Community Wardens: my sincerest thanks to the Gazette for their coverage of our 20 Community Wardens in Basingstoke, whose jobs are under threat from the Council.

The wardens do a fantastic job in Popley and are extremely popular. We have managed to gather over 1,000 signatures to our petition to Save the Wardens. Readers who wish to sign can do so on-line at www.petitiononline.com/wardens.

Since their introduction in Popley in 2004, Community Wardens have worked extremely well with the local beat officers and latterly ACSO's and PCSO's. Everyone who works with the Wardens has nothing but the highest praise for them. Their wide range of skills and ability to co-ordinate the work of many agencies at local level has reaped huge dividends for Popley.

Before the Wardens were introduced, Popley was the 2nd highest crime beat in Basingstoke (after the Town Centre) and had 125 out of the 400 arson incidents reported in Basingstoke in 2002/3. In their first year of operation (2004), the Wardens helped cut crime by 28%. In 2004/5, thanks largely to preventative work in the community spearheaded by the Wardens, we had just 1 burglary in the whole of Popley.

The above statistics and others were used to help Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council attain a Beacon Award in 2007 for tackling anti-social behaviour. The Wardens have won numerous other national awards, and were cited as one of the top 10 examples nationally of good practice in fire safety and arson reduction initiative. Their good work has attracted the attention of numerous Government departments including the Home Office, the former Office of the Deputy Prime Minister and the Government Office of the South East.

It is therefore palpably absurd that their jobs should now be under threat and seriously challenges the credibility that Basingstoke had worked hard to obtain for tackling crime and anti-social behaviour and community development.

Flooding: we have had a very large number of people approach us with accounts of flooding, many of whom had their houses flooded. We are in the process of presenting a report to the council on flood damage and recommendations for drainage impovements. As if this was not enough, we recently had a sewer main burst in Dryden/Chaucer Close .This was by no means the first we've had in Popley but the response of Thames Water was uniquely disappointing in that they apparently refused to clear up the mess, and when it was cleaned up, they only did half the job. Leaving traces of raw sewage in puiblic places where children can play is completely unacceptable. They are responsible for taking sewage away and take moeny from your water bills to do it. Not since the London cholera epidemic of 1854 has it been acceptable to have raw sewage in the streets.

Flats: the Tories insist on building 448 flats and micro-flats at Gresley Road in a totally inapproporiate site and keeping you in the dark about it. It's not their money, it's yours, and we think it's very wrong of them to keep you in the dark about it. In the past 5 years we have had approaching 2,000 flats built in Basingstoke, with more on the way. It's obvious the market is saturated, with prices in Crown Heights down by as much as 25%, when house prices continue to rise. We only ever built 1,000 flats in the entire New Town build in the 60's and 70's. Most of them are gone, most of the rest are going, but it't taken over 30 years to get rid of them. We are storing up massive problems for the future. Gresley Road will make Longfellow Parade and Faroe and Maldive look like luxury developments in comparison. It has to be stopped in its tracks.

Neighbourcare: the Tories are cutting funding to this excellent voluntary organisation which does so much in the community, and it could fold as a result. We are deeply disappointed by this. Just another example of a council administration which refuses to listen.

Buses: don't be lulled into a false sense of security, their funding has only been saved until May 2008. We will need to continue our fight to make sure we keep what bus services we have and get a decent set of new services for the new build, not least a proper cross-Popley service and one which connects Popley with the railway station. But because we have 2,000 new houses being built we are much better placed than the other estates in Basingstoke. Buckskin has lost its evening service and has little prospect of getting it back - we see this as a warning of what might happen in Popley if we are not careful.

Many of you will remember Tommy Handley and the show I.T.M.A

I thought I would use this to remind you to stay safe this winter. Put this on the wall and I am sure it will help you all.

If you are at home all day in the Winter keep warm. Get your heating checked, put on an extra jumper or an extra blanket on the bed. Make sure you have at least one hot meal a day and plenty of hot drinks. Try thermal socks and although it sounds silly if it is bitterly cold put a hat on, yes even indoors.

Take care if someone comes to the door. On these dark nights do not open it unless you know who is there. If they are from one of the utility companies get them to put their ID through the letter box. Also remember never to sign any thing without getting it checked out by family or a neighbour. If you are not sure don't sign it!

