**Councillors Page:** June was a very busy month with the application to build a wind farm that had an impact on three different areas in Hampshire. I am now back on the Development Control Committee (Planning) and I had to catch up with all the hundreds of pages of texts, maps and drawings with an amazing amount of technical details. As it was fairly near Popham Airfield there were objections from the pilots and club members. First the site visit on a mini bus around the miles of countryside. I got home at around five then on Monday the journey to Winchester again started at 8 o'clock where the three authorities met at the Guildhall. We listened to many objectors and supporters. Then the applicants and expert witnesses. All made compelling arguments and we had to weigh it up and come to a vote. Fourteen giant wind turbines in the countryside to generate electricity, cleaner than nuclear, safer than sending people down a coal mine, and new technology to help provide for our children and grandchildren? I came down on the side of the safer future for our generations. We lost the vote for the four in the Basingstoke and Deane area by seven votes to five. The two other authorities also rejected the plans for the others. Cllr Jane Frankum 01256 819924

**Popley West:** We have already had several complaints about parking on corners and right across pathways in Popley, it has become a regular feature. It becomes even more hazardous when the school summer holidays are on, as children are out playing in the lovely warm weather. Please be considerate of your neighbours and the residents and visitors that live or come to Popley.

With the warm weather and light nights, children and youths are out playing, and with the World Cup on lots of football. No one minds children having a great time and enjoying the sun, but it is really annoying to the residents that they choose to use their walls as goalposts. We are lucky to have several play areas that are ideal for field sports so please encourage them to use them. We have had meetings with council officers to improve our open spaces and play facilities and we will keep you posted on this issue.

We believe a lot of residents will welcome this facility and we will continue to argue for additional shelters in other places especially where we have been petitioned by users.

Following determined arguments on behalf of the community, we believe we have been successful in making sure that an independent access for those with disabilities will be provided at Chineham House so that the community facility will be available to all. We hope that this phase of renewal for Chineham House will lead to a wider improvement of the surrounding area providing a range of facilities. All of this will be funded by developer contributions and money which Popley has qualified for because of the substantial housing development absorbed in the area over many years.

We know that the delays in the construction of the play area in Dryden/Browning/Wordsworth Close area has been very frustrating for residents and this has been due to a number of things. Some equipment needed to be repositioned but some delay has been due to the contractor and changes in the work schedule. The landscaping phase is underway and a commitment has been given for the play area to be usable in good time for the summer holidays.



Today's ice creams are loaded with hydrogenated oils and preservatives and are pumped full of air. Here are two recipes that use just 3 ingredients and take no time at all to make. Read below to see why making these simple recipes are far healthier and less fattening.

600ml cream

1 tsp vanilla essence

1 can condensed milk

Beat the cream with an electric mixer until it begins to thicken. Add the vanilla and beat until a light whipped cream forms. Gradually add the condensed milk and keep beating until it thickens and becomes a nice cream. Pour into a container and put in the freezer until hard.

### Here is another low cost and even lower calorie version...

1 can of ideal milk

1 can of condensed milk

1 tsp vanilla essence (or inner pod)

Make sure the ideal milk is chilled by placing in the fridge overnight. Empty into a large bowl and whip with an electric mixer until light and fluffy. It should form peaks. Gradually add the condensed milk and the vanilla flavouring while mixing until well blended. Pour into a container and freeze until hard.

With both versions you can add any flavours...coffee, mango, macadamia nut, strawberry. Use your imagination...the possibilities are endless!

Most people would lose their appetites quickly if they knew what actually went into some of the thousands of tubs of ice cream that are sold, not to mention what is left out. It is promoted with dreamy, sensual images. Yet for all that, one thing is conspicuous by its absence from the ingredients: cream and in many cases, fresh milk.

Taking cream out of ice cream is actually quite normal. The whipped ice cream squirted out of a nozzle to make the cones which you buy from an ice cream van, used to contain pig fat or lard. Today, filling ice cream with commercial vegetable oils is the common practice.

The most common vegetable fats in ices come from coconuts, and the fruit of the oil palm tree. The oil is not only industrially cheap, it is also unhealthy. Used in margarines, lipstick and detergents, this yellow liquid is high in saturated fat.

Dairy ice cream is required to have a minimum of 2.5% of milk protein and an additional minimum 5% of dairy fat. That's all! The only good news is that in dairy ice cream vegetable fat is not allowed.

But this is not the case with anything labelled simply "ice cream". Here, the product is merely required to contain 2.5% milk protein and 5% of any kind of fat. This rarely comes from any fresh ingredient. Partially reconstituted skimmed milk is one source. Another is whey solids. Stabilisers are often derived from seaweed.

