



My Latest Visit to Minsk (the Capital of Belarus).

As my friends and neighbours in Abbey Road are aware I visit Minsk twice a year. I have now been staying with the same family for ten years, who live in Rokossovsky Avenue.

Their flat is normally a ten minute walk from the trolley bus stop where I catch a 20 or 30 trolley bus to the underground station, which is known as the 'Metro'. From the Metro station I can travel to the five universities and the radio station, where I speak to students, record texts and take part in English language broadcasts at Radio Belarus.

This year I arranged to arrive at Minsk airport on 17th March, which is a few weeks earlier than normal. On the Friday before I was due to arrive they had a blizzard in Minsk, which is unusual for March! This closed the airport and flights were being diverted to Kiev and Gomel! Luckily for me, the airport was back to normal on the Sunday I flew out!



The main roads had been cleared but here's a picture of outside the flat I stay in. It now took me at least 15 – 20 minutes to slip, slide, and slither down to the trolley bus stop avoiding the three feet deep snow drifts!

Despite the Artic conditions and slipping over twice, I managed to keep all the appointments at five Universities, Radio Belarus and to see all of my many friends in Minsk.

The students, teachers and professors

of English lack practice with a 'native speaker' and, consequently, lack confidence.



Not too many English people visit Minsk, and of those who do, not all of them are prepared to meet students, teachers and professors of English.

Here's a picture I took of Natasha, standing proudly holding her 'English' notepad she bought last year in London when she was staying with me, with

some of her students who she teaches English. Hopefully, Natasha will be coming to Basingstoke again in July this year. Last year, Natasha was most impressed with Abbey Road and how friendly the friends and neighbours I introduced her to were to her. Speaking to them all improved her English, which is very, very good in any event, and boosted her confidence immensely.

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North Popley Estate - Access Improvements Update

Work is due to commence in early July on the access improvements to the North Popley estate, providing improved footways and better cycle connections on the main routes. This is the next phase in the programme that has already brought safety and accessibility improvements to Popley Way and Carpenter's Down, which will now provide improved links throughout North Popley, including onwards connections to the town centre, Everest Community Academy and the North Hants Hospital.

The scheme will improve the local environment by upgrading the main footway routes, allowing easier access to key destinations both locally and further afield. It will improve the local environment and compliment earlier work in the programme, as well as that of the private sector in recent residential and commercial developments. The County Council has been coordinating with the Sentinel Housing Association to make sure our planned improvements will connect with their recent facilities, in order to provide direct and accessible routes through the whole North Popley estate.

The details of the scheme have been progressed with the detailed involvement of all local Councillors, including Cllr Jane Frankum, Cllr Paul Frankum, Cllr Vivienne Washbourne and Cllr David Potter. This is as well as other key stakeholders, including utility companies, the above Sentinel Housing and a variety of officers at Hampshire County Council and Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council. It is as presented in the public consultation event held in March 2010 in the Popley Fields Community Centre, where it was supported by over 94% of attendees.

The work to construct it will take around 20 weeks, during which time some sections of footway will be unavailable at times. We will try to keep this to a minimum, but we do ask for patience, as we are confident there will be significant improvements afterwards.

Councillors Page: Thank you to all the many residents that voted me back in to serve them in the County Council district of Basingstoke North. I was humbled by such a big majority and will continue to work as hard as I can for all the residents in my area.

There is some major work on improving the paths and cycle connections starting in July. It is a continuation of the phases of safety measures in Popley with Poets and Abbeys to follow in the future. A fuller report is on the previous page.

