



what names were put forward and I believe it would need input from many interested residents to come up with names with which we could all live comfortably. That is of course assuming that there are others in Popley who think that we should have a change. Another reason why I personally feel a rethink is due is that all the new developments in this area are, by a stroke of the pen, disassociated from Popley - just new houses whose residents will live cheek by jowl with us Popley-ites, but somehow separated from us.

**Missing The Point** 

Popley Conservation Volunteers

Crime Reduction & Environment Week, This event, held in Popley a few weeks ago, was surely welcomed and a good way to raise awareness and hopefully change attitudes.

Although I was unable to go to the event I imagine many leaflets were handed out and advice given.

What happened to those leaflets? Presumably they were taken away and read. If they were read, it seems that they may not have produced the desired effect with some. A fair proportion of the leaflets found their way into our Local Nature Reserve, Popley Ponds. Whoever did this were not content with mindless littering

(this is normal in the reserve) but actually tried to set light to the reserve by setting light to the pamphlets! It does not take much thought to come to the conclusion that this probably goes beyond antisocial behaviour and is breaking the law.

The reason the ponds were given Local Nature Reserve status last year was because they are a habitat of a species which is given the top degree of protection in Britain and Europe. To damage this habitat in any way is strictly against the law. Indeed Popley Conservation Volunteers need to agree and report to Natural England on a regular basis about any disturbance caused by their activities.

So it goes without saying that deliberately lighting fires

and damaging the habitat is unlawful. To do this with the very leaflets which have been handed out to advise on how to reduce crime and improve the environment is ----- words fail me


The half-wits who carried out these activities have completely missed the point of CREW.

Whilst you are on holiday it is easy to forget the importance of safety while you are having a good time, but a few simple precautions could save your life. When you arrive at the camp site make sure you take appropriate fire safety precautions:

- Find out what the fire-fighting arrangements are on the campsite and where the nearest phone is.
- Keep a torch handy for emergencies.
- Don't use naked flames i.e. lit candles or matches (especially in/near a tent).
- Fit a smoke detector in your caravan.
- Keep caravans/tents at least 6 metres apart.

Always treat LPG gas cylinders with care:

- Change cylinders in open air and tighten (but dont over tighten) connectors.
- Ensure the appliance and cylinders are turned off before changing the cylinder.
- If you think there might be a gas leak in the cylinder connection or pipes extinguish all naked flames.
- Always ensure the LPG regulator is compatible with your appliances.
- Ensure all appliances are turned off when not in use.

#### In the event of fire:

- Get everyone to safety.
- Turn off gas cylinders if it is safe to do so.
- Raise the alarm and call the Fire Service on 999.
- Get out, call the Fire Service out, stay out.

Useful contact points and further information:



### From Orphan to Princess...

My name is Rue. I'm 18 and a student at QMC. I enjoy my time there!

I was born in Zimbabwe, but in 2002, when I was 14, I moved to England with my younger brother to be with our mother who was a nurse already working here. My dad died when I was 10. I lost my, grandparents between 1989 and 2000 including other close relatives. It was a 'funeral packed life for me... I just couldn't be happy because I thought to myself "Oh my gosh, who's gonna die next". Then my mum died of cancer in 2003, 4 months after we arrived in England.

I thought to myself, "If there's a God out there, why isn't He stopping all this horrible stuff!" I really didn't like God and blamed Him for everything. It made me go nuts because I was so bitter with bottled up anger.

Before my mum died, we went to Melrose Christian Fellowship. I begged God to make her better but the longest day in my life was when my brother and I were sitting around her death bed. It was very hard to see her groaning in pain, knowing that it would be the last time we would see mum alive.

After her death, things were so difficult, and I thought that was the end of my life... "I'm just an orphan now...."

One day, I called out to God and just cried. I gave my life to Jesus. Later on, God told me how special I was, how much He loves me and wanted to wipe away every tear. He also told me what my life is gonna be like! He said "I've got great plans for your life, plans to make you prosper, not to harm you, but to give you a hope and a future!" He took away all the hurt and pain I had and now I'm not even bitter or angry about the horrible experiences I've had. I also came to know that things that went on in my life were not His fault because He wants the best for me, and He loves me! I'm really excited because I know Jesus is with me wherever I go, and He's promised NEVER to leave me; and His love never fails. I'm moving forward!

His love is so amazing, and He wants to know YOU and be your friend. If you trust Him, He will take away your hurt, pain, past horrible experiences and any unforgiveness you may have. To this day, I'm still talking to God, and trust me, He's for real. This Christian thing is well cool! I've gone from being an orphan to a daughter of a King and that makes me a "princess"!

weeded, edging cut back, and in the winter months get blowers to push leaves on to the roads as sweepers come along and clean them up. At the moment as soon as they sweep your road' leaves are back on it and on the paths making it dangerous for the elderly to walk on.

