

There is a new scheme to help those who have been unfortunate enough to have suffered burglary. This can be a devastating experience causing turmoil, depression and sometimes resulting in stress related illness. For those living alone it may undermine their confidence to continue living independently. The scheme is for the needy, elderly and vulnerable victims of burglary.

The Bobby Scheme is operated in partnership with Hampshire Police and receives referrals from throughout the County. At the earliest opportunity a visit is arranged for a trained fitter to come and carry out a full crime-prevention survey, fitting appropriate locks, spy-holes, door chains and, where practical making good the damage caused on entry by the burglar. The Bobby Fitters are uniformed and carry ID cards to reassure their clients and the service is free of charge.

The fitter spends time with each victim, giving both general reassurance to help them come to terms with the experience and also specific crime prevention advice to improve the safety in their homes.

The aim is to restore victims confidence and enable them to carry on living independently and to restore a sense of security within their own home.



Councillors Page: The new County Councillors Community

Surgery started just a few months ago and has already proved to be popular. I have been told it is the first known in the country, there are usually representatives from the Police, Oakfern, Councillors Borough and County, Health visitors, and an Industrial Relations Consultant for union/work related problems. The surgery is held at John Hunt School every first Saturday of the month from 12 to 2pm.

SHOP: The regeneration of the shopping areas in Popley has now started and will take about three months to complete.

PARKING: The parking at the T junctions by the Abbey Road shops has been of great concern to me and the Forum for some time. A letter has now gone out to residents to remind them that it is illegal to park there.

ABANDONED CARS: This continues to be a big problem in the whole of the borough and the council are restrained by legislation to wait 7 days. However the good news is that the government are planning to bring the 7 day wait to 24hrs, and it cannot come quickly enough for me. (Refer to Popley Matters Dec and Outlook)

PLAY AREAS: Up to £30,000 has been put aside as the council wants to know what the public want to do given the amount we have in our budget.

WAR MEMORIAL: I was on the panel and we have never said that we would not mend or protect the memorial, as the daughter of one of the bravest soldiers I know I resented the implication (for purely political reasons) that we did not care. The position is that the memorial has been cleaned and will have low removable railings to protect it. We are also looking as to the best way to maintain the low walls surrounding the memorial and the area for, the benefit of every one including people who like to sit in the surrounding area.

BOUNDARIES: The new boundaries come into force for this years May elections. There will be two wards, East and West. East will be made up of Popley Poets, Hathaway Gardens, Popley Islands and part of Tobago. Popley West will be Popley Abbeys, Specklewood Lane, Magnolia Court and Abbey Court. There will be two Councillors to each ward.

POPLEY NORTH: Planning application notices have gone up for the start of the North of Popley development and there will be some more public consultations. It may be a good idea to have the next Popley Forum on the subject of the new housing.

JOHN HUNT OF EVEREST: there are several ideas including repairing or total rebuild. This would probably mean the new building being fairly near the old. and the old building being used until the new one is built. I think the school may even come before the new houses.

THE MAST IN MARLS LANE (AT THE SIDE OF JERSEY CLOSE): There have been some strong objection to this extension and Andy McCormick our new secretary has been liasing with the protestors and the operators I am pleased to say that a compromise has been reached.



Popley Forum report 28th January

The last Popley Forum was convened at Melrose Centre, 7.30pm on January 28th. We had Blanche Miles, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council litter warden, talk to us about litter problems in the Popley area, and what can be done about them.

Problem areas such as shops and flats with small chutes that easily block, have at least 2 collections a week, sometimes daily. Blanche is considering serving notices on 6 shops in the borough for litter problems, one of which is

in Popley.

As always, leaves were a big problem round about October/November time, but these were cleared away in December: not all the leaves have fallen by the end of November.

Anti-social litter, e.g. garden waste, fridges, broken glass, is a big problem. If you have any neighbours that dump these things outside, please phone Blanche Miles (number is at the bottom of this article), and if possible let her know who they are and where they live. If you are unsure who it is, find out what you can and let Blanche deal with it. Currently the Council receives about 500 requests a week to remove waste such as 3-piece suites.

The best way to combat litter is through peer pressure. A lot of young people volunteer to do litter picking e.g. at the Melrose Centre.

A question was taken from the floor about bins. The green bins have seen a large increase in the amount of waste being recycled, and the Council has been struggling to cope. Green collections will continue to be every 2 weeks for the time being. You can always get a larger/smaller green or black bin from the Council if you need one.

Also present at the meeting were a group of residents from Jersey Close, where there is a pending application for a new mobile phone mast at Marl's Lane. The mast is less than 50 metres from their homes, and the new one will be 24 metres tall.

