POPLEY HISTORY

I am writing this article a few days before I go to Buckingham Palace to receive the MBE from the Queen, an honour which I am very proud to have been awarded. You may ask, "What is this to do with Popley"? The answer is a lot.

The MBE has been awarded to me, not only as the town's historian but also for services to the Community and this includes Popley. This is a section of Basingstoke, which I have a real feeling for. Among the 1000 plus talks I have given, many have been at Popley, to Community associations and to the schools where I have always found the children most enthusiastic. In their search for knowledge about the town, in which many of them were born, they are developing a sense of belonging to a town so different from the area where many of their parents lived in London.

My great opportunity to get know the people of Popley was during the eight years in which I wrote the "Know your Neighbour" series in the Gazette. I too got to know the neighbours of Popley and what a grand lot of people I found them to be,

When celebrations took place for the Silver Jubilee of the reign of Queen Elizabeth II, I as a journalist, covered some of the street parties. One of the finest was at Abbey Road, where former Londoners showed Basingstoke people the exuberant way to celebrate. This was a real communal effort, which still remains so clear in my mind.

Popley people always impressed me with the way they supported their Community Centres, in which I have given several talks.

With the celebrations of the dawn of the Millennium now behind us, our thoughts are now trained on the future. What kind of place will Basingstoke and indeed Popley be at the end of the present Century? I can see many of our remaining green fields disappearing and I am sure, by 2100, something else will take the place of the motorcars, now so often paralysed in traffic jams. I am sure during the next 100 years, we will travel by air in small carriages, flying at different heights and computer controlled. One hundred years ago, flying by air was not even in its infancy, the first cars were appearing, and TV was un-thought of. Many new inventions and scientific advances are bound to happen in the near future.

Treasure Island Playgroup



Treasure Island Playgroup has been running since 1977. The Playgroup was originally located in a house in Trinidad Close, (this was rented from the Council) but for the past three years we are in Popley Fields Centre.

We have 2 areas, one a children's room, where we have a purpose built story corner and constant access to our own secure garden area (with added shade during the summer), this means the children can have fun inside or outdoors. The other area

adjoining the children's room is the craft room, where we enjoy "messy play", sand, water, painting etc. We plant seeds, make paper mache bowls and have cooked jam tarts and biscuits.

We are registered each year with Social Services and also by OFSTED, who look at the areas of learning that we aim to help the children achieve before going to School. Despite this, one of our main focuses is for the children to enjoy themselves and helping them become accustomed to saying goodbye to Parents/carers and settling down with other children. We always keep the emphasis on play and learning social skills – we find that the children learn so many things from these.

We accept funding from Hampshire County Council for children who are 4 by the end of December or March are we are going onto school the following September. We maintain close links with Early Learning Centre at Marnel School, Marnel Infants School, Social Services and Health Visitors.

We greatly value the role parents play and have a parent rota for them to come in during any session. We liase closely with parents and all of the staff work hard to form a close informal relationship with them.

The Playgroup has 4 staff working with up to 24 children at each session and at present we are open 9.30am-12pm Monday to Friday, 12.30pm-3pm Monday and Thursday afternoons. We welcome anyone who wants to call in to look around during any session or you may wish to call us on 414014 for further information.

The Playgroup is for all children from 2 years to rising 5's but if your children are younger (from birth to 2 years 9 months) then we have our Parent Toddler group, which meet every Thursday morning 10am-11.30am.

NORTH OF POPLEY WAY CONSULTATION RESPONSES

Approximately 100 people attended the information displays held at the Melrose Community Centre and Sherborne St John Village Hall regarding the new development proposals for North of Popley Way. Thank you to all those who came along to discuss their ideas and concerns with Borough Council officers and also to those who have returned comment forms and letters to the Council giving their views on the proposals. The Borough Council received 43 letters and comment forms sent by residents, community groups, schools, utility companies, the developer and government agencies such as English Nature and Sport England. The comments included the following issues:

Traffic e.g. concerns about the increase in traffic and the closure of Chineham Lane and requests for traffic calming, speed reduction and junction improvements.

