North Popley Estate Access Improvements – Scheme Update

The estate access improvement scheme is the third phase of the North Popley improvement programme and is focussed on improving the pedestrian and cycle infrastructure in the area. This will make it easier and safer for those moving through the estate; allow it to drain better; make it easier to maintain; and improve access to local facilities or onwards to key destinations.

Work is currently continuing on improving the width and surfacing of the main footways, to more safely accommodate all users and connect seamlessly with nearby residential and commercial development. This will connect with important crossing points of Popley Way, Carpenters Down, the A33 and the A340, as well as providing gateway features on the main vehicle entry points in to Popley. It has also been noted how the area hasn't always drained well in recent years, so new facilities will be added to the drainage network at crucial points to make it better able to cope with the increased recent demand.

The scheme is now well in to its 20 week programme, with the work progressing well and the conclusion of works still being anticipated for November. This is despite the addition of several new items in response to issues that have recently arisen.

The contractor, Colas, has been trying to work as sensitively as possible and good feedback has been received on this. They have also voluntarily given a day of their time to work in the new Community Garden by Bermuda Hall, as well as provided paving slabs and other surfacing that was needed, all free of charge. The Hampshire County Council team thanks them for this important contribution to the local community.

Merton School Expansion

Cllr Paul Frankum and I met with officers to talk about the results of the public consultation on the Merton Schools expansion. There was an overwhelming support to enhance the learning facilities of our children, the big issue was the extra cars and safety of residents and the children. We spoke about the entrances and the need to get the children to school without blocking the garages and causing annoyance to the residents. Some residents had put forward some very constructive ideas and the architect is working on the possibility of incorporating. Paul will do another walkabout to see if we can make it better and safer, then the new drawings will be shown at another public meeting at the school. 5-7pm Monday 4th November. We will keep you informed as best we can.

Who are we? What do we do?

There has been a community centre next to the Abbey Road shops for over 40 years. Some residents may remember the first community building, a wooden built structure which was demolished in the late 90s which stood in what is now our community garden, and replaced by the building we

have today.

The building was built and is owned by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council who lease to us – Melrose Community Association (MCA), a not-for-profit registered charity (we are not affiliated to any religious bodies or groups). We would also like to rectify a misunderstanding by some local residents that this hall is a church; it is not, never has been and never will be a church.

Our aim is to provide an affordable indoor space for use by all members of the local community, regardless of ethnicity, age, gender or religion, and also to provide groups/clubs for the benefit of the local community. The building is fully accessible and also has a hearing loop facility for hearing aid users.

MCA is managed by a committee of volunteers (all local residents), which meet once a month, as well as giving their time for fundraising and organised events such as our Summer and Winter Fayres and our Community Christmas Dinner. Watch this space for more details of up-coming events. We have only two part time paid members of staff: Vicki who manages the day to day running of the hall and also provides maintainance cover to the building, and Liz our cleaner.

MCA is selffunded, 98% of our income comes from hire fees, the other 2% from grants/donations and fundraising events. The hall is available to hire both on a regular and occasional basis with varying rates of hire to provide lower cost options for community groups and charities.

We also run our own groups which are funded by MCA. these are the Monday 'Little Rainbows' and Tuesday 'Little People' carer and baby groups. Little Rainbows is a structured educational group that follows the national curriculum; Little People is a more relaxed 'coffee and play' group.

MCA also helps to organise and run the Popley Festival in conjunction with Popley Fields Community Association (PFCA). We also run Family Bingo nights at Bermuda Hall again in conjunction with PFCA and Bermuda Community Association (BCA).

We have many regular groups that hire the hall: Perigrinus Healing and Holistic, NHS Quit Smoking, Phoenix Dog Training, Age UK, Slimming World, Oasis Lunch Club, Basingstoke Voluntary Services Youth Club, Melrose Christian Fellowship Youth Club, Praise Embassy, Pebbles Children's Centre, and Melrose Christian Fellowship.

MCA is made up of Popley people and is a charity which exists for the benefit of the residents of Popley.

The community hall is for you, and we invite you to become part of the association, to make use of the facility and to give us any feedback that will help us to serve the Popley community in the best way we can.

Councillors Page

Basingstoke North and Popley West: We received a phone call from a resident to ask if we were going to the public consultation in just a few days' time on the expansion of Merton Infant and Junior Schools. We had not been consulted about this and were concerned that as your elected representatives we had not been informed. Cllr Paul Frankum and I immediately went to Winchester and met with officers, the architect, transport consultant, and a few others. Our concern was not the expansion of the school but the problems of the traffic and just how many of the residents were trapped in their homes as parents/carers parked their cars across their garages and blocked roads already. Only the day before, a resident had come round to the house for advice on doing a petition because he and neighbours in Fountains Close had the same problem. Then a very unhappy resident from Romsey Close came round to our house too as she had people parking on her drive. We printed 600 leaflets and got them all delivered to as many of the residents as we could in the time we had. It is not the schools' fault that residents weren't told; they want to work with us and the residents to find solutions. Some very good ideas came out of the meeting and we will continue to push the officers to get the best results we can. We are meeting with the officer and we will report back any news in future Popley Matters.

