

No not Wade Road dump but Wade Road re cycling centre

Yes we all know it as the Dump, but now it isn't. With the build up of the rubbish over the last Christmas period now is the time to think more about re-cycling. Lots of the Christmas rubbish could have been re-cycled, all those glass bottles could have been kept separate and dropped off at one of the many bottle banks. There is one at all our shopping parades and all the supermarkets.

Plastic bottles and cans can go into your piggyback bin or clear plastic bags along with newspaper, magazines, old catalogues and glossy handouts. Foil containers and clean cooking foil can go in the containers provided there is one in Tescos car park.

I have spent some time at the Wade Road depot, seeing what does come in and what can be re-cycled.

Providing it has been sorted you can re-cycle scrap metal, cardboard, paper small quantities of rubble, soil, tins, plastic bottles, clothing, engine oil electrical items and your garden waste. All of these items can be re-cycled and this saves it going into landfill sights.

Some electrical items and the clothing go out to third world countries, with the remainder going back to the manufacturers to be cleaned and reused.

Garden rubbish, i.e. grass cuttings, leaves, shrubs etc are reduced into high quality compost that can be bought and it is about half the price of buying it from a garden centre.

Some items at the moment can not be re-cycled and they have to go into landfill sights. At Wade Road about 73% of incoming items are re-cycled. This figure could be even higher if only we learn to sort it out first.

Have you got your own compost bin? If not see the next edition to see how easy it is and the rewards you will get from it. Dave Phillips

Councillors report

I have been asked about several areas in Popley that "works" are going on and it was thought it might be a good idea to have a Councillors page.

Madeira Shopping area has been having a tidy up and dropped kerb to make access easier for the disabled and pushchairs etc. Abbey road Shopping area is having the dangerous canopy removed as youths were getting up there and jumping down. The walls are being repaired and we are trying, with help of others to get CCTV by the Abbey Road shopping area as it has been shown to benefit all, like Longfellow Parade.

Abbey Road is getting some traffic calming at last, we were the second highest road for accidents in the whole of Basingstoke and Deane, 245 square miles. I hope you agree that protecting children and people from injury is a higher priority than letting cars speed down Abbey Road. It will affect a few people who will not be able to park on Abbey Road and they may have to park a few yards further away, I am currently looking into parking issues

I took a walk with a lady from Tintern Close and Bob Brookes the Cleansing Manager on Wednesday 7th Feb to look at the rubbish around Popley a rapid response team is working at clearing up the mess and as soon as we get a few days of dry weather the leaves that are down alleyways and paths will be swept away. Then it is up to us to pick up our rubbish and dispose of it in a responsible manner when all is said and done it is our rubbish. I was embarrassed when we noticed dirty nappies in the bin right by Merton's School entrance, You will also see over the next few weeks that men are reducing down the height of many of the shrubs, and I hope all these measures will make Popley look a better place as long as we look after our estate.

Popley Ponds had a major clear up and Hampshire wildlife have been consulted as to the best way to make use of the site without too much disruption to the crested newts that are protected species

The play areas are in the news and I have gone on record as wanting us to make the areas as safe as possible. I know this means that in some areas quite a few items will be taken away but it is better to be safe than sorry. I am on the panel that will report on findings and suggest a way forward. I will keep you informed.

The North of Popley new development is ending its public consultancy period and I was glad to see over 70 people from Popley come to visit Melrose Hall. There was also a chance to say how you felt about John Hunt School being replaced with a brand new state of the art school.

AFFILIATED TO YOUTH CLUBS UP NABC CLUBS FOR YOUNG PEOPL

The Wessex Ranger Brigade is a uniformed youth organisation that was formed in Basingstoke 25 years ago. The Popley unit was formed 24 years ago and with the closure of the Worting unit it is now the senior unit in the brigade. Initially meetings were held in the John Hunt School but after the Brigade moved its headquarters from Winchester Road to Shakespeare Road, Popley the local units began holding their meetings there.

During the past 24 years many of the Popley Rangers have held senior positions in the Brigade. The first Brigade Sergeant Major was from the Popley unit. Six more Popley Rangers have also held the position including the first girl.

Popley Rangers have attended camps in Kent, Cornwall, Devon, Gloucestershire, Yorkshire, Dorset and the New Forest. They have also visited Austria, Holland, and their favourite Switzerland (7 times). There have been many weekends in the Crabtree Plantation, Aldershot, Minley and Leckhampstead.

Popley Forum 25th January 2001

It was a horrible night outside cold wet and windy which is why there was such a poor turnout however the meeting was very interesting and every one there thought it was an excellent opportunity to speak to the guests that came.

We started with an update to the last meeting. Stagecoach have put an extra bus stop in the hospital grounds and moved the starting time for the number nine forward by five minutes so that the hospital staff get into work for the early duties.

Jane Frankum said that she was now on the bus working Party and hoped to be part of the new Bus Users Group along with some representatives of users. Jane is also on the panel looking at safety and other issues in play areas.

Our first speaker was Inspector Ian Broach who is the Area Inspector. He praised the efforts of his beat officers who were very committed and worked hard with limited recourses. Inspector Broach said he was aware of the problems in Popley that were mainly youth nuisance and criminal damage. The problem they faced was that people would not come forward to make statements and this tied their hands. The audience then told the inspector of their real concerns. When phone calls are made local or 999 the control room seem to have no idea as to where the location is and they found it frustrating and time wasting. One resident asked if Police surgeries were likely to be reintroduced but the Inspector thought this was not a good use of time as it ties the police up and maybe no one came, their time could be better spent on detection.

The question was asked about CCTV as this is an issue that many people have been working on for some time, the inspector said that it cannot solve all problems it cannot see around corners or stop people/ youths hanging around the shops, most offenders can not be arrested because people are not prepared to make statements. The fact that CCTV was not effective was hotly denied and the reduction of

problems in Longfellow Parade was cited as proof.

The chair thanked Inspector Broach and WPC Emma Beatty for attending the meeting and answering so many questions.

Karen Ayling from Oakfern Housing gave a talk on her involvement in Popley that is now about 60% owner-occupiers. Karen reported that youth crime was down especially in the Longfellow shops area. Karen spoke about the Popley Partnership which is made up of Jane & Paul Frankum Popley Councillors, Iris King Popley Forum Chair Oakfern Housing, Tony West Community Safety Team, Jon Gates Crime reduction Officer, Popley beat officers and they have now employed consultant Euan Ramsay from Market Research to look at the problems and put forward some solutions from their research Tony West told the meeting of some initiatives that he is working on, for instance a trip for 14/16 year olds to visit Popham Airfield and BCOT computers. Tony then handed over to Euan Ramsay who outlined his remit working for Popley. A survey would be included on a separate card with free postage so that every one can have their opinions taken into account. It will only work if we make the effort and by doing so we prove our commitment to our and our children's futures.

Councillor Jane Frankum gave a report of improvement plans that have just started or are about to start: Abbey Road shopping area, quicker removal of abandoned cars, traffic calming in Abbey Road, Maldive Shopping area, Shrub height reduction, Popley Pond clearance, play areas and litter pick ups. Jane asked that if you see a problem then please do not hesitate to get in touch with your Councillors.

The community transport for Popley was going to meet with other agencies to see if we could work together in setting up a scheme.

The time has come for the Popley Community Awards and if you know any one that deserves an award please get in touch with Iris King 411113 or Jane Frankum 819924.

Finally our thanks go to Peter Moore who stepped in and took the minutes of the meeting.