Make sure the house is safe. Loose carpets can break bones; if you fall you could lay there for sometime before help comes. Keep your paths clear; get a friendly neighbour to help if necessary. Most will be happy to help but I do appreciate not all will. Keep windows and doors locked but plan the way of getting out or help in case of a fire. Switch gas and electric fires off before going to bed and unplug sockets you don't need. The "night" lights for halls etc are useful; they come on when it gets dark.

Arrange for a friend or family member to have a spare key and keep that number near the phone in case of emergency. Make sure you replace or get rid of worn rugs, also replace those tatty slippers. Having worked at the hospital for many years I know just how many elderly and infirm people end up in hospital because of bad footwear. Make sure you keep your main walkways clear.

This may sound like granny teaching you to suck eggs but it doesn't hurt to give gentle advice and reminders to people.

Sherborne St John Parish Council

Looking at the notes for the November issue of The Villager, it is clear that despite subprime mortgages, natural disasters and other global set-backs, there are still many good reasons for living in the village of Sherborne St John. The Seniors Club is going from strength to strength, and the Parish Council was delighted to be able to support their Christmas lunch. The new Village Hall is proving to be a great success - providing the location for a large number of local activities, as well as weddings, fashion shows and other functions. With its finances in order, the Parish Council was pleased to be able to pay off a further £10,000 from the mortgage account in November. The Football Club continues to be one of the most successful clubs in the area, and the pitches remain second to none – thanks to the hard work of Terry and his team through the summer.

It is also important to mention other unsung heroes, in particular John Edwards, Judith Dalmady and Ian Todd who continue to run the Chute Pavilion so efficiently. The Chute has been a huge success since it opened - and very economical to run. It looks just as good as ever, but after 10 years (and a bit like St Pancras Station!), it now requires a little 'tlc' to restore it to full glory. The Parish Council will be looking to see how it can support improvements in 2008.

Meanwhile Phase 1 improvements to the Cemetery were completed in time for Remembrance Sunday – with trimming and remedial works to the yew trees, repainting of the memorial inscriptions and re-laying of the gravel, as well as tree maintenance around the perimeter. Next year we hope to complete renovation by installing a new gateway and fencing. Our thanks to Basingstoke and Deane BC for providing grant aid - and further thanks to Peter Marrison and the PCC (Parochial Church Council) for organising very successful working parties to keep the cemetery vegetation under control.

There are a few outstanding local problems however. Firstly, the remarkably unobtrusive, central location for the Bottle Bank in the Village Hall car park, is not to everyone's liking. The Parish Council is taking a scientific approach to see how much noise it is generating - and decide what can be done to maintain the facility without the unwelcome noise. Generating the information is clearly difficult, but we hope to have this to hand before The Villager goes to press – to allow a considered decision. In the event, it may be necessary to change the bottle bank type, or remove it from the Village Hall altogether.

The retrospective planning application, to use Jennings Yard in Monk Sherborne Rd. as a builder's yard, continues to upset local residents. The Parish Council certainly objects to the storage of steel container units in this rural location.

Discussion of A340 Traffic Calming measures seem to drag on - and are certainly developing too slowly for villagers living on the main road. However thanks to Hampshire CC, SID has arrived! albeit temporarily. SID is the Speed Indicator Display that tells motorists they are speeding; we look forward to understanding how effective it is in slowing traffic. Meanwhile Hampshire CC is also looking to improve the traffic island opposite the Methodist Chapel next year.

Finally, this is the first time the Parish Council notes will be published in 'Popley Matters'. We extend a further big welcome to all the new residents to the Parish in Marnell Park and Merton Rise. We hope you enjoy your new home and please do support local activities and institutions!

Don't forget – you are always welcome at Parish Council meetings. The next meeting is on Monday 17th December at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.





DON'T HAVE A RUBBISH CHRISTMAS

2007 has been a good year for recycling in Basingstoke, with our recycling rate climbing every month. Please keep up the good work and recycle all you can over the festive period. Here are a few suggestions to help you remember just how much you can recycle.

When you've unwrapped all your presents on Christmas Day, don't forget to save all the gift bags and boxes so they can be used again next year. Gift wrap cannot be recycled so please put it in your rubbish bin. Gift wrap is often made of poor quality paper and can be layered with foil and plastic or covered in sticky tape and ribbons, all of which makes it unsuitable for recycling. Any cardboard boxes left over from presents can be recycled through your kerbside recycling collection but please remember to break up any large boxes first.