These vegetable fats and milk-based products are what the industry refers to as bulking agents or fillers. There is one more: thin air. Ice cream is sold by volume, not weight, so a way of making it go further is to whip as much air into the mixture as possible before freezing it into plastic tubs.

So go on...make your own.

# Currently known new and ongoing scams to be aware of

- (a) Bogus NHS letters re fake doctor appointments.
- (b) Currently seen in the South Ham area. Suspect 'charity' callers Police aware.
- (c) Watch your credit cards closely at all times. See website article in 'Latest News' drop down menu.
- (d) Bogus 'Margaret Green Animal Sanctuary, Wareham Dorset' collection bags. There is no authorised collection currently in our area, so please do not donate clothing etc. Chineham was the latest area hit. Always phone any charity if you are unsure about validity.
- (e) Bogus water company callers see article on our website on this and other callers.
- (f) A phone call or card supposedly from Amazon, or similar "We could not deliver xxxx, Tracking number yyyyy (false) PLEASE LEAVE A WINDOW OPEN so we can redeliver". Never ever leave your home open to access by these criminals, even if you are out in the back garden.
- (g) An email or phone call from someone impersonating a police officer/London CID. They say they have arrested someone with your credit card on their person then come up with various plans to deviously obtain your personal details, obviously intent to rob you.
- (h) You may see an email supposedly from the medical group NICE. "Your blood test showed a low white blood cell count and you may have cancer, so click on this link" doing so will download a 'Trojan' to your PC. Please just delete any of these emails as they are fakes.
- (i) You get something delivered that you were not expecting. You then get a phone call from the deliverer saying it was a mistake and they will call to collect. Usually they have cloned someone's credit card and used your address. Report it to Action Fraud. Only return the item to a bona-fide person from the original supplier.

Please try to not get caught out by these and many other scams. We can't name them all, but if they are unexpected, sound strange or too good to be true, then ignore them. You should also consider reporting such scams on the www.actionfraud.police.uk website. If you feel vulnerable, then you may wish to consider the "Nominated Neighbour Scheme" which you can find at this website http://www.hampshire.police.uk/internet/advice-and-information/crime-prevention/nominated\_neighbour.

Our Support Towards Employment Programme (STEP) has recently celebrated its first birthday. During the first year we worked with 69 people. 15 of those found a job, two are in training to become hairdressers and one joined us as a housing apprentice.

One of the people we helped find work was Rachel Pepall. Here's her story...

I'm proud to say I got the job and I started in February. I'm working with kids on a one-to-one basis and helping small groups. In the future I'd like to do teacher training to further my career.

# Electric Taxis Don't Belong to the Future – They're Already Here

Anyone who once scoffed at the idea we'd be driving around in electric vehicles needs to think again. Because with fossil fuels running out, the cost of fuel rocketing, and the well-documented environmental risks of carbon emissions, both national and local government are taking the idea of electric vehicles very seriously.

And the private hire business is also affected by this tide of interest. Recently, Basingstoke & Deane Council became the first in Hampshire to back the introduction of an electric taxi service and has successfully bid for a rapid electric charger to be installed. Other councils are following suit.

All this is very worthy, but what's the incentive for cab drivers to ditch their perfectly good petrol or diesel motors for electric cabs? What use are electric cars on the more lucrative airport-style runs, which taxi drivers prefer to the gas-guzzling shorter journeys? And don't they just run out of charge and leave you stranded?

At Evergreen Consulting, we can dispel myths like these and are currently working closely with organisations looking to invest in electric vehicles.

So, for starters, here's one good reason for an electric taxi: it saves money. With modern electric vehicles you can reduce operating costs by up to 90 per cent, which translates into increasing profits by around £100 per week, per driver – that's £5,000 per year. This saving on fuel means that the short fares are no longer uneconomic, and drivers won't need to rely on airport runs to make a profit. Add to this the fact that servicing is cheaper, there's zero road tax, you get 100 per cent capital allowance on the first year, and the Nissan Leaf purchase price isn't that much more than a Nissan Note. In fact, the electric taxi is perfect for a city environment.

But what about charging the cars? With access to a local rapid charger it's possible to achieve 160 miles per day, with two, half-hour rapid charges. There is a movement, as evidenced by Basingstoke & Deane Council, to install chargers and we'd urge cab drivers to put pressure on their own local authorities to do the same. Some £32m of Government funding is available for the installation of rapid chargers, but only to local authorities which have signed up.

Currently, there are at least four taxi companies in England running the electric Nissan Leaf as part or all of their fleet. What's their experience been?

Very positive, according to Cornwall-based C&C Taxis, which invested in its first Nissan Leaf a year ago and now has five. The company has cut more than £40,000 from its annual fuel bill and has attracted new businesses, particularly from bigger hotels in the area, whose guests often opt for an electric vehicle.