Parking e.g. a drop off lay by at the school.

Cycle/Pedestrian routes e.g. the route should be coherent.

Landscape e.g. retain existing hedgerows and trees and provide more landscaping.

Open space e.g. there is too much open space proposed.

Wildlife/habitat e.g. ensure maintenance of hedges and woodland.

Housing e.g. affordable housing and market housing should be better integrated.

Facilities e.g. the need for a doctors surgery.

Local Centre e.g. suitability of a pub in the new local Centre.

Utilities e.g. foul drainage capacity.

The brief has been amended where possible to take into account some of the concerns raised and is due to be considered by the Planning and Transportation Committee on Thursday 16 March 2000 at 6:30pm in Committee Room 1 of the Deanes Building at the Council Offices. For every 1000, 20 year old smokers, 1 will be murdered, 6 will die in a motor accident, 250 will die in middle age from smoking related diseases and 250 in older age from smoking. The earlier you start the greater the risk.

WHY BECOME A STATISTIC CUT IT NOW! The benefits of giving up start immediately and continue the longer you stop. The reversal of the harmful effects starts immediately, so it is **never too late**. Stopping Smoking is the most effective way of promoting good health. Smoking is the single most important cause of preventable ill health!

TO STOP: <u>Try just stopping!</u> Throw away the cigarettes and ashtrays! Try and find something else to do with your hands when you are sitting down relaxing, e.g. knitting or some other handicraft. **Try not to eat more**, this is the main reason why many people start smoking again - they start to get fat! If you need something in your mouth try sugar free chewing gum, or raw vegetables.

Try Nicotine Replacement! This comes in various forms, patches, nasal spray, chewing gum etc. (These seem expensive, but remember you won't be buying cigarettes). Your doctor may be able to give you a prescription for the first two weeks' supply. The idea is that the addictive substance in the cigarettes is the nicotine, while it is the tars and gases that are inhaled (even in low tar cigarettes) which cause the damage. Once you are off the harmful cigarettes it is possible gradually to reduce the nicotine.

Join a *STOP SMOKE* **group!** There should be one in your area starting soon. There should be details in the local paper or on your Surgery notice board.

Talk to your doctor or practice nurse! Both will be happy to advise, help and encourage you on a one to one basis as you feel the need. They will be able to discuss the various options available and by seeing you as you need perhaps encourage you not to surrender to the weed again.

Remember, if at first you don't succeed TRY AGAIN AND AGAIN and in the end you will! KILL THE FAG, CUT IT OUT!





POPLEY FORUM—MELROSE HALL 13TH JANUARY 2000

The Popley Forum held the first meeting of the Millennium at Melrose Hall; due the flu the numbers attending were down, but thanks to those of you who came.

Doctor Moss from Marlowe House Surgery started by saying she came to Basingstoke 25 years ago firstly at Basingstoke Hospital but within 18 months as a GP. She said that the present position regarding the new surgery is that planning permission is almost completed and that hopefully the contracts would be exchanged soon and, building work would then start within 3 months. She was asked if there would be more diverse clinics, she replied that within her practise there was already 75 different clinics but hoped to develop Physiotherapy and counselling services among others. Dr Moss was then asked if she was happy with the outcome over the problem of the sighting of the new surgery, she replied that she understood the residents concerns and hoped matters had now been resolved. It was agreed by the meeting that consultation first negated confrontation at a later date.

PC Paul McCarty then gave a report on behalf of the local Beat Officers. He started by saying that at the successful Police Surgeries before Christmas a number of problems had been identified. An operation was set up in response to complaints; over 15 people had been arrested for various offences, including theft of bikes, traffic offences, and also public order offences. Complaints about bikes have been significantly reduced. A multi-agency approach to abandoned cars, achieved, over 80 cars being removed in the last six months.

