

Construction work in Popley

Over the next few months a number of different companies will be working in Popley. A focus group has been working together to try and limit the disruption.

Thames Water is continuing with the construction of the new sewer in Shetland Road. Its contractor J Murphy and Sons will



also be laying some new cable ducting for Scottish and Southern Energy. This work, part of a wider project to reinforce the electricity network between Bramley and Basingstoke, is being carried out ahead of the main project to minimise disruption to Popley residents.

Hampshire County Council will be carrying out some road improvement works from March. This will include working on the A33 and Popley Way. Popley Way will need to be closed for for 8 weeks starting in April 2007 (At the Reading Road end. Dyer and Butler have been appointed to carry out the work of the council





The other major parking problem was by the workmen and they have agreed to put notices up to remind the workmen not to park on the grass verges and block in residents near the site.

PC Dan Carter found some untaxed cars and a dumped one that belonged to someone in Winklebury all of which he dealt with quickly. PC Carter said "The street surgery was a successful example of members of

We were able explain the conservation work at Popley Ponds, the mitigation measures that are being put in place around the new developments and the conservation of green space in and around Popley.

services to provide access to the new school and the first housing land (Phase 1) which is to be sold shortly and development of dwellings will commence from April 07 onwards. There is likely to be a need to re-close Sherborne Road to complete outstanding works, and on the assumption that the recent application to formally close Sherborne Road is successful, this road may not re-open again. An application to stop up part of Chineham Lane is also being considered – these arrangements formed part of the School Application and already have planning consent subject to the outcome of these closure applications. The intention is to implement the works prior to occupation of the school and/or any dwellings in Phase 1.

Marketing for Phase 2, which includes the Neighbourhood Centre which will provide a new supermarket, other smaller shops, medical centre, private nursery, pub etc has now finished and we are in the process of considering some very high quality design proposals from a number of parties. Formal selection will take place in April with sales programmed for March 08 ensuring that the neighbourhood centre uses will be available for both use by local residents and letting (by local businesses) from April 09.

Work is now commencing on the masterplanning for the remainder of the Merton Rise site (land between Sherborne Road and A340), with a view to marketing part of this land this Autumn. Again it is proposed to implement the primary infrastructure (highways and services) for this part of the site, and a planning application has recently been submitted for these works. These works will commence late Autumn for a 12-14 month period with access from the A340 to minimise local disruption.

Finally, in relation to the existing school site, and following the sale of the Phase 1 land to Linden Homes before Christmas, they have commenced some enabling works. With the programme for the relocation of the school to the new campus more certain, we are currently marketing the rest of the school site to ensure the sale of this follows the relocation as closely as possible.

I apologise for the length of this update! I would always prefer to provide you with information when there is something to say, but for those who know me I am never generally short of words!



Merton Rise and Everest Community College, Basingstoke – Project Update

Forgive me it has been several (Popley Matters) Issues since my last.....project update!

Hopefully you are able to see some real progress on both the existing school site and also the Merton Rise site since my last jottings.

On Merton Rise, we are now some 14 months through the main contract for the new school, the opening of which is programmed for September 2007. Following the completion of the buildings/surrounding areas, a period of "fit-out" will be undertaken before the school transfer into the new complex. The "move" is programmed for the summer to start the new academic year in the new school.

As the school takes shape, we are now considering some of the real practicalities, like for example how to ensure pupils (and staff, visitors and community users) can travel to and from the school safely. To this end (and as a requirement of the planning permission for the new school) we are currently preparing a draft School Travel Plan. This will initially identify a number of safe routes to school to be used whilst the development of the land below the school and/or completion of the road network is undertaken. The Travel Plan will be developed by the school and other interested groups once the school has opened but it is important that clear and identifiable routes are designated at the outset. Also there is an awareness that these may change, or more likely be added to, as the development of the housing and neighbourhood centre progresses over the next few years.

An 'invitation only' School Travel Plan event is planned in March to discuss how the Travel Plan can be developed and this will involve staff from the school, Student Forum and PTA representatives, governors, Local Members and also other groups e.g. Community Wardens, local Beat Officer etc. If you have particular views relating to the Travel Plan then please contact one of these representatives (or me), so that your thoughts can be incorporated into the Plan. I should however warn you, that the Plan will not provide funding for major improvements to Popley Way or perhaps provision of new links from more remote areas in the school catchment. Funding to undertake these improvements has already been (or will be) collected as part of the planning permissions granted on sites in the area but the Plan will be important in determining how and where this funding might be spent. So your participation is important.

