

The new Everest Community College and Youth Service Building will be opening in September. The College provides a fresh start for the existing John Hunt of Everest School and offers state of the art facilities and a stimulating and inspirational environment for staff and pupils and the wider community. This opportunity has been provided by the Merton Rise development, sale of the existing school site, funding from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and developer contribution.

The new college is designed around sustainable objectives, maximising low energy design, natural ventilation and lighting.

The campus is comprised of curriculum teaching and support areas for 750 pupils (expandable to 900) linked with internal circulation. The scheme also provides substantial community accommodation, a new Youth Service building and a focus for the Merton Rise Urban

Access to the main college and community spaces is gained from an internal street which is revealed at the entrance as double height glazed elevation behind a deep overhang that provides both shade and shelter. On the more rural northern side the three wings of classroom accommodation linked together with landscaped courtyards lie parallel to and step down with the natural contours. Each wing contains suited curriculum areas located to create proximity of complementary uses. Shallow ramps, regularly placed internal vertical circulation including lift cores together with level threshold access will provide an

inclusive and accessible environment.



The first piece of College artwork has recently been installed – a giant montage of photographs produced by local artist Linda Hasking, The Making, Hampshire County Council and year 10 students from the old John Hunt of Everest Community School. Artists from England and Wales are producing are producing additional pieces for the school's buildings and grounds.

Major pollution at Popley Ponds

Popley Conservation Volunteers

Once again Popley Ponds has been attacked by vandals who seem intent on destroying this precious habitat.

Sometime over the weekend 11/12 of August the vandals once again attacked the local Nature Reserve. This time they managed to get into the Wimpy building site and drag over 20 polystyrene crash bales to the ponds where they apparently used them to slide down a steep bank and then split them open.

There are now vast quantities of polystyrene polluting the Nature Reserve.

Below is a sight you would not expect to see in Popley and not a sight we would hopefully ever expect to see again.

Basingstoke Council acted promptly as soon as they were aware of the problem but it has to be said that clearing up an incident such as this was probably new to them and it will be quite a struggle to clear the site. Indeed, the demoralising thing is the even when the site is mostly cleared the remnants could well be around for years.

It seems probable that the perpetrators were children and some questions need to be asked.

How is it that Wimpy security is such that

young people can wander around freely on a building site, taking some considerable time to remove the bales without being spotted or stopped? I am told that Wimpy were warned by a Popley resident that there was a security risk.

Parents, is your child safe? It might be a good idea to tell them not to play on building sites.

Did anyone see the incident? If so why was it not reported?

Who pays? The clean up will be expensive and is way too big for Popley Conservations Volunteers to contemplate. Is it right that your council tax should be spent on the clean up, or should Wimpy pay?

Finally a crime has been committed, in fact several. From a conservation viewpoint it is likely that a crime has been committed under the wildlife crimes act. I am sure Wimpy would also be interested to know who stole the bales.

General Home Safety Precautions

- · Use a stable step-stool when changing light bulbs. Do not climb on chairs and furniture.
- · Make sure all the family know the escape plan for exiting the house in the event of a fire.
- \cdot Install a smoke alarm on each floor and test these at least monthly. Change smoke detector batteries strictly in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.
- \cdot Use guards with all fires and heaters, and keep clothing, furniture and curtains away from all heat sources.
- \cdot Have gas oil or solid fuel heating appliances professionally serviced every year. This reduces the likelihood of household fires and carbon monoxide poisoning.
- · Install and use restrictor catches on all upstairs windows to prevent falls from windows.
- · Prevent bath-time scalds by running the cold water first and carefully testing the water temperature. Children should never be left unattended in baths.
- · Clean up all spillages quickly.
- · Never use electrical appliances with cracked plugs or damaged cables. Never overload electrical sockets with too many appliances.
- · Ensure hallways, stairs and landings are always well-lit and free from clutter.
- · Never take electrical appliances into the bathroom, and never touch electrical appliances with wet hands.
- · To prevent burns and scalds always use the back rings on a cooker or hotplate first, and position panhandles so that they can't be pulled over.
- · Keep hot drinks and food out of the reach of children.
- · Store medicines and household chemicals out of reach of children, preferably in a secure, high-level kitchen cupboard.

Garden and DIY Safety Precuations

- · Only undertake DIY jobs within the range of your skills, ability and experience to reduce the risk of accidents.
- · When carrying out DIY repairs/projects plan the work in advance. Identify risks and hazards, and make necessary safety precautions. Plan emergency actions, so that you know what to do if an accident occurs.
- · Always use personal protective equipment, including gloves, goggles, helmets, ear defenders, facemasks and safety shoes, as appropriate and recommended for the task.
- · Always use the safety equipment strictly in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations. When hiring plant and equipment, ask the hire company what safety equipment is required and make sure operating instructions are supplied.
- \cdot Use Residual Current Device (RCD unit) when operating electrically powered tools and lawn mowers.
- \cdot Use power tools strictly in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.
- \cdot Always keep sharp tools and garden/DIY chemicals out of the reach of children.
- · Make sure all garden paths and steps are level, stable and free from moss.
- · Follow the manufacturer's instructions when using poisons, adhesives and solvents. Never transfer them to alternative containers, as this could confuse and lead to poisonings.
- · Provide adequate fencing around garden ponds or water features, or fill them in. Always supervise children when near water.
- · Before using a ladder, always check its condition. Use the ladder at a safe angle (1 in 4), and if possible, secure it at the top.

Electric blanket safety checks:

Make sure you follow the manufacturer's guidelines regarding the use, maintenance and servicing of electric blankets. If you know of an elderly person who uses one, help to ensure that they do the same.

As a smoker, can you tell me how the new smoking ban affects me?

From July 1st all enclosed public places and workplaces became smoke free environments. This includes offices, factories, shops, pubs, bars, restaurants, membership clubs, public transport and work vehicles that are used by more than one person. This law also means that indoor smoking rooms, still common in workplaces, are no longer allowed. So anyone wishing to smoke will have to go outside instead.

No-smoking signs should be displayed in all smoke free premises and vehicles. Managers of smoke free premises have legal responsibilities to prevent people from smoking. If you are uncertain where you can or can't smoke, you will need to look for the no smoking signs or ask someone in charge.

If you don't comply with this new smoke free law, you will be committing a criminal offence and liable to be served with a fixed penalty notice or face a fine. People smoking in smoke free premises or work vehicles face a £50 fixed penalty or a fine of up to £200. There are stiffer penalties for people managing premises and vehicles.

Local councils are responsible for enforcing this new law in England. A telephone line (0800 587 1667) is also in operation to enable members of the public to report possible breaches of the law. This information will be passed to local councils to follow-up as appropriate.