Well it is May and the birds are well on the way nest building, if they can find some place to build. This is why I ask people to put up nest boxes in gardens with different hole sizes in the front of them to take house sparrows, blue and great tits. A nice thick bush will give a blackbird nest sites. We could do so much to help. This draws me on to the subject of trees and shrubs we have so much going on in the Popleys at the moment with new houses going up when it comes to replanting, I feel the council need to keep involved with what is to be done, and not let builders put in twigs as they give no protection to birds. Shrubing areas should be made so the small birds like greenfinches and goldfinches can nest safely. Do not put in small ornamental shrubs, we need mature shrubs and trees and hedgerows replaced after work is finished. Hedgerows take years to grow and all sorts of wildlife depend on them. The list is too long to write about, the next time you are out walking just take your time and look at them closely. On the Popley Matters website we talked about food that we loved in times gone by, I can remember certain things. One thing Dad fried up for us stands out, it was a favourite in the East End, because it did not matter if bread was stale. He would get two slices of bread, butter them add home made jam, put the two together and batter them, then deep fry them. We loved every bit of it, and it was a way to fill the belly cheap. If one of us was ill my granddad made up some kind of egg custard. I don't know what he put in it all I can remember it tasted yuk, but by the next day your fever was broken. It could be that you got better just in case he came in with another batch of the stuff. Another thing my Gran would stick down our throats each day was a spoon of black treacle. This stuff was extra strength. My Aunt May worked for Tate and Lyle in Silvertown. What about the good old pigs trotters and pigs head? Good cheap food at the time. Another cheap food was mutton. Now look what they charge for it, all because it has come back into fashion.

One bunch of people I would like to mention is the Shop Mobility gan. They always give you a warm welcome when you go in, and they always try and give you the scooter you need to get around. If you go away on holiday you can hire one to take that fits in your car. I try to hide that fact from Her Indoors as I do like to see her get a good sweat up pushing me around, especially if it is hills that have to be negotiated. Till next month have a safe May and I hope to see many of you at the Popley Festival.

In last month's Popley Matters I was asked a question by Soapbox. Soapbox said about how clean other countries are and on my travels I have to agree with him. One country I have been to a few times is Turkey, It looks so impoverished with the state of the place, however when children go to school they are the smartest children I have ever seen. Every school has the same uniform, so no one is left out. They are very polite, if you get on a bus they all want to give you their seats. However I do not agree with France I took Her Indoors many times over the water, (no, I could not lift



her to throw her over the side). We did go to the markets, this is where you saw poverty, children with hardly any clothes on. You would think you were back in Dickens time. They were scavenging for scraps of food in between the (stalls, greens, spuds, etc.) as long as it was food. Yes, I know some of this is put on, and there are unscrupulous people running this as a business. They get the tourists to feel sorry for them and give them money. Going back to Turkey you could see children out collecting plastic of allsorts to recycle. They serve a mandatory two year term in the Army, but they do it at a time that suits them, as long as it is after 17 and before 25 years old. They can then complete their studies first. The discipline is strict but very fair. So you asked the questions about these things Soapbox and in my view is it has to start with family values. The parent is responserible for his or her child and the child is responsible for their mother and father. I can say with my own children and another person I know, (well I hope she will not mind me saying it, Julie), two different ways of life but one goal our children came first. If I felt they were not up to behaving themselves then a smack on the hand or bottom never hurt them. Yes, it hurt to do it but that is the way I was brought up and I am very proud of them. They in turn are very loving to us and their children and our extended family. If a parent throws paper on the street so will the child walking with them, because it's OK to do so because mum or dad does it.

As for fly tipping that is a hard fought battle, but if they are caught the weight of the amount dumped should be the amount of months spent in prison i.e. 20 kg = 20 months If I were to dump Her Indoors I would never get out. I would be about 150 years old, bless her. When Soapbox said about houses, I have seen such a decline over the years on keeping property clean and neat on the outside. In the original rent book you had, it said the front gardens and back of your house should be kept cut and tidy. Now you can walk round and see broken down fences that have not been repaired and grass up to your armpits. I know these are small things but they are the sort of thing owners, landlords, and housing associations need to get on top of. Closing one's eyes to the fact that it will go away is not an option, and the county do their bit by keeping paths swept,

CREW stands for Crime Reduction and Environmental Week.

From the Beat Officers perspective we were involved in various operations to tackle issues within Popley. This was also the first time that I got to work with PCSO SMITH

who is the new PCSO for Popley West. One of the operations we took part in was a DVLA Day. Police along with the DVLA identified problem vehicles within Popley and took appropriate action. Between PC THORNE and I we seized 11 cars within Popley over a two day period. This was mostly due to the vehicles being untaxed. The owner does have a right to get the car back, but at considerable cost, and invariably the tax dodger doesn't pay up and the car is turned into a steel "Rubic Cube."