In January Chineham Lane was re-closed to allow completion of the spine road and

Time to change!

So what has happened in society to change attitudes to the elders in the family environments, some years ago now I heard my cousin call his Mum Mary and Dad Mac, my brothers children called him Terry. When I first heard them say it I went mad at them and told themwhat I felt, they did not like it. I did not care but when they were around me it was Mum and Dad from that day.

We are to get the flats along Popley Way part of the John Hunt development and the Old Codger hates the idea of them. As you drive along Popley Way you are hit by them. However some of the ugliness could be elevated if they were to plant (and I know I don't like them) but the leylandi trees on the grass verge so to mask them from view. It would also stop the amount of leaves we have in the autumn. We all know we need houses so badly. The thing is to STOP speculators buying them up then renting them back to the housing associations at unbelievable prices. They are needed for people that can pay a rent or mortgage that they can afford in order to stop this practice going on. Not for the housing associations to pay out and the people living in them claiming massive rent allowances. Years ago we had what was then called gymslip mums, they had to live at home with family. It has become to easy now for them to get a two or three bed house just for two or three of them. Am I wrong on this? I don't know, what has happened to the extended family that would stand by each other' it is for people to judge I can only say what the Old Codger feels?

Dear Friends,

In the late 1970s I went to see Queen in concert (twice). There were around 25,000 fans packed into the stadium and the noise was really phenomenal as they belted out Bohemian Rhapsody, Killer Queen, Bicycle Race and such like. Afterwards I could barely hear for three or four days – but it was worth it!

Introduction

The Government is committed to 24,000 Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) nationally by April 2008 in support of the Neighbourhood Policing Model. Hampshire PCSOs work very close with Basingstoke Community Wardens, ACSO's (Acredite Community Support Officers)d and of course Hampshire police. You will more than likely be bumping in to me whether I am conducting solo patrol on my bike or working joint patrols with the wardens.

PCSOs in Popley will be growing soon. Whilst I will be the main Popley officer there is a PCSO in Oakridge and a new PCSO will be brought in soon to assist with Popley.

What is a Police Community Support Officer?

PCSOs are employed as uniformed members of Hampshire Constabulary, recruited and trained at police HQ by trained police. I wear a similar uniform to regular police officers and may be seen cycling around with PC Thorne or PC Carter. Our core function is to perform regular visible patrols thereby providing public reassurance and dealing quickly with issues a local level to 'nip in the bud'. Like PC Carter and PC Thorne I work mixed shifts which could be mornings,days or nights according to the needs of the area. Hampshire Constabulary commits to 80% of a PCSO's duty time being spent on patrol.

PCSO powers include the power to issue fixed penalty notices for offences such as causing damage, low level disorder and harassment, fly-posting, dog fouling, cycling on the pavement, buying alcohol under age, littering etc. They also have powers to confiscate alcohol, drugs and cigarettes from people and require a person to provide their name and address. So summing it up we mainly deal with low level crime and Anti-social behaviour.

What about the variety of Community Warden Schemes that already exist?

Basingstoke Council has a community Warden scheme and there are also County Council employed Accredited Community Support Officers within the Basingstoke area. Staff in each scheme has different uniforms and different levels of authority, but all aim to provide additional community contact, and visibility. All such schemes therefore compliment the role of Police Community Support Officers and vice versa and there is no reason why they could not be dovetailed into the work of the Neighbourhood Teams in the area in which they are deployed to the benefit of all.

This is of course recognised, but PCSOs are not police officers and are not trained as such. Whilst the police recognise the huge demand for 'more bobbies on the beat' and attendance at more anti-social behaviour incidents the reality is that demand on their resources is such that this cannot be achieved. Nor is it desirable to create Neighbourhood Teams consisting solely of police officers as they are trained for a far wider range of tasks. Officers deal with Emergency Response calls: protests by a variety of groups; management of high risk offenders, such as sex and violent offenders; investigation into Domestic Abuse and Hate Crime and victim support; public safety at major events, Counter Terrorism operations, Priority Crime Investigation (currently priorities include the supply of drugs, house burglary, vehicle crime and violence in all forms), Preparation of evidence for the Crown Prosecution Service. This list is far from exhaustive but seeks to demonstrate the wide range of roles expected from a small number of police officers and thus to indicate why general patrols are not as frequent as we would all like. PCSOs will carry out this crucial area of work. They are not trained to carry out the roles listed above and thus will therefore not be diverted from their core responsibilities.

So I hope this helps and remember, if you see me out on my bike, please don't hesitate to stop me and say hello.
