

Councillors' Page: The cuts to community transport are going to be so harsh, I had a heart-breaking letter from an elderly couple in their 80s the husband has dementia and he uses the transport to have a few hours at a centre per week and the wife goes to a club once a fortnight and shopping on a Sunday. Without the service they would be isolated and not get out at all. I voted against the savage cuts to volunteer organisations, like transport, as I believe it will cost so much more in so many different ways with the most vulnerable again losing the most. I will continue to fight against it.

There are repairs proposed to Melrose Walk and Selby Walk pathways, and they are on the priority list. The closure of the way through St Bede's and Charlbury Lane came as a shock to all; it is private land and managed by a private company and there is no right of way there. I am talking to the County Council to see if there is an alternative safe route for the school children and residents that used this way on a daily basis.

The proposed extension to Pebbles in Popley Poets is being progressed and I was hoping to have an update to report by now. I am working with David and Janet the two borough Councillors for Popley East to see that Popley gets the best service that it deserves. *Cllr Jane Frankum 01256 819924 email jane.frankum@hants.qov.uk*

Popley West: Inappropriate parking is rife all over the borough and Marnel Park is one of the worst areas for people parking across dropped kerbs, on corners, paths and not leaving enough space for people to be able to walk safely. If you have a pushchair or a disabled buggy it is much worse. After a lot of emails and campaigning the council are now working with the police and will be doing more patrols in areas that the problem is urgent. I continue to press for the long promised vellow lines on corners and opposite T-junctions. There is a drawing that has been shown to me by the officer and it is progressing, but far too slowly for me! The portfolio holder is the person who will decide so contact him and I ask you to send photos of the offenders to cllr.simon.bound@ basingstoke.gov.uk.

The Mayor's Christmas card was designed by Freya who is 10 and a pupil of Merton Junior School. There were lots of entries and Freya's was chosen as it captures what Christmas is to most households and families from wherever in the world you have come from. Popley East: We are aware of increased levels of fly tipping in the area and we take steps to get this removed as soon as we can. It is often difficult to prove ownership and responsibility for the rubbish and we need the help of residents in this. Always bear in mind that we don't want anyone putting themselves at risk in giving us that information. Sometimes the land on which the fly tipping occurs is Borough Council owned but in other cases it is private landlords, Housing Associations and County Council, so you will understand the complex problems we face. The Council's charges for so called bulky waste collection starting at nearly £30 for three items doesn't help matters and we constantly argue for there to be a more realistic pricing schedule. Additionally the charges imposed at the Wade Road depot by the County Council for depositing DIY type materials have made matters worse. We want to make Popley to be an area to be proud of and we are trying to do this with your help despite limited resources.

The proposed extension to the existing nursery at Pebbles Children's Centre has yet to be finally processed by the County Council.

We are also working with Jersey/Guernsey residents to make sure DWH comply with road cleaning agreement.

I hope you are all wrapping up now that the temperature has dropped!

Our number of thefts from motor vehicles has unfortunately increased again. I would like to remind everyone to ensure your vehicle is locked and not to leave valuables inside. Leaving valuables on show can be a huge attraction for an opportunist and we don't want to make it easy for them.

Another topic I would like to speak about is bicycles. I have seen several in the last few weeks across Basingstoke that are left insecure. Whether this is to pop inside a local shop or is left outside a home address, it should be safely locked up. Again, if opportunists see a bike unlocked, they will take it. Speaking of bikes, have you hear of immobilise? It is a fantastic online property register that is completely free! You may register any piece of property with a serial number (including bikes, phones, laptops, tools etc) and it automatically puts it on the register. This means that if we come across found property, we are able to prove it is yours, locate you and return it to you. We find many bikes and tools that are not registered; if they do not come forward, we do not know who it belongs to.

Another great sign up is Hampshire Alerts. Register on the website, again for free, and receive updates from us about your area. We use this website to send out warning messages and updates if there has been a trend in crime near to you, or if there is a message we feel you should know about.

The re-opening of the Academy after the summer break, heralded the start of our 2nd decade as Everest Community Academy on the Oxford Road site. Many changes have happened over the past 10 years and this summer has once again seen big changes, the most important being that we have left AET and joined the smaller, community orientated Surrey based Bourne Education Trust. Our new Heateacher, Alex Russell, leads a complete new Senior Leadership Team. Open Evening on 28 September generated a great deal of interest and was

well attended, general feed back was very positive.

6 Everest students set off on their assessed expedition for the Bronze level of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award following months of training and practice assessments. The students were required to navigate independently through the New Forest along a course they had pre-planned which covered wo days and one night in a totally self sufficient expedition. All students showed great motivation, resilience and skill and at the end of the two days, successfully passed this element of the award.



