

The Sure Start children's centres programme is based on the concept that providing high-quality integrated services (health, education, family support and care), particularly in disadvantaged area, leads to positive effects for children, families and their communities, including:

- Improved educational outcomes for children and parents
- Enabling parents to study and work
- Helping lone parents to access work and training opportunities
- Reduced crime rates
- Improved health outcomes
- A reduction in child poverty

Children's centre to serve the wards of Popley East and Popley West

A full core offer children's centre is to be developed on the Chineham Park School site. As a full core offer children's centre, this centre will be required to deliver the following services as a minimum to achieve full service designation:

- An access point for the community providing information and signposting to a range of services for children and families
- Early Education integrated with childcare open 10 hours a day, 5 days per week, 48 weeks of the year, with 0.5 fte Qualified Teacher Input
- Child and Family Health Services
- Family Support and Parental Outreach Services
- Links with Job Centre Plus

Although this list provides overarching titles for services, this is because the specific detail around what services will actually be delivered will come out of consultation with the local community, practitioners and partners.

Children's centres

Sure Start children's centres aim to deliver better outcomes for young children and families. Children's centres bring together local services within the community and these may be all under one roof, or in alternative venues nearby.

The children's centre approach is targeted at the needs of children under five years old. However, centres may also offer services to a wider age range where possible.

Children's centres will be open a minimum of ten hours per day, five days per week and 48 weeks per year. They provide a range of services which could include:

- Access to integrated early education and childcare for children under five years
- Links to extended services, out-of-school activities, holiday play schemes, etc
- Links to local individual and networked childminders services for children with special needs, including specialist support
- Home visiting service
- Information about family support services and activities
- Parenting support and advice
- Access to child and family health services
- Links with Job Centre Plus, further education
- Opportunities and links to other training providers
- Drop in sessions including parents'/carers'/childminders' groups.

The level of services offered will depend on the needs of the local community.

All local authorities have been given responsibility for the delivery of children's centres. Services will be developed and delivered in partnership with a range of partner organisations across the public, private and voluntary sectors. Children's centres will include parents and carers in decisions every step of the way to ensure that they are truly meeting the needs of each individual community. Local consultation will take place on a regular basis with families and the local community.

Hampshire's children's centres

Children's centres within Hampshire have been based locally, so there should be one already established, or plans for one near you. It could possibly be at your local Primary School, Community Centre or Health Clinic.

Seven centres were created in Phase I, providing services to a total of approximately 5,026 children under five years of age. The second phase of centres in Hampshire will be developed during the period ending 31st March 2008, providing services to a further 42,599 children under five years of age.

The Government target is to establish a children's centre for every community, with the expectation of Hampshire's remaining under fives being provided with services during the period 2008/2010.

No to In-Fill in Popley

It certainly has been a very busy time in Popley. Sentinel sent out a letter with plans for five sites in Popley East and West. They were proposing to utilize "underutilized garages" and build social housing in Popley East and West. The plans included:-

- two houses and two flats in Pitcairn Close/Falkland Road,
- eight houses and two flats inbetween Falkland Road/Gilbert Close,
- one house, four maisonettes and six flats in Jersey Close/Guernsey Close,
- eight flats in Abbey Road/Melrose Walk,
- six houses and four flats in Abbey Road.

The letter gave the impression that the plans were firm and that it was a "done deal" in the eyes of many of the residents that received them. Residents galvanized into action with mass protests. Letters were written, emails sent and phone calls by the score. Meetings were held on the green areas in both Abbey Road sites, and residents from all over Popley came to say how they felt about losing some of the few remaining informal grass areas where our children and grandchildren play. My sons, both now in their mid thirties had played on both of them. A petition was started by residents Nicki and Jo and hundreds of residents and friends and relatives signed it.

The most amazing and wonderful occurrence was the way the children got involved when they heard their grass play areas could be lost. They drew pictures and did artwork worthy of any professional artist. They made posters and banners and they set up a table with drinks and biscuits for anyone who wanted them at the meeting. They gave good solid reasons why their play areas should be left alone just as they are now.

The residents of Magnolia Court contacted me clearly distressed that their grandchildren would not be able to play safely near their homes. Rev Arthur Botham spoke to me about the phone calls he was getting from really upset and distressed people.