The loss of the appeal on 450 more dwellings was devastating and we want to say to the residents a big thank you for all you did. It is a shame that our sound reasons were rejected in the light of the coalition's resolve to build anywhere with no regard to the lives of people who live near. We welcomed our neighbours in the regeneration; Marnel Park, Merton Rise and all the houses on the old John Hunt School site, and have made many friends, but enough is enough. We have not got the infrastructure to support more. Promises made to Marnel and Merton people spending their hard earned money and savings that there would be no more building were just thrown away for the greed of the developers. One resident asked "Why have a planning committee if the Secretary of State ignores their findings?" Localism listen to people! Maybe he needs my hearing aids! Work is continuing on paths and landscape in Popley Islands and we have started meeting with officers on improvements needed in Popley Abbeys.

Popley East: At the September we were very disappointed to hear that David Wilson Homes had won their appeal to build 450 homes on Kiln Farm. All 4 Popley Councillors and a great many residents gave statements against the development to the planning inspector. Rarely a planning application attracted so much local resistance and condemnation. For nearly 2 years we have been speaking out against the development, asking for residents to be given a break from the seemingly constant development and disruption forced on them in the last few years. Unfortunately the odds were stacked against us. The Secretary of State concluded that the council could not demonstrate a 5 year housing land supply 'and in the context of a serious and significant shortfall in housing land supply, the benefits would clearly outweigh the temporary, albeit lengthy, construction impacts that the local community would have to endure'. We are very disappointed by the Secretary of State's ruling as we felt we had sound reasons for refusal.

It is a new school term and it is important to consider a few points. To all parents and carers, please consider safe and legal places to park when dropping your children off at their school. Please also be respectful towards residents around the school area. To all pupils, whilst walking to and from school, it is important to conduct your journey in a respectful manner; congregating outsides people's houses in their doorways or in private bike sheds/garages/driveways is not acceptable.

Over the summer we received a very high level of complaints regarding youths congregating outside the shops on Abbey Road,

causing a general nuisance during the day and late at night. The group have also been responsible for throwing objects at vehicles travelling down Popley Way. Over the summer a number of meetings were set up involving multi-agencies and Councillors to look in to ways of tackling this. This is still something currently in progress. In the meantime your Safer Neighbourhood Team have been trying to tackle this issue in the best possible way. A number of youths have been identified on multiple occasions, these youths are now on track for receiving Acceptable Behaviour Contracts (ABCs) and, should the problems continue, we will continue to place youths on ABCs.

Regarding our community priorities:

Carter Drive Fires - over the summer the issue of fires around the park at the end of Carter Drive seemed to have stopped. We have not received any further complaints and our patrols have not encountered any issues.

Drugs - Drugs still remain a priority within Popley, on 27th August, a male was arrested for possession of a small amount of a Class A drug, the male was given a police caution. On 5th September a male was located with Cannabis, he was dealt with by officers who dealt with him by means of a Cannabis Street Caution.

Tresspassing Marnel Schools - On 17th September 4 youths were located trespassing inside the Marnel School grounds, the youths attempted running from Officers however were quickly located. The youths details were all taken and were walked back to Marnel Infant School where they all individually apologised to the Headteacher for their actions.

I'd like to thank all our Popley residents who have been reporting issues concerning our priorities and other crimes to 101, and urge all other residents who witness or who are victims of non emergency crime to 101, with the exception of noise complaints which should be reported to Basingstoke and Deane Environmental Health Department. However, all emergencies should be reported to 999.

I will be holding a Beat Surgery on 10th October between 7 and 9pm at Popley Fields Community Centre. If you would like to discuss in person any issues this is your ideal opportunity.



I applied for the job online, and while I was on Sentinel's website I also found out about STEP (Support Towards Employment Programme). I joined STEP when it first started and it opened up my eyes to work and what I could do if I put my mind to it.

Now I've joined Sentinel as an apprentice I feel like my life is back on track. I was nervous when I first started, but now I've settled in and I'm enjoying the job and the working environment.

If there's anyone else out there who's feeling as down as I was when I wasn't working, I definitely recommend that they give STEP a go. It helped me get my confidence back and showed me how to go about finding and keeping a good job."

WoW! 10% increase in Popley students walking to school...

Pupils from infant and junior schools in Merton have been working with Living Streets, the national charity that stands up for pedestrians, and Hampshire County

Council to encourage more students to walk to school. The scheme is called Walk Once a Week (WoW) and rewards children with fun badges for each month in which they have walked to school at least once each week.

Under half of UK children walk to school and this number is decreasing, while the number of children being driven to school has doubled in the last 20 years.