Section 106 developer money and a campaign backed by all the Popley Councillors and petitions from residents has brought about a new bus route through the Marnel Park and Merton Rise new developments. It enables the residents to access the hospital and town centre. The 106 money has also enabled more picnic benches on the Popley Community Park so that families can use and enjoy the park much more. **Cllr Jane Frankum 01256 819924 jane.frankum@hants.gov.uk**

Popley West: The Popley Councillors attended or wrote submissions for the Planning Inspector's appeal in the council chamber. At the Tuesday evening public hearing we met some of the protestors before going into our AGM meeting. We had given our evidence and submissions in the afternoon. We presented several pieces of evidence and photographs, now we just have to wait for the report and decision which is expected by 24th September. You may have read in the local press or via Facebook that the council cabinet have sanctioned spending nearly £800,000 of tax payers money on the shell of a drive through coffee venue which they will get £65,000 a year rent return. It will take twelve years to recuperate the outlay plus they have an option to break the lease after only 15 years. There are already 12 places in close proximity to buy coffee and refreshments. How does that make good business sense? 370 people have signed the petition already but we need the administration to know just how residents feel about spending our taxes without consulting you? Also many people told me there were other facilities that could generate an income and be more desirable to spend our money on. Popley East: May has been a busy month for all the Popley Councillors with the County Council elections at the beginning of May and the Kiln Farm Appeal running from 30th April to 10th May 2013.

Congratulations to Jane who was not only re elected but also increased her majority. The Kiln Farm appeal came to a close on Friday 10th May. As Popley Councillors we had the opportunity to give our statements against the development to the planning inspector either in person or by written statement on the afternoon of Tuesday 7th May. Later that evening local residents also had the opportunity to speak against the development. It was fantastic to see the council chambers full of local residents from Popley and Sherborne St John, showing the strength of feeling against this opportunistic development on the popular Kiln Farm Fields. The planning inspector will now pass his findings on to Eric Pickles Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, for a final decision to be made.



What do you know about sudden cardiac arrest or the use of a defibrillator? I think we can safely say that we knew very little until a visit from Robert Grieve, a mature student from Bournemouth University. Robert is studying TV Production and has made an educational film about these subjects. There is a difference between a heart attack and a sudden cardiac arrest and if a defibrillator can be used there is a very good chance that the heart can be re-started before the paramedics arrive. There is currently no legislation for these devices to be at venues such as gyms, theatres, schools, colleges, shopping centres etc but we found out what amazing pieces of equipment they are.

Twelve members of the group stretched their legs on a walk around the remains of the Roman Wall at Silchester. The sun shone as we ambled along taking in the scenery. There were many interesting facts to take in, for example, the height of the wall when first built was about eight metres high and four metres thick at the base, made mainly of flint, a huge building feat in the Iron Age. We also viewed the Amphitheatre, capable of holding 3,000 people. Another interesting building was the 12th century Parish church of St Mary the Virgin, with its beautiful stain glass windows.

The Universal's here

I've heard about Universal Credit. What is it?

If you claim any of the following benefits you'll be affected when the new Universal Credit is rolled out later this year:

Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, income-related Employment and Support Allowance, Income Support, Child Tax Credit, Working Tax Credit, and Housing Benefit. The Government's Universal Credit merges these benefits and tax credits into one monthly payment and you'll pay all your bills, including rent, from this one payment. Housing Benefit won't be paid separately, so you'll need to pay your rent directly to Sentinel. **Paying your rent is a priority payment, and if you don't pay it you could lose your home.**

When will the changes take place?

October 2013 New claimants move to Universal Credit

Spring 2014 Current claimants will start changing from their existing benefits to Universal Credit

2017 The switch will be complete.

How do I claim?

To claim Universal Credit you'll need to register online, you'll also be able to check payments and organise your budgets.

Sentinel customers who don't have access to the internet, can use a computer at our offices in Basingstoke or Fleet. You can also visit your local library, or any internet café. Your local council or jobcentre may also be able to help.

What about Disability Living Allowance?

Disability Living Allowance (DLA) will not form part of the new Universal Credit or fall under the benefit cap. However, from April 2013 it will be changing to the new Personal Independence Payment (PIP) for all new claimants. If you already claim DLA you'll be re-assessed under PIP criteria when your current DLA comes up for renewal, unless you're over 64 or under 16. You'll probably have to complete a claim pack and attend a consultation with an independent assessor. They'll advise the person who makes the decision regarding how much you may be entitled to.