At the end of the day, you may find yourself surrounded by empty drinks bottles! Some 14 million glass bottles will be opened in Hampshire over Christmas so remember to recycle yours at your local bottle bank. Any plastic bottles from squash and fizzy drinks can also be recycled through your kerbside recycling collection but please take the tops off first.

When the festivities are over and it's time to take the decorations down, don't forget to recycle your Christmas cards by putting them in your recycling bin. Alternatively, the Woodland Trust offers collection boxes for greetings cards which can be found at all WH Smith, Tesco, TK Maxx and Marks and Spencer's stores.

Almost a quarter of a million real Christmas trees will be decorated in Hampshire this year. When you take yours down, be sure to recycle it at your nearest drop-off point anytime between January 3 and January 17. Once collected all of the trees are shredded and composted locally to make the high quality soil conditioner, Pro-Grow.

Make the most of your kerbside recycling collection over Christmas. It's an easy way to recycle all your TV listings, magazines and envelopes from Christmas cards as well as cardboard boxes, plastic bottles and food and drinks cans. Should you receive any unwanted gifts, donate them to a charity shop and give somebody else the chance to use them rather than throwing them away.

St John Ambulance Hampshire is launching its unique bathing service in northern Hampshire and is looking for new clients and new volunteers.

The popular service, which runs in Southampton, the New Forest and Havant, relies on a team of dedicated volunteers who bath people unable to get in or out of a bath on their own.

The service is a lifeline for its clients - mostly elderly and frail people – but receives no Social Services help. It survives by voluntary donations and fundraising.

Last year, the 45 volunteers ran 2,000 baths in Hampshire and used nearly 200 litres of bubble bath!

Jill Abrahams, who co-ordinates the service, said: 'We've been looking forward to opening up in Basingstoke because there are people here who need our help.

'The luxury of a long soak in a nice hot tub is something most of us take for granted but some people physically can't get in or out of a bath. We're here to help them and they really appreciate what we do.'

She added: 'If anyone was able to help us equip the suite we would be very grateful – we need a fridge, washing machine, tumble dryer, dishwasher, microwave, towels – and of course bubble bath!'

The volunteers are members of St John Ambulance's Social Care team and many also help run monthly outings for the

clients.

Jill, who works as a nurse on a stroke unit, said: 'Many of our clients live alone so their regular bath and outings provide a really sociable day out – and that is just as important.'

The bathing service is due to start next year and will take place on Wednesdays at the St John Ambulance Basingstoke headquarters at Knights Park Road, Devonshire Industrial Estate.

Developments in Basing Wood

Popley Conservation Group

I hope that many of you managed to get along to the Forestry Commission consultation day, held recently at Popley Fields Community Centre. Changes are taking place in Basing Wood and it appears that more recreational activities are to be encouraged in the future. This should be of benefit to people who live in Popley.

However Basing Wood is extremely rich in a diverse range of wildlife, more so than almost any other woodland around Basingstoke.

Whilst the use of Basing Wood for recreation is to be encouraged, many of us are concerned that any development should be carried out sensitively so as not damage the wildlife.

The Forestry Commission have left a display in Popley Fields Community Centre so if you would still like to have your say about developments in Basing Wood do visit the centre and fill out a form.

It has been a slow start to the winter conservation season for the Popley Conservation Group. It all started, or rather didn't start, when we realised that the Natural England licenses we have been working with, were no longer valid for the

The push bikes were in the rear garden when person(s) have entered into the garden and took the bikes without permission.



Merton Rise, Everest Community College and the former John Hunt of Everest Community School site – Project Update

Yuletide Greetings! It feels a long time since my last update so this is likely to be relatively lengthy (no change there I hear some say!) – my apologies.

Everest Community School

Following the relocation to the new site in September, I was pleased to attend the formal opening event held on November 1st and received kind mention in both the Leader's and Headteacher's speeches for my role and that of my team in making this project happen. For those of you that took the opportunity to visit the school on the Open Evening held earlier in the term (some 2000 + people queuing down Popley Way) ["if you build it, they will come" – you need to be a "Field of Dreams"/Kevin Costner fan to understand this reference!], I am sure you will agree that the new campus is very impressive and will provide a fantastic learning and community/leisure facility for residents of both Popley and Merton Rise for generations to come.

Former John Hunt of Everest School site

Shortly after the transfer to the new site, the County Council completed an unconditional sale of its remaining ownership at the former school site. The Borough Council also sold a smaller area of land located on the southern side of Carpenter's Down/Popley Way junction. The sale(s) were to Taylor Wimpey who have recently submitted a reserved matters application for the combined ownership for approximately 245 units (remaining dwelling provision under the 2004 outline permission) and this will be considered by the Planning Authority early in the New Year.