As the school year starts again I find myself going into Year 11- my final year. Since the school was taken over by a new trust many changes have been made and I was wary about how the school would be different. However, I found myself pleasantly surprised. Our new Headteacher, Mr Russell, has definitely improved the school's daily routine. Breaks are longer, so pupils actually have time to eat and talk without having to rush themselves. Morning tutor is now before first break, when we can go to intervention if we are struggling. Research also shows this is when our brains are most active, so we can retain our information easier. We have no school bells, which helps us learn time management for later life. Additionally, the school is a lot firmer, so there are fewer disruptions in class and learning is easier. I can't wait to work with the new staff on projects, and I am sure the ambassadors and Head Boy are excited too. Overall, I am thoroughly impressed with how the school has changed, and look forward to another great year at Everest.

Probus hears about the Basingstoke to Alton Light Railway

Dale Greenwood gave a talk to the Probus Club of Basingstoke which was about a local subject, the Basingstoke to Alton Light railway. Most people will have seen the small section of railway track in the centre of the roundabout at Viables and possibly wondered about it. It was laid very close to the original position of the light railway


that was opened in 1901 between Basingstoke and Alton.

As a light railway it had restrictions, being built to a lower standard than traditional routes, which meant that only lighter engines could be used and were restricted to a top speed of 25 mph. The cost was £50,000 being a quarter of the typical budget if the line had been built to the usual standard.

It was mainly single track with, initially, only three trains in each direction daily. Stations were built at Cliddesden, Herriard, Bentworth & Lasham and Butts Junction outside of Alton. While all the stations had sidings only Herriard had two platforms. The stations were hardly close to their village names and most of the cottages seen today close to them were built for the railway workers.

The total distance was only 12 miles and because of the stops and speed restriction the journey would take 45 minutes. During WW1 the tracks were removed for use by the army in France. The line was re-opened in 1924. Never a commercial success, passenger services ended in 1932 but a goods service continued from Basingstoke as far as Bentworth & Lasham until 1936. A short siding remained from Basingstoke into the Thorneycroft factory (now the site of Morrisons supermarket) used for goods traffic until 1967.

Popley Ponds

The Autumn/ Winter season has begun at Popley Ponds and we have got off to a flying start. As forecast in last month's article, we completed removal of typha at Appleton Pond. This turned out to be quite a pretty plant but with incredible roots which quickly result in the pond disappearing if not controlled. We also did various tests on the quality of the water (see our Facebook page if you are interested in 'the sciency bits'). To cut to the chase the water turned out to be very healthy, which is great news for former farmland.

Thanks to the help of a hardy band of volunteers over the first weekend in October, we: cleared out some significant rubbish (I still don't know where all those footballs come from!); trimmed back trees overhanding the pathways, improved some of the hedging around the site; and removed a large clump of flag iris which was spreading rapidly and threatening to choke up the main pond. Our most important achievement was opening up a new area near the Tobago Close entrance to the site. This will regenerate allowing a wider range of plants to replace the dead brambles that previously filled most of this area. We are expecting the plants that emerge to attract a wider range of insects, so look out for butterflies in particular next spring.

People often ask how we decide what to do at Popley Ponds. Around ten years ago (when approval was first given for the new houses next to the ponds) Basingstoke Council appointed some experts to survey the site and come up with a plan, and we use this as the basis to decide what we (as local residents) should do to preserve the site and benefit the local wildlife. So we don't just make it up as we go along, honest!

Our regular sessions (final Saturday of each month) will have restarted by the time this article is published. New members or occasional attendees are always welcome. We will be putting together some nature events (including the popular bottle trapping) over the season, if you would like to know more about the wildlife at the site, further details will be publicised on our Facebook page or via email (see contact details below).

Dear Friends

It's the thirtieth anniversary of the Great Storm of 1987 and there's been quite a lot on the TV about it and, as I write, the remnant of Hurricane Ophelia has been battering Ireland and the West Coasts of Britain bringing back memories for many. For some it's difficult to forget that night and the damage that was done; I'm embarrassed to say that I slept right through it, though not my wife who said she was waiting for the roof to come off and the windows to come in! I guess if you ask some of the older folk in our community, they'll be able to remember storms of seemingly equal power and ferocity in the past but what strikes me is that with all our technological advances we can control many things but we can never control the weather!'

We all like to be in control, or at least think we are! It's an issue that seems to govern so many aspects of our lives today, often in a powerful way. We like to feel we are in control of our careers, our relationships, our health, our finances and so on. But what happens when we lose that sense of being in charge, when we feel that things are spinning out of our control? Oddly enough, panic is the most common reaction and people can begin to behave in the most irrational ways – so much so that they seem not to be the people we know and love anymore.

St. Mark tells how the disciples are at sea in their ordinary, wooden-hulled fishing boat with its smell of salt and damp and stale fish. The stained and wet sails are straining under the increasing wind, and the ropes creaking – all so normal and familiar. But as the power of the wind and the waves increases out of control, Jesus is woken up by their anxious panic and they suddenly witness a much greater power and authority than anything in the created world as Jesus commands the storm to be still!