Officers in the Regeneration and Planning departments were contacted and asked how they can give away what is after all our land, the people who live in Basingstoke. It is part of our history in Popley and our children's heritage. Assurances were made that no land had been promised to Sentinel. At this point the Chief Executive of Sentinel was contacted and at last we were listened to. We had an apology from him and Sentinel because it was only supposed to be asking people what they thought of the possibility of building these social houses. At a small demonstration outside Sentinel House while the board were meeting inside we were approached by the Chairman and Cheif Executive and asked if we wanted to come and speak to the board. I was nominated along with Iris King. We told them how we felt and that there is a waiting list of a year in Abbey Road. Hardly underutilized or unused garages. The grassland is not theirs to build on. It is our leisure land, our children's play areas, and as much as we agree that social housing is needed we in Popley would have delivered 600 social houses in the next few years for our people on the waiting list in Basingstoke. Enough is enough. We told them leave us our last few bits of playable green. The board listened and from this meeting there is another meeting with Councillors and residents being arranged in a few weeks time. I think we could save them a lot of time as I think our thoughts have been well represented in the press and by the residents and children.

Popley Conservation Volunteers

National Moth Night

11 August is National Moth Night. Popley Conservation Volunteers will be holding a moth trapping evening. On the same evening they will also be conducting a bat survey using bat detectors.

Perhaps the only time we really take much notice of moths, those mysterious night time insects is when they come into our houses at night and start fluttering around the light and we end up doing various gymnastics trying to catch them. Moths are less familiar than butterflies but in some ways even more fascinating. Many are as beautiful as butterflies but are rarely seen because they are only active at night. Unfortunately like so many other forms of wildlife many moth species seem to be in decline. Catching and recording is very

important in order to monitor the state of the populations. On the National Moth Night records of catches from all over the country including Popley will be pooled and added to a national database.

Bats

No less fascinating than moths is that other night flying creature, bats. Since the introduction of bat detectors this is another animal about which more is being understood all the time. Popley Conservation Volunteers are fortunate in obtaining the services of an eminent bat expert who will be present on the night, with bat detectors, to tell us more about these intriguing animals.

The moth trapping and bat surveying will be organized by two experienced ecologists. There will be a limited number of places open to non members so if you are interested and would like to come along or would like more information please ring 01256 429663.

- Containers should only be decanted or opened in a well ventilated area.
- Containers should always be secured by a safety strap or quick release device.

Cooking

- Never leave a cooker or appliance unattended.
- Hatches and portholes that may cause a through-draught should be closed.
- Keep spare/empty containers in the open air.

Leaks

- Stop the engine and extinguish all naked flames.
- Put out cigarettes, do not operate electrical switches.
- Turn off petrol, shut off cock and gas cylinder valve.
- Ventilate the affected space as much as possible, consider use of bilge pump.
- Tie up or anchor at a safe distance from other craft.
- Evacuate the vessel.
- Warn others in the vicinity.
- Call the Fire Service '999' and Coastguard on 'VHF Channel 16'.

General considerations

- Avoid smoking below deck.
- Check bunk cushions conform with fire retardant material.
- Consider fitting a domestic smoke detector.
- When evacuating due to a fire, ensure all crew are wearing life jackets.
- Never allow fire to block your exit.
- Call the Fire Service '999'.
- Call the Coastguard 'VHF channel 16'.
- Give your location exactly as possible.

For further information on safety, either on the water or at the beach, visit www.mcga.gov.uk

Fires in caravans & tents:

- Get everyone to safety.
- Turn off gas cylinders if it is safe to do so.
- Raise the alarm and call the Fire Service on 999
- Do not take risks.
- Get out, call the Fire Service out, stay out.
- Find out what the fire-fighting arrangements on the campsite are and where the nearest telephone is.
- Keep a torch handy for emergencies. Don't use a lit candle.
- Fit a smoke detector in your caravan.
- Keep caravans and tents at least 6 metres apart.
- Don't smoke in tents.

Boat & Caravan Fire safety.

In the event of a Fire on Board a boat:

- Act quickly and make for the nearest landing.
- If you have one, use a fire extinguisher, if not use water from over the side.
- Get everyone not involved in fighting the fire off of the boat.
- If the fire is close to a gas cylinder, turn off the valve, disconnect the cylinder and remove it to a safe place.
- If the fire continues to grow leave the boat.

Equipment you need to fight a fire

- All firefighting equipment must be maintained in good condition and kept readily accessible for use in an emergency.
- All vessells must carry specific firefighting equipment:
 - o Dry powder extinguisher.
 - Foam extinguisher.
 - o CO₂ extinguisher do not operate in an occupied cabin.
 - Nine litre bucket.
 - o Fire blanket 0.75 m x 0.75 m.