The developer of the Phase 1 land has made good progress with all of the first release now sold. As their scheme progresses, I hope you will agree that their gateway scheme is very impressive and that it will make an important contribution to the regeneration of the Popley Way frontage.

Merton Rise

There has been steady progress over the past 6 or so months on the wider Merton Rise project.

- (a) *Phase 1*: Alongside the completion of the school, the Phase 1 developers, Miller Homes and Wimpey Homes have made good progress with occupations of the first units anticipated early in the New Year. The park that forms part of Phase 1 is also nearing completion with only parts of the artwork to be completed in March when the weather is less wet and warmer. The Park is to be made available for use in the Spring by new residents of Merton Rise and also existing residents of Popley. An informal consultation on the naming of the Park will take place in the New Year.
- (b) Phase 2: Following selection of two developers for this important phase of the site, which includes up to 300 dwellings and the Neighbourhood Centre, we have been working closely with each team to develop their schemes of development and hope that reserved matters applications for the various sub-parcels will be submitted towards the end of January. Some of you will have read that the PCT have confirmed they no longer need a surgery facility within the Neighbourhood Centre and advise that existing and new facilities at Park Prewett will meet the needs. Although this is disappointing, without a requirement or funding, the County Council cannot procure a facility independently. We are working with the developer to identify other potential uses for the "former medical building" and these might include premises for a veterinary practice and also accommodation for a number of community office type uses. The supermarket forms the heart of the Neighbourhood Centre and we are in discussion with the Planning Authority and end users as to the nature and size of this proposed use and how this relates to the planning permission we currently have for the site.

- (c) *Phases 3-5*: Marketing for part of the land to the west of Sherborne Road, Phase 3 (for a further 225 dwellings) has recently commenced although the outcome of this marketing exercise will not be known until the Spring. Marketing of the remaining phases of development on the site will take place next Summer.
- (d) *Procurement Update*: Following successful applications to GOSE, the diversion works to Chineham Lane and formal closure of Sherborne Road have now been completed. With the school open and the Phase 1 developments well advanced, we have opened parts of the newly constructed Spine Road for use as public highway. There continue to be "teething" problems regarding parking of contractors' and parents vehicles on the Spine Road, and navigation around the network with confusion over some of the local road names. Additional land has been made available to the developers to remove their vehicles from the road/footways and it is likely that parking restrictions will be introduced along parts of the Spine Road to ensure that safe and unimpeded movements can occur. Longer term, as the Phase 2 development comes on stream the remainder of the Spine Road between Sherborne Road and Chineham Lane will be opened, again with similar parking restrictions.

Road names of existing roads and the new roads within Merton Rise are under discussion with the Borough Council to ensure that a "family" of names can be identified to relate to Merton Rise and the related Walter de Merton background, and importantly to avoid Sat Nav confusion! Some of these will be agreed with the Borough Council and others as required may need a period of consultation to change names of existing roads. We will keep you posted of these arrangements.

The construction of last part of the Spine Road (between Sherborne Road and the A340) is due to be commenced next month as part of a wider improvement scheme being undertaken by the Highway Authority to the A339/A340 Ringway roundabout. The selected contractor Carillion will establish their site compound within the Merton Rise site on the A340 frontage in December and works are due to start 8th January 2008 and last for a 12 month period. (e) Consultation/Information Strategy: In addition to the two existing websites for the Merton Rise project (www.mertonrise.co.uk and info@mertonrise.co.uk), we are currently preparing our third community magazine (due out in the New Year) to provide a more visual update on the project, to support the Phase 2 planning applications and to undertake a number of low key consultations e.g. naming of the Phase 1 park.

Thank You

After nearly 9 years of involvement with the North Popley/Merton Rise project, and 4 years as the project manager, the time has come for my role to change and for me to "pass on the baton" to others to complete the project. My key role was always to ensure the new school had opened and all of the infrastructure had been secured (and/or started construction) and with opening of the school and commencement of the last part of the Spine Road my job has largely been done! I feel immensely privileged to have been given the chance to work on such a fantastic project. It has been a very complex, sometimes a fustrating, but always a rewarding time. Thank you for all of your support over the years. This may therefore be my last contribution to Popley Matters but I will ensure that my successor(s) continue to update you on a regular basis.
