### PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN CURE

Influenza is a viral disease causing headache, a high temperature and aching all over. This can be all, but in people that have other illnesses like chronic chest and heart problems, secondary bacterial infections may occur. These can lead to pneumonia and bronchitis, which can kill. Vaccination is the answer.

If you have asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema, chest problems, heart disease, chronic heart failure, diabetes, long standing kidney disease or poor immunity due to disease or treatment and for those who are over 75 or in long term residential care. You are recommended to be vaccinated annually. This will be available in your local surgery from early November. The virus changes yearly so you need to be vaccinated every year.

### **MENINGITIS**

This is a bacterial infection that causes inflammation of the lining of the brain, septicaemia and sometimes even death in young people. It is usually associated with high temperature, a characteristic rash of tiny dark red spots, which do not fade away when pressure is applied using the base of a glass You could also notice aversion to light or a stiff neck. In the early stages it is difficult to tell from the flu.

There are three types A, B and C. The most common cause of death in England is C.

A new vaccine has been developed and is due out in the Autumn it will be offered to all new babies at the same time as their triple and polio vaccines. Older children will be vaccinated as the supplies become available. College entrants will be offered immunisation in September.

Ask your local GP for information, on immunisation for type C it probably will give immunity lasting lifelong.

### NORTH HAMPSHIRE PRIMARY CARE GROUP (NHPCG)

The Government recognises the impact of health on people due to social conditions such as unemployment, low pay and poor housing. In an attempt to address the problems, it has established Primary Care Groups across England bringing together those responsible for health and social care to plan and buy health services on behalf of their local communities.

Our local NHPCG is at Parklands Hospital and covers from Liphook and Bordon to Alton, Basingstoke, and Tadley and surrounding villages.

There are 13 committee members and they are publicly accountable for their actions. Public meetings are held on the second Friday of each month.

# **POPLEY HISTORY**


Popley, which has been in existence for some forty years, obviously has a limited history. Before the houses there were fields, woods and rich arable lands. It is part of our beautiful county of Hampshire with much to commend for people leaving the hustle and bustle of London and at one time the dreadful smog. When Lord Bolton was planning to develop his land North of Basingstoke and at Chineham, the estate agents prospectus praised the beauty of the landscape. Mention was made that from the high ground, where Oakridge Towers have been built, one could see Caversham Heights in Oxfordshire beyond Reading. Also the rising ground approaching Guildford known as the Hog's Back. Lord Bolton did not include what is now the Popley area in his development plans.

Those early settlers at Popley, in the Popley Poets area comprising of such places as Longfellow Parade, Dryden Close, where the first St Gabriel's Church was in a caravan, Shakespeare Road, etc, with the immediate surrounds still fields had the best of the development. In a short while other houses had sprung up to blot out the view of the countryside literally on their doorstep. What a contrast for those folk from London, who lived among buildings and sub-standard housing.

This brings me to a problem that has been highlighted, that is, vandalism in Popley. I must emphasise that this is no worse than can be found on any of our estates. By far, the many families living in Popley are lovely people and it is a shame that isolated acts of vandalism should give Popley a bad name. I have many friends in Popley who have made and are making valuable contributions to their particular areas, to make them pleasant places in which to reside.

Unfortunately, there were people living in the old town of Basingstoke who looked down with disdain on Basingstoke's new citizens. This could only be put down to ignorance for the early settlers under the Overspill scheme did much to create a community. They made the Community centres real meeting places where new friends were to be made. May the generous spirit of those first pioneers at Popley live on among the present and future population

# PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT OF MEDICAL CENTRE OFF SHAKESPEARE ROAD

On Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> July, many concerned Popley residents attended a meeting on recreational land, where the proposed Medical Centre is to be built. All of the residents present were unanimously in favour of a new, modern, up-to-date Health Centre, which will serve both Oakridge and Popley for many years to come and were more than sympathetic with the problems, which Dr Moss and her partners are facing. Especially with increasing pressure from the developers, whom it would appear are saying they will pull out of the deal if planning permission is not granted shortly.

The completion of the new medical centre will of course mean the closure of the old Marlowe House doctors and dentist, Bermuda Close surgery, along with the Health Centre in Longfellow parade. These, along with others, including a Pharmacy, will all be under one roof. There will be car parking for approximately 80 cars for both staff and visitors, which Dr Moss assured all residents would NOT be Pay and Display!

People of Popley are not against progress, in fact we as a community (although we have received much criticism in the newspaper recently) would welcome this State of the Art facility to our area but a compromise is needed. The plans at present show the building and car park on the large green playing field opposite the houses on Shakespeare Road. This would take away a vital safe play area, which is overlooked by residents. If the building were to be moved over slightly, the relatively new children's play area would remain visible, not only to the residents of Pershore Road but also those in Shakespeare and Browning Close. It would also leave a valuable and vital piece of flat green for the children to enjoy playing on in relative safety.

The decision has yet again been deferred to the next planning meeting, on the 22<sup>nd</sup> September to allow the applicant's time to look at the many alternatives available to them. We as Popley residents ARE 100% in favour of this new development, but NOT without compromise from the developers. We are not second rate citizens, we have a community to be proud of and our children's safety and happiness are now and for generations to come must and will always be uppermost.