What about my Pension Credit?

Pension Credit will change from October 2014 and help with rent will be called Housing Credit. If you're claiming Pension Credit you'll also be entitled to claim Housing Credit from October 2014. If you're already a Housing Benefit customer, over pension credit age, you'll be transferred to the new Pension Credit system between 2014 and 2017.

Anna Kennedy Online Celebrates Talented Children and Young Adults In Autism's Got Talent Supported By Pineapple Arts School

On the evening of Saturday 11th May, Everest Autism and ADHD Club were delighted that Jane Frankum was able to join us on our visit to The Mermaid Theatre in London to watch Autism's Got Talent.

The show brought together a diverse group of people from across the United Kingdom all at varying positions on the Autistic Spectrum. Anyone out there in the world with the thought that someone with a disability may be lacking in talent would be in for a real shock. We were shown just how great the performers were and what they are capable of. It was wonderful for our children to see they too can achieve their ambitions and goals in spite of their disability and should not be deterred by the challenges they face. We are sure it was a boost to their confidence.

Audience members and performers alike were given a chance they don't often get; to be in an environment which many people take for granted. At this event, any noise from within the audience and slight hiccups on stage were not an issue, whereas within another theatre environment it would be. Many of the problems faced by people on the Autistic Spectrum exist due to the lack of understanding and awareness from society around them. Many children with Autism look like any other child and so they and their parents often face disapproval and "tut tuts" from the general public in respect of their behaviour when they out in their community.

Children with Autism also have to face the issue of bullying. This was portrayed to us through dance courtesy of Pineapple Arts School.

As well as pioneering Autism's Got Talent, Anna Kennedy has a registered charity called Anna Kennedy Online. This charity offers help and advice to struggling families. Anna received an OBE last summer due to her tireless work in the Autism world having set up two schools by remortgaging her home and writing a book called "Not Stupid" about her struggle to help her two sons (both on the Autistic Spectrum) access an education.

The charity's campaign "Give Us A Break" is in partnership with the Anti-Bullying Alliance and targets unstructured periods within the school day such as break times and after lunch when our Autistic children are more likely to fall victim to bullying. Anna has been delivering talks in mainstream schools to raise children's awareness and understanding of Autism. A greater understanding of Autism removes a lot of the bullying problems that are encountered by Autistic children in mainstream education.

Everest Autism and ADHD Club are supporting those who are affected by Autism and hope to make their lives a little easier by spreading the word about this often invisible condition.

It is all too easy for criminals to watch your actions and then come up with some excuse to distract you later, perhaps in a car park or elsewhere whilst an accomplice steals your card. Often this may be the only item stolen, so you may not notice it missing, till quite some time later. Meanwhile the criminals have plenty of time to use the card without your knowledge.

Illegal/Unlicensed Raves.

Last week I added information received from Hampshire Constabulary onto the BDNW website, with things to look out for and how to call in potentially useful information. This is part of Operation Enigma.

Suspicious Vehicles or persons.

Should you spot any suspicious vehicles/occupants in your area, ESPECIALLY WHITE VANS, then do please note the registration number for when you call 101, as this makes things so much easier if the police need to trace vehicles as part of any investigation. Similarly for persons seen acting suspiciously, try to get a good description.

Warm Weather Advisory Warning.

Now that the weather may be getting better, and people will be out in gardens, local parks and beauty spots, a timely warning to be extra careful with your homes, vehicles and property. We have a new article on the BDNW website with some very useful information and would encourage everyone to take a look at the BDNW website (as below) and put **Warm** in the top right search box. There is a very useful leaflet which you can reference by clicking on the attachment at the bottom of the article. **Tip.** Make sure you set the web page to "Full Screen" otherwise the Search box will be obscured.

Ongoing Crime Issues. – The Old Favourites still happen.

There are several new witness appeals on our website this week, relating to recent crimes in our area. Please take a look.

Also new this week on our website is an article about supermarket car park scams. Please be careful.