The police were also present to explain recent policy changes since September. You will expect to see more of your beat officers now that their duties have been ring fenced. Beat bobbies are an important link in getting to know the area, spotting trends, and trying to prevent crime happening in advance. Beats are walked rather then driven due to Popley's high population density.

Oakfern had a representative who took questions from the floor about neighbourhood issues such as overgrown shrubs and parking problems.

Councillor Jane Frankum was also present and took questions from the floor on youth nuisance, especially late at night or with motorbikes, plus when are we going to get a bus from one end of Popley to the other again. This may not happen for quite a while as Stagecoach have just had their contract renewed, but there is a Community Car scheme run by Neighbourcare.

What Is A Local Youth Council?

The British Youth Council defines a local Youth Council as a locally based group of young people who meet regularly to discuss and take action on issues which concern them and to identify and publicise the needs of young people in their area.

What's The Point Of Local Youth Council?

It is a chance for young people to have a say on issues that affect them within their own communities. Being heard in this structured way add credibility to the opinions held and also allows the views to be fed into National organisations and agencies.

Youth Councils have a proven track record of influencing local decision makers in order to improve community services important to young people.

How Would I Start Establishing A Local Youth Council?

- 1. Get a small group of young people who think it is a good idea.
- 2. Arrange an open meeting.
- 3. Discuss The idea of Youth Council
- 4. Brainstorm the possible issues to be tackled
- 5. Establish a group structure
- 6. Organise a launch event
- 7. Encourage new members to join.
- 8. Prioritise which issues you want to tackle first and how to do it.
- 9. Try and encourage relations with the local media.

What are the aims of the Four Lanes Trust?

The Four Lanes Trust gives money to people with ideas and projects which will improve life in Basingstoke and the surrounding district. The Trust's interests lie mainly in three particular fields: Social and Community Action Education The Arts Grants mostly range from £500 to £1,000 but in some cases we give considerably more. The important thing is to provide the right amount of money for the project.

First who will benefit?

Second how much money is needed and exactly what are we being asked to pay for? (We don't give to general appeals or individuals.) We do need care-ful costings for any project ie., estimates for equipment, exact figures for salaries etc. (We do not pay for things which have already been bought or clear debts.)

Third who else have you approached for money? In particular have you asked the Basingstoke and Deane Borough council if your idea is the sort of thing they give grants for?

Fourth who is going to be responsible for running the project?

Our Director, Leonard Treglown and Secretary, Valda Martyn, are there to help people work out their ideas.

A New Partnership for the Future of Public Transport

A new partnership has been launched to improve transport in Basingstoke and Deane.

The quality Bus Partnership sets out closer working relationships between the Borough Council, the County Council and Stagecoach in developing more reliable, high quality bus services, with the longer-term goal of relieving traffic congestion.

The Quality Bus Partnership will mean that local bus users can expect to see improvements to local services in the future. The following are some of the improvements that may be made locally: the provisions of high-quality, easy to understand timetables and route information improvements at bus stops to benefit accessibility, especially for people with limited mobility and the installation of new, illuminated bus shelters the development of future real time travel information systems future ticketing initiatives including smartcards integration between bus and rail services.

"We can see this as a way forward for the future of transport in Basingstoke and Deane," says Councillor Ron Hussey, Cabinet Member for Environmental Sustainability. "We need to work together to improve the accessibility of the bus, and I'm sure that this will be a positive and proactive partnership."

The County Council's Executive Member for the Environment, Councillor Keith Estlin said, "Significant improvements in public transport area a priority if we are to tackle increasing congestion successfully. The County Council's aim is to provide an attractive and efficient alternative to the car by working in partnership with other local authorities and transport operators."

Arthur Attwood MBE 1916-2002

It is with great sadness that I must announce the passing of Arthur Attwood, also known as "Mr Basingstoke", on Tuesday 19th February, aged 86. His death was swift and sudden. A well-known and much loved figure, he was a stalwart servant of Basingstoke for many years, and will be sorely missed by a very great number of people.

Arthur was born in Basingstoke on 13th January 1916. At that time, George V was on the throne, and Britain was in the first half of the First World War. The tank had not been invented, electricity was still a novelty, and motor cars were the preserve of extremely rich men.

After living in Essex Road, Arthur moved into rented accommodation at Lower Brook Street when he was 4 years old. He remained at that address for the rest of his life, buying the house in the 1960's.

Arthur went to primary school in Brookvale and secondary school at Fairfields. At the age of 14, he was struck down with a bout of pneumonia which nearly killed him.

He joined the St Michael's Church Choir aged 12, where he remained as a chorister for over 73 years, during which time he would have sung over 20,000 hymns.