Before joining this scheme, the walk to school rates in the Merton schools were already higher than the national average of 47%, with 68% of infant school students and 79% of junior school students walking to school. However, with expansion plans for the schools likely to lead to an increase in traffic, the schools and Hampshire County Council recognised the WoW scheme presented an opportunity to address the issue and reduce the density of parking in the local area. The walk to school is also an easy way to build some physical activity into a child's day and they recognised the health benefits for students.

The first of three surveys to assess the impact of the WoW scheme shows a **10% increase** in walking rates amongst students at Merton Infant School from 68 % to 78%.

In order to encourage more students to take part, the schools and Living Streets have also conducted a School Route Audit in order to identify barriers to walking and to make it safer and more attractive for pupils to walk to school.

The Living Streets Officer – Helen Corkery - led an audit of the main walking routes around Merton School site with teachers and students. The pupils were given a camera to record what they liked and disliked the most about the route. Their findings included:-

- We like being able to go into the park and ball court to play/chat to friends on the way to and from school.
- We like being able to see into the allotments and to spot which vegetables are being grown.
- We like the joint footpath/cycle path along Melrose Walk as it means the path is really wide and we can walk along in a group with our family and friends.
- There are litter bins along route to keep streets clean and we like the fact that there was no litter or dog fouling all along Melrose Walk.
- We like the nice green areas, shrubs and trees.
- We like spotting pets along the route and seeing the trees and flowers change with the seasons.
- We like the nice views we can see on this walk particularly from the bench on Melrose Walk where we can stop and chat to our friends and see all the way across to the college.

It was observed on the audit that there are safe parking places near to the Abbey Road shops, where parents could park and then walk with their children the rest of the way. Living Streets and the School Travel Team at Hampshire County Council are continuing to work with the schools to ensure that as many families as possible are able to either walk to school or park in a safe and appropriate place away from the school site.

October is International Walk to School Month. Each year, primary school pupils from across the UK join forces with children in more than 40 countries worldwide to celebrate the benefits of walking to school.

Sex discrimination is still rife in the workplace

Karen Bristow of Phillips Solicitors says: "It has been 38 years since sex discrimination was outlawed in this country, yet in a recent survey it was suggested that more than a quarter of mothers in the UK feel discriminated against at work".

It seems that there are still some companies which either do not understand maternity rights or choose not to abide by them.

It is extremely common for pregnant employees or employees on maternity leave to be treated unfavourably. It is unlawful for an employer to discriminate against a woman because of her pregnancy, because of an illness related to her pregnancy or because she has sought to exercise her right to take maternity leave. Examples of unfavourable treatment include marginalising a pregnant woman in her role due to her impending absence, disciplining a woman because of pregnancy-related sick leave or for taking time off for pre-natal appointment or classes. Unfavourable treatment whilst on maternity leave can include being excluded from work social functions, not being consulted with in relation to re-organisational changes, not being considered for pay increases, bonuses or promotions.


A further problem faced by many returning mothers is that their 'return to work' rights are not honoured. Under current employment law a woman returning from ordinary maternity leave (up to 26 weeks) has the right to return to the job in which she was employed before her absence on the same terms and conditions. Where the employee has taken additional maternity leave (up to a further 26 weeks) and it is not reasonably practicable (other than because of redundancy) to return her to that role, the employee must be offered a suitable and appropriate alternative job on no less favourable terms and conditions. However, a common issue that arises is where the company want to keep the person they have recruited as maternity cover in the role or where the business structure has moved on and evolved in the employee's absence and she has not been 'factored in', leaving her without a position. Some also find that a reasonable request to return on a flexible or part-time basis may be refused on grounds which are not very clear and seem to be unnecessary hurdles being put in the path of her returning on that basis.



Winter Lectures at the Museum of Army Flying.

Every year the Museum of Army Flying's Society of Friends organise two lecture series to raise money for the Museum. This winter the lectures include a range of incredible stories and feature tales of amazing personalities, all delivered by well-regarded speakers.

The series will open with a talk on The Victoria Cross by Colonel Mike Martin on 13th November. The Victoria Cross, established in 1856 during the Crimean War, has remained to this day the highest British award for valour on the battlefield and is perhaps the most prestigious medal in the world. The story and the institution of the Victoria Cross, along with the myths and anecdotes, are unfolded in the expert hands of Col Mike Martin (Retired), of The Royal Hampshire Regiment.

The second lecture in the series will look at the history of the Hampshire country house 'Bramshill'. This was home to the Red Cross during World War II and the talk will explain the vital role they played from this historic residence. This lecture will be held on the 11th December and has been kindly organised for the Friends by renowned Hampshire re-enactment group Homefront History, who will bring the lecture to life with their costumed characters.

On 15th January Col. Derek Armitage recounts the famous battle of Rorke's Drift. During the battle 150 British and Imperial troops defended an isolated outpost during the Zulu War against three regiments of 3,000 warriors in 1879. "Like Rats in a Hole", they restored the reputation of the army following the disastrous defeat at Isandlwana.

All lectures start at 7:30pm and have an interval for refreshments. Tickets are £5 per person and booking through the museum is recommended as numbers are limited.