Gas cylinders

- Make sure that the valve is switched off before you disconnect the cylinder.
- Make sure that any new cylinder is properly connected before you switch the valve on.
- Make sure the full cylinder is securely fixed into position.
- Make sure the LGR regulator is compatible with your appliances.

Before taking on fuel

- Stop the engine.
- Turn off all heating, cooking and lighting appliances and extinguish all naked flames and smoking materials.
- Close all hatches, doors and portholes.
- Ensure the tap between the tank and engine is switched off.
- Avoid overfilling, check the tank with a dipstick.

After taking on fuel

- Secure the tap tightly.
- Ensure that fuel has not overflowed or leaked.
- Mop up any spillages.
- Ventilate thoroughly before starting the engine or using naked flames/lights.

Spare fuel

- Petrol should not be carried on board in portable containers if at all possible.
- Where containers cannot be avoided only containers designed for this purpose should be used.

Gardening Tips.

To keep your bedding plants flowering longer, pinch out all the dead heads you can find. This stops the plant forming seed heads, so it throws out more flowers. The same applies to vegetables like runner, french, and broad beans.

Cut back early flowering perennials once they finish flowering. It keeps the garden tidy and snail hidey-holes to a minimum. You may find they will flower again in the autumn as a bonus.

Many garden centres and DIY stores sell off their seeds at half price and less this time of year. They will keep good for a couple of years, so grab the bargains. Some seeds can be planted during the autumn for earlier flowering next year, such as pansys and violas.

If you need to water your patch, try and do it first thing in the morning rather than in the evenings. This is something my Grandad told me when I was a child. Slugs and snails prefer to come out in the evenings, after the sun has gone down. They are attracted to damp areas, and so will happily munch on your plants all night if they have been watered just a few hours before. If you water in the mornings, the slugs and snails will already have gone into hiding for the day, and as your plants dry out during the day, they are less likely to be breakfast for them.

Rather than using tap-water for your plants, try and collect rain water. You will find that those that get mostly rain water will be much healthier than tap-water only plants. Try it and see for yourself!

If, like me, you grow outdoor tomatoes and squash in large pots standing in watering trays, remember they can rot from the roots up if they dont get chance to dry out a little between waterings. This is especially important if we have several days of rain. Empty out excess water when necessary.

Have you heard the saying 'one years seeding, seven years weeding'? If you dont keep on top of the weeds you will be looking at many more next year. Weed seeds can lay dormant in the ground for up to seven years - hence the saying.

Stake up the tall flowering plants like gladioli and oriental lilies, and tomatoes to stop them falling over and breaking off. Make sure the tops of the canes will not cause any damage.

Which reminds me - those pretty scarlet beatles on your lilies are a major pest! They lay eggs on the under side of the leaves, which hatch into grubs that can decimate your plants in a matter of days. The grubs are not difficult to see, although you would not recognise them. They carry a ball of their own excrement as disguise, which also deters birds from eating them. Pick them off and dispose of them carefully. This is a pest which has been imported on plants and is now becoming troublesome across the UK. Most pesticides do not kill them.

If you have a spare patch of patio, why not plant up a grow-bag with salad items? Lettuce and radish are fast growing and will do OK in these. You can enjoy fresh picked leaves, and at a good price if you got the seed in the sales!

Encourage children to grow seeds too. Cress grows really fast indoors on the windowsill and tastes good in salads or with egg mayonnaise. Use old yoghurt pots with holes in the bottom, put a layer of cotton wool in the bottom and sprinkle the seed on top. Keep it damp but not swimming, and it will grow in no time.

Make grass heads out of old tights filled with a handful of compost and grass seed. Put the seed in first, then compost, stretch the fabric tight, and tie a knot to keep it all in, cutting off the rest of the fabric. Get them to paint faces on and stand on a saucer (they do have a use) knot side down, keep it damp and watch the hair grow.



That way we know that these birds can survive the winter months. We can help by keep feeding them the right bird foods. I did see the other day that people are moaning about rats because people feed birds. If people were to just do good husbandry this won't happen. Sweep up any seeds each day, buy seed that is not wasted by birds, get a good quality feed, feed tubes can now be fitted with trays under the bottom of them to catch any seeds that are not wanted by one bird but another will eat it. If you have a bird table, get a bit of plastic drain pipe cut it down one side and fit it to the up right, then re glue it. The rats can't climb up then. All of these things will keep the rats and mice away. I must stress, please do not put bread in the back garden, it is no good for birds. The best bird feeder in my opinion (and I feed the birds from it myself) is from the R.S.P.B, or you can get them from garden centres and part of the money goes to the R.S.P.B.