The Longfellow Parade rejuvenation scheme is progressing and the Police are working in conjunction with the council, Oakfern Housing and the Community Safety Team. Consultation with residents facilitates continuity. Local Schools could be involved in a competition. The local beat officers are visiting schools regularly so the children would get to know them. PC McCarty was asked about police visibility, he replied that the Popley Officers have the highest arrest rate in Basingstoke. Iris King the Chair of the Forum said that relationships are still improving between the residents and the Police. Cllr Jane Frankum advised that when people phoned the police they ask for an incident number and if they were not happy with the response she or the Forum would pursue matters on behalf of the residents. Basingstoke & Deane covers 255 square miles and Basingstoke Police are 25 officers short.

Tony Curtis Director of Planning and Transportation gave a brief introduction about how the planning department works. The area of Basingstoke and Deane serves a growing population of over 150,000 people. There is a staff of 100 in his department that has to cover all aspects of current and future planning.

The Development Control department covers planning permission from a small house extension to a large new estate of houses or businesses. The department also has to deal with unauthorised development and this stands at around 2000 a year they also deal with enforcement matters such as dangerous sites.

The Strategic Department covers the longer planning issues such as where future houses, shops, factories, roads, transportation and future environmental and

strategic designs. There are 1750 listed buildings of historic interest that need protection. Roads and pathways are also the responsibility of this department although they are only the agents for the County Council in Winchester.

Tony Curtis then asked if there were any questions and they came thick and fast. The question of road surfaces started this session and in particular the surface that had recently been done on Shakespeare Road it had areas that looked quite bare and Tony said he would get Ian Foley the officer responsible to contact the Forum. Salting in winter was a sore subject as the County Council had in affect cut the frequency of salting. Tony told the Forum that already the Borough do extra salting over and above that which the County pay for and they try hard to cover the roads as much as they can. Salting of Shakespeare road caused some concern and it was pointed out that this was a bus route and a higher priority, It was suggested that the Forum write to Richard Chinn at the area office in Hook and put our case.

Nigel Toomer resident of Tintern close one of the unfortunate people who lost their house in the fire in December asked "what can the council do to stop the storage of hazardous materials being kept in private houses"? Legally the council can do nothing to stop people working on their vehicles in their own garages as long as they are not running a business. For example if an accountant worked from home using one room contacting his clients by IT planning permission would not be needed but if he then used two rooms had signage and had people calling at the house and parking, it would no longer be "minimal" and planning permission would be needed Residents concerned about neighbours running a business from home should contact Ian Smith on 854444 they may remain anonymous. Storing dangerous or hazardous materials, Tony said he would look into producing a leaflet to advise the public. Residents pointed out their concern about the construction of the houses and the damage the fire did. It was categorically stated that this was an unusual fire that had circumstances unlikely to happen again and the circumstances caused the extent of the damage.

Tony had recently gone on a tour of Popley with the three councillors who also accompanied him, he had been surprised at the poor quality of the environment in some parts of Popley and measures were already being put in place. A rapid repose team was now in place to sort problems such as litter or overhanging branches.

Tony confirmed that the council had removed 80 abandoned cars in the last six months and councillors and public were reporting new ones all the time.

The fire at Tintern Close, this recent tragedy showed that the community of Popley is the best, and thanks to all. Offers of help flooded in. Help was received from B&DBC one particular officer Tony Attrill stayed at Merton School all day co-ordinating relief services. The Forum was sorry to report that Tony Attrill had passed away aged 46 and extended their heartfelt sympathies to his family.

The next meeting is at Dryden Hall on Popley Poets. Wednesday 12 April at 7-30 we will discuss the Longfellow Parade rejuvenation scheme. Guest speakers are from The Police, Oakfern Housing, the Crime Reduction Officer, and the Community Safety Team