Opportunist theft from all types of motor vehicles is unfortunately still happening, especially in rural areas like beauty spots, rural restaurant car parks and any similar areas.

This is mainly being fuelled by valuable items being left visible and inviting crime. The police often undertake major crime prevention initiatives and you may get a letter from them, if their patrols reveal you are thought to be leaving your vehicle and valuable contents at risk. Also ongoing is **thefts from vans** in many areas of the Basingstoke patch. Where possible, please remove or hide all valuable items from your vehicle, especially when parked overnight. Do remember that thieves know where to look for your valuables and it just takes seconds for a thief to rob you of your most treasured items. **NEVER** leave keys in your vehicle when it is not being driven and always lock it when parked and don't leave any items on view.

Always remember that the issues from previous editions never go away. We are always aware of rogue traders offering their services heating oil thefts, cold callers, other scams, and frauds etc.

Also be aware of any "extra devices" designed to skim your details, when using your credit/debit card at cash machines, petrol pumps and other outside card facilities. If it looks strange or different, don't use the card machine, but do report it ASAP.

Every piece of information really does help the overall fight against crime. Every call can also help in deciding policing strategy.

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Sham Redundancies - Are You A Victim?

There are not many families that have avoided that dreaded word “redundancy”. It is hard enough for employees to come to terms with their employment being terminated when there is a genuine redundancy situation. It becomes impossible when their employer uses it as an excuse to dismiss without genuine cause.

An employer can only lawfully dismiss an employee for a potentially fair reason under English law, e.g. capability, misconduct, because of a statutory restriction, redundancy or for some other substantial reason.

However, employers will often look to avoid dismissing employees for capability or misconduct due to the time-consuming procedures in place which they would be expected to follow.

Sometimes employers wish to dismiss for discriminatory reasons (e.g. because of the employee’s age, sex, race, disability, sexual orientation, gender reassignment, marriage or civil partnership or religion or belief) but are not permitted to do so. They may wish to dismiss for what would be an automatically unfair reasons (e.g. because of jury service or because the employee has complained about issues relating to health and safety, working time, minimum wage, flexible working or perhaps because an employee has whistle-blown or joined a trade union) and so the employer dismisses under the guise of redundancy.

For a redundancy dismissal to be fair, there must be a genuine redundancy situation, the employee must have been fairly selected for redundancy and the employer must have followed a fair procedure. When determining the fairness of a redundancy dismissal Employment Tribunals are not normally entitled to investigate the reasons behind the redundancy situation. There is no requirement for employers to demonstrate that they were forced into making redundancies because of economic reasons, a sound and objectively justified commercial reason will suffice. This does not mean to say that they will always take the employer’s reason at face value, especially where an employee establishes facts which suggest that their selection was discriminatory and the redundancy situation was a sham.

It is important to know that there are very short time limits that apply to Employment Tribunal claims, e.g. three months (less one day) from the date of dismissal or the date of the discriminatory act, so if you think you may have been treated in this way, don’t delay in seeking advice as you could be prevented from bringing a claim if your time limit has expired.

If you think that your employer has dismissed you, or is trying to dismiss you, for an unfair or discriminatory reason but they are labelling it ‘redundancy’, why not call one of our qualified employment lawyers as soon as possible for advice.

On 9th May the Popley West Councillors Paul Frankum and Jane Frankum met with Phillip Gee the Plant Collections Manager from the Royal Mail. We all did a site visit to show the increase in developments and the developments that are due to come that evidenced the need for the much saught after post box to serve Marnel Park and Merton Rise area. We were informed that there is a very strict criteria and they must be at least 400 metres away from the next nearest post box or post office and on a main though fare, It was agreed that we had evidenced the need for a post box and that Benham Drive fitted the criteria. Paul has asked for a timescale of when it would be erected there. It depends if planning permission is required, or in this case if David Wilson Homes will agree prior to the area being adopted by the council. We continue to push for the adoption to be completed. We are hopeful that it should be well inside of this year.

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
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