In 1934, at the age of 18, he became Badge Secretary for the Basingstoke District Scouts. It was a post he was to hold for Basingstoke and later Basingstoke East District, for over 67 years, right up until his death. For his services, he was awarded the Silver Acorn in 1977, with a bar added in 1998.

On leaving school, Arthur had a choice of three jobs to go to, but he finally settled for an apprenticeship at Thornycroft's truck manufacturers, where he became a turner on the centre lathe. Such was his skill as a turner that he progressed on to experimental work, being able to machine parts to well under a thousandth of an inch tolerance.

He met his wife Nellie as a teenager and they married on 23rd December 1939. Their domestic arrangements would seem curious today in that Nellie had to share a house not just with her newlywed, but also the in-laws, as Arthur's parents still lived at Lower Brook Street at the time! He had a daughter, Betty, born in 1940, and a son, Robin, born in 1949.

During the Second World War, Arthur joined the Thornycroft Home Guard, where he became a corporal and a Lewis gun instructor. He was often called out onwatches to guard the factory, which worked round the clock manufacturing army/RAF trucks, cranes, Bren Gun carriers, torpedoes, depth charge throwers, and amphibious vehicles.

Thornycroft's had an Operatic Society which was to become the Basingstoke Amateur Operatic Society, which Arthur became keenly involved in, becoming Secretary until his retirement in 1976. His daughter Betty became an enthusiastic convert to the BAOS cause, and it was at rehearsals that she met her future husband Walter McCormick.

In 1951, Arthur became a Governor of St John's Church of England Primary School, a post he held for 49 years. At the time, St John's stood in Church Street, but it moved in 1968 to a new site in Kingsmill Road in order to make way for the new Town Centre development. His daughter taught there and two of his grandchildren were pupils.

Arthur was heavily involved in aspects of running the town by this time, and his name features in studies conducted to lay out the New Town in order to accommodate the London Overspill. Arthur was always one to welcome new people to the town, and with

his already considerable local knowledge, he was a valuable friend and ally to many people moving to Basingstoke for the first time, helping them to put down roots and make Basingstoke feel like a real home. He was always interested in the development of communities such as Popley and Brighton Hill, with his son and daughter involved in setting up churches there.

Arthur is probably best remembered for his journalistic talents. His interest in journalism began with reporting football matches for the Evening News. He was soon also reporting for the Hants and Berks Gazette. With the arrival of AWRE Aldermaston, Lansing Bagnall, and other industries into the area, there was intense competition for skilled labour. Arthur was quick to realise that the world was changing and that Thornycrofts was in danger of losing out to this increasing competition. In the 1960's, he took a calculated risk and left Thornycroft's to take up a full-time post at the Evening News. In 1970, with the Basingstoke office earmarked for closure, he was offered a full time post at the Hants and Berks Gazette, where he produced a variety of articles, including "Know your neighbour", the Gazette Crossword, Flashbacks, and, of course, his much-loved weekly history article which later went on to incorporate "Ask Arthur".

In 1980 Arthur published his first book: "Basingstoke: Arthur Attwood's Look at the Past". The book was an instant success, and was quickly followed by a successor "Around Basingstoke: Arthur Attwood's Look at the Past", which dealt with the outlying villages. The later book is now extremely rare and a much sought-after collectors' item. More books followed, and his last book "An Illustrated History of Basingstoke" sold out on its initial print run and is expected to go to a second impression imminently.

If he was any other person, Arthur would have retired aged 65 in 1981. His response: more work! He started teaching local history classes in the evenings, which became increasingly popular.

In 1989 Arthur became Freeman of the Borough of Basingstoke and Deane, an award of which he was immensely proud. This gave him yet more commitments: mayoral dinners and engagements. He also joined Probus, where he met a lot of high-ranking local dignitaries and businessmen.

Higher awards were yet to come: in the 2000 New Year Honours List, he was awarded the MBE in recognition of his outstanding services to the local community. Never was such an honour more richly deserved.

Life was tough for Arthur in his later years. In 1981, he was diagnosed with diabetes. He never let this stop him doing what he had always done. His daughter Betty died of cancer in 1982, and this affected both him and Nellie deeply. Following Nellie's death from cancer in 1993, his family were worried that he might struggle to look after himself, but after 53 years of marriage, Arthur adapted to the task well. In the last few years, as diabetes and old age meant he could not do what he always used to do, he remained fiercely independent, and only with the greatest reluctance did he ever give anything up.

It was always Arthur's wish to remain in Lower Brook Street until the bitter end, and he got his final wish, dying suddenly in his home following a fall. He leaves behind a son, Robin and six grandchildren, plus an extended family of several thousand friends and residents of Basingstoke.