Owner Michelle Williams said: "When we took our first Leaf a year ago we could never have imagined how successful it would have been. The fact we now have five and have hit the 150,000-mile mark says it all. Investing in the Leaf has probably been the best decision we've ever made as a company."

If all this doesn't convince you, then bear this in mind. By investing in electric cabs ahead of your competitors, you'll bag some nice publicity as the first to forge ahead in your area. In the eyes of the public, it's good to be green.

# **Commission as Part of Holiday Pay**

Are you in a job where you receive commission calculated on the basis of how many sales you make? If so, can you still generate commission whilst on holiday?

A recent decision by the European Courts has ruled that a worker must receive his average commission whilst on holiday, even if it is not possible for the worker to generate sales whilst on leave, as not to do so may encourage workers not to take holiday.

The case involved a salesman, whose salary compromised of two main elements; a basic salary and commission, which was paid monthly. The commission was based on the number of sales he made, and therefore was unable to make any commission whilst on holiday, as he could not make any sales. After taking two weeks off, and not receiving any commission for this period, the salesman brought a claim to the Employment tribunal for unlawful deduction from his wages.

The matter was referred to the European Courts who ruled that the salesman should have been paid his normal pay whilst on holiday, as otherwise the salesman may have been deterred from taking holiday. In this particular case, the salesman's commission contributed to around 60% of his earning potential.

In deciding how much a worker should be paid whilst on holiday the European Courts ruled that it would be for courts and tribunals to assess an average over a reference period as to how much each worker should be paid.

This case reaffirmed a principle established by the Courts in recent years that workers must receive their normal pay whilst on holiday, and this should not just be limited to basic salary.

# **Gardening in Popley**

Summer is approaching fast. We have already had an extended spell of hot dry weather which nicely killed off small lupin plants I had in trays outside all winter. Bedding plants are ready for planting out now, and hanging baskets can be planted up and put outside without risk of frost. If you haven't grown seed for tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers etc keep your eyes open at car boot sales and fetes for plants. It will be too late to sow them from seed now. Don't forget you can plant them in large pots or grow-bags. Small cherry tomatoes will often do well on a windowsill if there is enough light.

The grass must have grown about a foot in the last couple of weeks. I was a bit slow in dragging the strimmer out of the shed, and ended up spending a back-breaking half hour on grass that had been flattened. You can probably get away with strimming the edges once a month now over the summer. Keep your mower on the longest setting for another month to keep the soil moist, and don't worry too much about raking up the grass cuttings unless there is a lot of it. Leaving it encourages worms which improve the quality of the soil and retain moisture helping the grass stay lush. Look out for products in the shops to feed your lawn and help it stay healthy. Wild flower seeds and annuals that can be sown straight on the ground should be planted now. Just scatter the seed on fine soil and give it a gentle rake over. Mix the types of flowers you sow or buy a pack of ready mixed seed. The 'wild' random look reminds me of the old cottage gardens when I was a youngster. Different types of flowers encourage different species of insects to visit your garden, and with the insects you will find more birds visiting too.


I have a big problem with greenfly on my roses already. If you don't like to use chemical sprays on them, try diluted washing-up liquid. It works just as well, but you will have to repeat spray a couple of times a week to control them. If you find little clusters of bubbles on your plants, that is also a sign of aphids. Inside the foam lives a little green insect that is merrily sucking the sap from the plant. You can also reduce the amount of insect pests in your garden by planting certain flowers. Your garden centre should be able to advise you on which ones to use.

A few years ago, I did an experiment with watering my plants. I divided everything in the greenhouse into 2 lots. One side I watered with tap water, the other with rain water saved from the guttering. I was really surprised at the difference it made where I used rain water. The plants were bigger and healthier. I was lucky at the time as there was a broken section of guttering at the back of a garage that was in my garden. I made full use of all the water that drained off the roof, saving it in a large plastic bin. I don't have that luxury anymore, so I am looking into buying a special device that fits into a down-pipe fed from the house guttering. It diverts the water straight into a water butt until I need to use it. I also make use of water gel crystals in my planters and baskets to try and save water there. They dry out very quickly in hot weather and it can be difficult to get the compost wet again if it gets too dry. The gel crystals help retain water in the compost and the plants tend to last much longer. If you have large planters, you can also use old newspaper or ordinary wallpaper in the bottom of them. Soak it well, and put a layer of compost in the bottom of the planter, then the wet paper. It will encourage the plant roots to go down and stop them drying out and dying off between watering.

If you plan to go away for more than a couple of days this summer, remember to ask a neighbour or friend to water your pots for you! *Julie*
