#### **Longfellow Parade Regeneration Update**

Outline planning permission was granted for the regeneration of Longfellow Parade on 21 September 2005. This allows demolition of the existing Longfellow Block and the construction of 89 new homes. The detail of the types of homes and their location will be determined in a detailed planning application to be made next year. There will be further consultation with tenants and local residents with regard to the detailed design before this planning application is made. In relation to design, Sentinel has a Design Panel consisting of Residents, Board Members and Officers who consider the design of new schemes. The Panel currently has two Popley residents attending, if you are interested in joining them please contact me, Lynne Thomson, Regeneration Liaison Officer on 01252 788730. Courses are available for Residents on the Panel who are interested in learning more about design issues.

Outline planning permission was also granted on 21 September for a retail scheme on Shakespeare Road (next to the Marlow Surgery and Chemists) to replace the existing shops at Longfellow Parade. With regard to funding for the regeneration, the deadline for the bids to the Housing Corporation was extended to October 2005. We should find out if we have received funding for the regeneration to go ahead early in 2006.

I wonder which present is mine I think I will have to have a feel of them under the tree when Her Indoors is out. As for you men out there look out the JANUARY sales start soon

Parking is a big issue around the estate and I am sorry to say that some people are being unreasonable. No one has a right to park directly outside their house on the public highway. You park at the courtesy of the police and they can take action. In some parts of Popley it has meant disputes amongst neighbours and got quite ugly. Whatever happened to just being neighbourly and talking to each other to come to a reasonable compromise?

I have been asked if Hampshire County Council is ready and prepared for the very cold and icy winter that has been forecast, so I made a point of asking what preparations have they put in progress. I have been assured that the county has 13,000 tonnes of rock salt ready and stored in six salt barns in Hampshire. The budget for the winter is 1.8 million pounds and the cost for a twenty four hour snow clearing run is £250,000. In an average winter there are around forty "frosty nights". As we have been given prior warning about this winter being a bad one it is a good idea to have made sure you have your battery fully charged, anti freeze in and to carry a few extra things in the boot of your car like: blanket, torch, de-icer, and a pen and paper in case you have to abandon your car then you can leave a note. If you are going on a long journey make sure you have a hot drink in a flask and some food and warm weather proof clothing, Finally make sure your mobile is fully charged. Let's hope no one gets stuck or breaks down in the really bad weather.

I hope to see at least some of you at Popley Fields on December 19th from 5 o'clock for the Christmas show. It will be bigger and better than last year with lots of fun for all ages.

Essentia operates the Department of Health's Keep Warm/Keep Well line, which provides health advice to vulnerable householders in the winter months.

Crumbs! Has another year really passed by already? Having struggled out of the loft and down the stairs I will then unpack the lights and set about testing them. How is it that they work when you put them away but don't when you take them out twelve months later – that's always a mystery to me!

In the run up to Christmas we will be observing the season of Advent. On each of those Sundays we will light one of the candles in our Advent wreath to signify the growing light of Jesus Christ coming into the world. The fifth and final candle we will light on Christmas morning as we celebrate his birth.

The word Advent comes from the Latin *adventur* which means 'coming' but it isn't about the coming of Jesus Christ as a baby in a manger but His second coming when, as Jesus himself said "you will see God's Son coming on the clouds of heaven in all his glory and with his angels." Advent then, is a time of preparation for that event. Similar to the season of Lent, it is a time for taking a good look at ourselves and those attitudes of our hearts and minds and lives that cause hurt to those around us and to God and to repent of them. To repent means to have a change of heart and to change direction – that is to turn away from that which we know to be wrong. It can take a mighty effort to accomplish that, but, once we do we feel cleansed and renewed, refreshed and ready.

Amid all your Christmas preparations and as you're putting up the Christmas lights I hope that you will take time to consider the baby in a manger who came as 'the light of the world' and will one day return in majesty and power to draw us all before God. May the light and peace of Christ be with you and yours this Christmas season and in the year ahead.

## Have a Safe and Happy Christmas!

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service, hope that you do not have to invite us round during your festivities and offer these guidelines for a safe, enjoyable and fire free celebration.

• Always put <u>candles</u> in suitable holders on a firm surface and away from furniture, curtains and Christmas decorations.

- Keep <u>candles</u> out of the reach of children and pets.
- Never leave burning candles unattended.
- Before going to bed or leaving the house ensure all candles, oil, incense burners and <u>smoking materials</u> are properly extinguished.
- Before hanging festive lights ensure they are working correctly.
- Never overload electrical sockets.
- Check that plugs have the correct fuses fitted.
- Check the condition of the wiring. If the insulation is worn or the wiring damaged, get new lights.
- Never use indoor lights outside even if you think they are safe from the weather.
- Fit smoke alarms on each floor of the home and do not take the battery out for any reason.

The recent Electric Blanket Safety Campaign run from Popley Fields Community Centre demonstrated the positive effect such events can have. When Basingstoke is compared to the rest of Hampshire, we had the lowest percentage of failures (30% for Basingstoke with the worst being 51%) The testing that was conducted, resulted in 15 electric blankets being condemned or repaired. This partnership scheme has therefore prevented 15 potential fires occurring.