Jesus was actually asleep and the disciples woke him up to tell him to start worrying! It's worth remembering who were among the crew of this vessel; Peter, James and John were all experienced fishermen! But the lake of Galilee was known for its sudden and ferocious storms with waves reaching over 20ft in height. With the stormy waves pitching the boat up and down, and water coming in over the side, it was beginning to look like a Titanic situation, and there was Jesus fast asleep in the bottom of the boat!

When life seems very scary everything seems to be wildly out of control. Like the disciples in the midst of the storm we sometimes react as they did, screaming out to Jesus, demanding that he take notice and do something. It's almost as if we want him to join in our panic.

Often in life we will find that when we have invited Jesus into our boat (into our life) we won't get so thrown by all the stormy problems; things like quarrels between friends, loved ones moving away, financial problems, pressures and stress at work. And if we're panicking about them so much that we can't see Jesus helping us to weather the storm, then often we'll find that we're given a breather – a bit of space – where things are calmed down long enough for us to realise that, with God in charge, we don't actually need to be terrified.

Basingstoke Voluntary Action / Mayor's Community Chest Funding

For the second year in succession Basingstoke Voluntary Action have been co-ordinating the Mayor's Community Chest Funding. Various events and fundraisers have been contributing to the fund with a Mayor's Variety Show on 7th October all assisting to support local Charities or Voluntary Organisations.

There are three rounds of annual grants with the first of 2017/18 recently distributing over £4,000 to local organisations and applications already being received for the second round closing in December. Funding allocated was for planting bulbs in local woodland, CAB support training for Universal Credit, Training young people in life skills, Social Weekend for Young People with Diabetes, Defibrillator Trainer and Astroturf for Archery club allowing disability participants etc. Full details of the funding is <u>available online</u> and it is hoped to improve on the £11k raised in 2016/17.

BVA's involvement with this funding has allowed greatly improved interaction with the local community, understand the current requirements from organisations and signpost to the services BVA offer. In addition it has allowed us to advise all applicants of other potential grants available with details on our website.

Basingstoke Annual Grant Aid and Sports Awards

Are you a budding athlete hoping to raise your game in the borough and beyond? Sporting stars of the future are invited to apply for funding support from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's Sports Grant Aid Scheme to help them achieve national, international and Olympic honours.

Basingstoke Sports Council administers the scheme which is open to athletes aged between 10 and 24 years old. They must live in the borough and be at least county representative standard within their sport. Grants can be used to help with everything from travelling and coaching expenses to competition entry fees, equipment and clothing requirements.

It's also time to get your nominations in for the popular Basingstoke and Deane Sports Awards which successfully celebrate the achievements of local sports clubs, teams, coaches, officials, volunteers, schools and individuals. Coordinated by Basingstoke Sports Council, the sports awards evening will be held on 23 February 2018, followed by a council reception on 27 February. These awards are open for any athlete from 10 upwards who compete for Basingstoke Clubs or for clubs outside Basingstoke if reside in Basingstoke & Deane. Scholarships and support are also available from local facilities including the Sports Centre, the Golf Centre, the Aquadrome and Tadley Pool.

Grant aid applicants are automatically considered for the awards and it is hoped that local clubs will nominate their members across several of the categories.

The deadline for both the grant applications and sports award nominations is Saturday 2nd December.



The Pitfalls of the Office Christmas Party



The most important thing to remember is that at a Christmas Party arranged by your employer, even if it is offsite, is that it is still regarded by the law as time spent "in the course of your employment." This means that even if there is a free bar provided by your employer you have to retain some semblance of sensible and responsible behaviour.

It does not give any excuse that if through excessive alcohol consumption, hidden desires or grudges come to the surface and give rise to any form of harassment, fighting, inappropriate language, unwanted advances or discrimination. It also does not make inappropriate use of the photocopier acceptable!

Another often forgotten, but important point, is that it is completely inappropriate to discuss work matters, other members of staff, clients, suppliers or customers in a social environment. It also does not offer any excuse for drinking and driving. Employees may be dismissed for gross misconduct for things that happen at the Christmas party. If you are a manager, you should in addition remember that after a few cocktails, it is not appropriate to discuss appraisals, plans, promotions or pay increases, as there could be a promise made under the influence of alcohol that you later regret.

The general rules relating to discrimination still apply in a Christmas party environment. For example, respect must still be shown to those who do not drink, have specific dietary requirements or have a disability. If this applies to you then be sure to notify your employer in advance so that they are able to cater for you appropriately. Remember that jokes that you would not tell in the office because they might cause offence are just as likely to cause offence in a party situation even if they do get a laugh from all concerned.

Getting home afterwards is also important. Check whether your employer is arranging transport back from the office party and if not ensure that you have arrangements in place

so that you do not under any circumstances drink and drive.

Have fun, enjoy the party season, keep safe and make sure you turn up for work the next day, even if you do have a hangover!