### **Action on Law and Order**

A meeting was held on 18<sup>th</sup> August people from 11 agencies, all concerned about Popley, met to find a way forward to improve our quality of life.

After frank and candid discussions on subjects including crime, drugs, noise, parking and youth on motorcycles it was decided to form a small sub committee to get things rolling. The first job was to get money and help to start on improvements in Longfellow Parade. Oakfern started the ball rolling followed by offers from the Council, Dillon's and the police. We said we wanted to get the community involved, so you will be hearing from us soon. We are already applying for grant money elsewhere as well. The possibility of CCTV, landscaping and lighting were discussed.

What GREAT news for Popley, all these agencies pledging their support to get some really meaningful solutions for us all.

# POPLEY FORUM MEETING 16<sup>TH</sup> JUNE

The issue was Law and Order at the Popley Forum meeting and it was well attended by the residents. Derek Curnow (chair of Popley Fields) chaired the meeting.

PC Watson from the Councils new Community Strategy Team along with two of Popley's beat Bobbies, WPC Emma Beattie and PC Andy Oliver also attended. PC Watson told the Forum that a local strategy plan is in place, but Popley was not in the top three areas on their agenda.

A resident from Popley Poets said that 15 youths seemed to be at the root of many problems on the estate, other residents, who said that Longfellow Parade has had many problems recently, backed this up. A report from the Millennium Square Garden project also reported these concerns, including litter, shrubs, broken glass and parking. This subject resulted in a passionate debate as the residents of the area felt that the Police response to incidents, was very poor, also they felt that even at the meeting the speakers were giving no answers to the question, "what can we do?"

Cllr George Hood spoke to the meeting and said that under the new Crime and Disorder Bill, (which was going before full Council on the 24-6-99), parents would be held responsible for their children's conduct. Once the Bill was in place, the Director of Community Services would have the power to evict, where there was proven evidence of unsociable behaviour by the tenant, whether the tenant be Housing Association or Private. He added that parents must be responsible for their children and their own conduct and behaviour. The general feeling of the meeting was that the support from the relevant agencies, was not what it might have been, if the residents had lived other than on Popley. The idea of Neighbourhood Watch was raised and PC Watson said this was only effective, if the majority of residents worked together. Once again the speakers were asked what could the residents and Forum do to solve the areas of concern, the reply appeared to put the problems back on the residents as opposed to taking it on board and helping to find solutions.

Mr Bottomley from Stagecoach had been invited to attend but was absent. A letter received from Head Office stated that they were looking into the issues raised at the last Forum. They were conducting a review of services serving the Town Centre and they would be discussing the outcome with the Council. Mr Dyer the Managing Director gave his apologies and said he would come along to a future meeting.

The Forum then welcomed and thanked Mr Archer-Reeves from B&DBC for again coming along to report on parking and abandoned vehicles. In some cases such as Dryden Close there are issues of who owned the land. The Forum was told that a quick access scheme was now in place whereby an abandoned vehicle could be removed in less that seven days! Abandoned vehicles can be removed without any cost to the owner (so long as all the criteria is met) Mr Archer-Reeves said that the number to dial at the Council, to report abandoned vehicles is 845474. The Traffic and Construction Committee would be meeting on the 29<sup>th</sup> June and would be discussing the report from Hampshire County Council, which stated that Abbey Road was 2<sup>nd</sup> in the priority list for improvement, due to accident figures. The problem of

caravan parking in residential bays was also raised. This is a long-standing issue, which seems to escalate in the summer months. Again land ownership complicated the issue. It was shown in a briefing report that more and more abandoned cars were being removed and with the owners and residents co-operation, this would continue.

### Update meeting at Dryden Hall on Wednesday 14th July

The residents of Popley Poets requested an update on the previous meeting, to ensure that things were moving forward. Sixty residents along with three Councillors, Patricia Langley (John Hunt) Linda Phillips (Oakfern Housing) Julie Young (Area Beat Officer Sergeant) two local Beat Officers, PC Paul McCarty and PC Andy Oliver and also Dr Lynette Moss (Marlowe Surgery) came.

Iris King (Chair) started the meeting by giving the residents an update on what had taken place between the Forum and Jonathan Gates, (Crime Reduction Officer). A letter that had been sent to relevant agencies requesting their assistance was read out.

PC McCarty then gave the residents a 5-point plan that the Police had come up with. Hopefully this in the long run would alleviate the situation..

- The improvement/updating of Longfellow Parade in conjunction with Oakfern and the Council.
- More local Neighbourhood Watch Scheme's.
- A full time Sports Coach based at John Hunt School.
- 4) High visibility Policing, with Local Beat Officers and Special Constables,
- 5) Closer relations with all local schools.

It was suggested to the Police that part of the communication breakdown occurs when the public phone and are put through to the control room. This point was taken on board. Many local residents were interested in joining the Neighbourhood Watch schemes. A suggestion to have a late afternoon roll call was suggested as a way in which pupils truanting might be identified; the school took this on board.

The Police will hold fortnightly Surgery's in all the local Community Centres in Popley and this should start shortly. Residents were more assured that with all the right agencies getting involved, it would be a start to alleviating many of our concerns.

It was made clear; that there are no overnight or quick fix solutions it would take time and effort on everyone's part to make Popley a much better place to live.