Do you want to test your childs knowledge on fire safety?? Let them have some fun whilst learning about Home Fire Safety, go to http://www.hantsfire.gov.uk/kids.htm Here you will find online games that will test their knowledge, and is fun at the same time.

In September I made a return back to Popley and I am excited to explore all the programs that have occurred this past year. I am located in the school full time and have started working on a variety of projects in the school.

My first project I would like to introduce are my year 10 pupils who participate in a project called the Princes XL club. This club is formed to develop

self-esteem, improve decision making skills and explore leadership abilities. This term we are working on our citizenship module which is called the "Festival of Trees Project". All of these items will be raffled during the "Magic of Christmas" celebration at the local community centre in Popley Fields. 

The Police are committed to reducing this type of Anti-Social behaviour and reports of poor behaviour will be acted upon and offenders prosecuted. If asked to buy alcohol by a youth outside the shop then this should be reported either to the

#### Safer Homes

- Keep your Christmas presents out of view, and do not leave valuables, like your TV, hi-fi or video, where people can see them.
- If you buy new items for Christmas like DVD players or video recorders, don't leave the empty boxes near the bins as an advertisement.
- If you're going away for Christmas, make sure your home looks occupied by using time-switches on lights, radios and other appliances. Get a friend or neighbour to collect your post and draw your curtains to make your home look lived in, over the Christmas period.
- Shut and lock all doors and windows. If you have an alarm, make sure it is set and someone you trust has a spare key.

#### Safer Vehicles

- Don't leave any Christmas presents or shopping on display when you park your car, if it's not there, then it can't be stolen.
- Don't hide Christmas presents or valuables under the seat or in the glove box, chances are someone will have watched you. If you can't avoid leaving something in your car, put it in your boot before you begin your journey.
- When parking outside always try to park your car in an attended car park or in a well-lit area. Try to look for a public car park which is part of the police-approved Safer Parking scheme www.saferparking.com
- Always lock your car and put your windows up, even if you are away from the car for just one minute. It's very easy to lower your guard, during the Christmas period.

#### Safer Streets

- When celebrating this Christmas, don't drink too much and ruin your night. Drink a few soft drinks to pace your drinking and to avoid a hangover the next morning.
- Do stay with your friends and make sure they're safe when you're out. Avoid confrontation and walk away from potential fights.
- Always organise how you're going to get home before you go out to Xmas parties.
- Crowds increase at Christmas make sure handbags and wallets are carried securely. Don't carry large amounts of cash and keep cheque cards and cheque books separate.



#### Merton Rise and replacement John Hunt of Everest School – Project Update

By the time you read this the formal launch for the Merton Rise site will have been held at the Apollo Hotel, Popley Way to which local Members, County Council and Borough Council Officers, and representatives of key house builders and architectural practices were invited. The purpose of the launch was to introduce the development industry to the Merton Rise site and to outline the County Council's design-led strategy for its development. The event was well attended and I believe successful in providing opportunities for networking between developers and designers and to also meet the Merton Rise project team.

I hope also you have received (and attended) one of the 2 days identified for the Community Launch of the Merton Rise site. Members of the project team will be (were) at the following venues (10am-4pm) to share the vision for the Merton Rise site and answer any questions you may have in relation to the project in terms of programme, form of development, the design-led strategy and so on.

Friday 9 December 2005: Melrose Hall, Abbey Road, Popley Saturday 10 December 2005: Base 2000 (behind Popley Fields Community Centre)

I very much hope that many of you will be able to attend one of these two days. In terms of progress on the wider project, the contract for the Main School works has now been let to Wates Construction Ltd. The contract is due to start early in the New Year with completion in 2007, probably now September in time for the new academic year.

Additional structural planting within the school site has also been undertaken with the remainder of the ridgeline planting to be done before the end of March 06 subject to the outcome of archaeological investigations in this part of the site.

The second phase of the spine road and servicing arrangements will start in the Spring and for both these works. The Main School works, it is proposed to close Sherborne Road again with local diversions in operation via Chineham Lane.

The first phase of disposal on the Merton Rise site (approximately 160 dwellings) will commence in January with a developer's launch on 20<sup>th</sup> January 2006. Phase 2 disposal on Merton Rise and the existing John Hunt of Everest site (all of the remaining site) are programmed to be marketed in Autumn 2006.

In addition to the community launch, for which a brochure will be available, a community magazine is planned for the New Year. In the meantime updates can be found on one of 2 websites: for community information view: <a href="https://www.hants.gov.uk/mertonrise">www.hants.gov.uk/mertonrise</a>; and for development and design related information please view: <a href="https://www.mertonrise.co.uk">www.mertonrise.co.uk</a>.

This year has seen tremendous progress on these projects and we have now reached a very exciting stage with the start of the school on site and the prospect of new homes and community facilities in the near future.

I would like to thank the community of Popley for their continued support of these projects.