The main CREW base was situated in the Popley Fields Community Centre in Popley and many stands displayed by various agencies including Police, Fire and Rescue, Accredited Community Safety Officers, Community Wardens, Sentinel Housing and others.

Activities were organised for the youth throughout the week and these included a climbing tower and urban street dancer workshops.

Prior to the CREW week agencies had conducted environmental visual audits. Then during the week the agencies tackled the issues highlighted within the visual audits. These included graffiti, juvenile nuisance, vehicle crime and fly tipping to name a few.

## Report on the Popley CREW – by PC Paul Green

I hope you noticed the difference that the Crime Reduction Environment Week made, which was held in Popley from 19 – 24 March 2007. I believe there were a lot of positives from the week and that they will benefit Popley in the short term and long term. I would like to thank all the people who took part in the Popley CREW, which includes staff and most importantly the people who live and work in the Popley area. A lot of resources were put in by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, Hampshire Constabulary, Hampshire County Council, Sentinel Housing Association, Hampshire Fire and Rescue Services and other key agencies.

I would like to highlight some of the successes of the CREW week:

Youth Activities - The youth evenings that were held on the Monday and Friday were very well attended and the activities put on included a mobile climbing tower, basketball with Reading Rockets, a DJ workshop, streetdance, circus skills, a percussion workshop and a disco. It was good to see children and teenagers having a fun time. It was useful in that they managed to speak to some of the CREW staff, especially the uniformed officers. Leaflets and important information applicable for young people was available for them to take away.

**High Visibility Patrols** - There were a lot of positive comments about the high visibility patrols by the police, Community Wardens, Accredited Community Safety Officers and Police Community Support Officers. This provided extra reassurance and many people said that they felt safer and that it made a difference by reducing some of the low level crime and anti-social behaviour. What is good to point out is that I am still receiving comments from some residents that they continue to notice uniform patrols and that they appear to have less problems than they had before CREW.

**Environment** - There was a lot of work done on cleaning up the environment. Streets and pavements were cleaned, lots of rubbish and fly tipping was removed and dealt with. A good amount of graffiti was also removed, including the play area in Ascension Close, a bus shelter in Shakespeare Road and the removal of lots of tags in the Shakespeare Road and Melrose Walk area. Work on graffiti is ongoing and more will be cleaned up over the next few weeks. Graffiti is criminal damage and if you know who is responsible for some of it please report it to the police. Anyone caught fly tipping may be prosecuted and the fines can be extremely high! Please report any incidents of this to the Streetcare Department at Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council.

**Enforcement** - On the enforcement side of CREW 9 vehicles were seized for no car tax and 2 for no insurance. Over 150 process forms were submitted including vulnerable vehicles, stop and account, stop and search, vehicle offences and fixed penalty notices. There were 6 arrests made, which included 3 for burglary, 1 assault and 2 warrants. The

Education Welfare Service organised a truancy sweep and 8 children were found truanting from school.

CREW Base - The CREW base was at Popley Fields Community Centre and a good variety of displays and surgeries were available to visitors and user groups. Complaints received at the base were followed up and dealt with by CREW staff. This included loud music and noise at night, criminal damage, parking problems, speeding, fly tipping, abandoned vehicles, rowdy behaviour, football in no ball game areas, dog mess and youth problems. Survey forms were completed on the public perception of crime and anti-social behaviour. These are being looked at and the results of these will be published in due course. These are still available for Popley residents to complete and you can pick up a form from Popley Fields Community Centre or you can contact PC Paul Green. They are important because they will give a good insight into what local residents in Popley feel about the area.

**Neighbourhood Watch** - Popley currently has only 2 neighbourhood watch schemes, operating in Lawrence Close and Shakespeare Road. Neighbourhood Watch is a very useful voluntary organisation that aims to build stronger safer communities, working with the police and partner agencies to reduce crime and fear of crime. Neighbourhood Watch was promoted during CREW it is hoped that further schemes may be starting up in Falkland Road, Abbey Road and Fountains Close. If anyone would like to know more about Neighbourhood Watch including how to set up a scheme and what support it gets please contact PC Paul Green.

**Public Meeting** - The public meeting that was held at John Hunt Community School during CREW was well received and the people who attended were able to seek answers from the panel of experts about crime, anti-social behaviour and the environment.

**Schools** - Junior Schools, Primary Schools and John Hunt Community School received visits from the police about CREW and the issues that it looks to reduce and prevent. The Park Rangers from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council delivered an environment activity session and there was a tree planting at Chineham Park Primary School.

Although the Popley CREW has finished, work continues to make Popley an even better place.
