up to a million pounds. Where is the justification?

A FACE-TO-FACE APPROACH TO REDUCING LONELINESS AND ISOLATION

Basingstoke based Hampshire Wellbeing Services CIC (HWS CIC) has launched a Befriending service for local people who are isolated, lonely, frail or adjusting to a lifestyle change - the Friendship and Community Equality (FACE) project.

A number of research studies conducted across the UK, highlight the issues of people who have become isolated from society and from accessing services. There are many reasons this has happened, such as ill health, disability, fear, bereavement, cultural barriers, language issues or even through just having no transport.

It is estimated that about 10 per cent of the general population aged over 65 in the UK is lonely all or most of the time - this equates to over 900,000 older people.

Research examining loneliness amongst different ethnic groups shows that levels of loneliness amongst ethnic minority elders are overall higher than for the rest of the population – 15 per cent reporting that they always or often feel lonely.

FIGURES AS HIGH AS 75% IN OUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES

HWS CIC's own research into loneliness and isolation amongst Basingstoke's ethnic minority elders revealed 75 per cent experienced loneliness and wanted companionship and support. These multicultural communities have specific needs – they need a companion who can speak their language and also understand their culture.

ENABLING ISOLATED PEOPLE TO RECONNECT WITH THEIR COMMUNITIES

This year HWS CIC launched their FACE project – with a goal of providing Friendship and Community Equality through providing training to people from a range of local communities to come together as a team to provide Befriending services to those in need, including those with diverse language and cultural requirements.

Our FACE Befrienders can: visit people in their homes, take them out to events, help them with their shopping, escort them to appointments or introduce them to like-minded people; and simply giving them a new lease of life, purpose and greater quality of life.

Trainer Phil Simmonds said: 'we have already trained people from host communities – England, Nepal, the Middle East, Caribbean, China, Bulgaria and New Zealand - as Befrienders, enabling isolated people to access their community. We have seen first-hand the needs of those that have become disadvantaged within their own communities and the impact of isolation on their health and wellbeing. We believe that we are providing an opportunity to enable people to directly support and help those in need within their own communities.
