


I thought that I would say good luck to all of the new Year 7's that will be starting secondary

month dominated by Longfellow Parade and Faroe/Maldive Close. There have been problems at Longfellow with lorries accessing the Phase 2 site, and with utility developer money that has specially been put contractors digging up paths, then going away and leaving them mid-job, with no guaranteed resumption date. Our thanks to all of you for being so patient.

Residents have raised concerns about the Faroe/Maldive scheme, mainly the car park by the shops, the loading bay, green space, and through traffic.We've had two residents' meetings with Sentinel, and on June 10 Mary and I met the Chief Executive. This meeting was more productive - they are considering changes to the shops area but nothing is costed or finalised yet. The scheme will be in several phases, with the Maldive Road flats coming down in early 2009, and Faroe Close about a year later, with the work round the shops left until last. Any changes will require a second planning application. We expect the first one to be heard on August 20th. 

Basingstoke Air Scout Group

The Air Scout Group has been registered since April 1978. It 'sprang' from the 2nd Basingstoke (Basingstoke Air Scouts) which opened in 1976 when it became too large to continue as one group and at one time met in Oakridge Methodist Church Hall. The group moved to Carpenters Down in 1977 having erected a wooden hut as its own very first Headquarters. Sadly, the first hut was burnt to the ground in 1984. Not to be deterred, the leaders found another hut and after a lot of hard work the group had its own Headquarters once more! By the mid 1990's the hut was way past its lifespan and the Group embarked on a new building project. It took five years to raise sufficient funds and obtain planning permission. The building cost £164,000; £64,000 was donated by the National Lottery Charities Fund; Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council donated £25,000 and Hampshire County Council £7,000. The Group itself raised over £65,000 to fulfil its dream. The remainder of the money came from charitable trusts and donations from local companies. Base 2000 was formally opened by Wing Commander D.Prowse, accompanied by the Group Scout Leader (Jan Saunders) and the Group Chairman (Ken Lane) in May 2001.

Today the Air Scouts have a Headquarters of which they are justly proud. It is used every day by a variety of community users and can be hired for private functions, meetings and fund-raising events subject to availability. Booking enquiries should be made to Pete or Jan Saunders on (01256) 410514 or base 2000. bookings @ntlworld.com. Hire rates start at £3.50 per hour for the smaller hall.

Over the years the air activity content of the programme within the Group has had to diminish due to increasing restrictions with regard to young people having access to flight aprons, airfields and aerodromes. Programmes still have a leaning towards flight and flying but the Group also offers the full range of badges and challenges to its members, and was unique in 2007 when every single member of the Group achieved the Environmental Challenge Award.

Recently, all sections enjoyed the Tri-District Scout Activity Day in June. Radar Speed Shot and inflateable Goalie proved very popular; the Climbing Towers, Batak, a 6-lane Scalextric track, circus skills and archery were fun and there were lots of other things to try out. Some members had a go on the 'zip line' even though it was a bit scary whizzing at alarming speed down the line! Arena events included falconry flying, martial arts and a tug-of-war competition..

The Colony will visit Moors Valley Country Park on 22^{nd} June and the Cub leaders are hoping to arrange a Pack Camp near Reading in July/August in a Scout Headquarters not far from 'Douglas Bader country'. The Scouts section are going to Buddens in Dorset for summer camp. The annual meeting for parents will be held on 1^{st} July at 6.30 p.m. in Base 2000.

Cycle Safety On The Road.

Cycling is a fun, convenient and healthy way to get around - but if you don't follow basic safety guidelines you could end up a statistic:

In 2004 over 3,500 young cyclists aged 11-16 were killed or injured in the UK. 90% occur in urban areas.

75% happen at, or near, a junction. 80% occur in daylight.

80% of cyclist casualties are male.

About one third of the cyclists killed or injured are children.

Around three quarters of cyclists killed due to major head injuries.

Before you go out on the roads, stop and THI NK! Here are a few basic safety tips that can help you stay out of trouble:

First and foremost, wear a helmet. Get trained and keep control. Be seen and heard. Check/maintain your bike regularly. Be alert and plan your route. Stay legal.

An experienced trainer can help you get the best from your bike and the road. They know the dangers and how best to avoid them. They can also help you become safer and more confident when cycling in traffic, what's the best gear to wear, and how to check and maintain your bike.

Useful contact points and further information:

Julie's Gardening Tips

All the forecasts are predicting a wet Summer. This doesn't mean we can just let the garden get on with it though, as too much water can do as much damage as too little. Some plants cope better with lack of water than others, but most will suffer if over watered. Make sure all your pots have holes in the bottom to allow the excess water to drain away to prevent this problem. If you are growing tomatoes outside, they need a consistent water supply to develop the fruits. Don't let them dry out between watering and rainfall or they will lose flavour and can have tough skins.

The sole purpose of all plants is to reproduce. Flowers then fruits or seed heads are what the plant has to make to do this. Once the seed heads and fruits are formed, they need to ripen off and then often the parent plant will die off. To keep your plants producing fruit and flowers for a longer season, pick them regularly. It only takes a couple of bean pods to swell and ripen for the plant to die off, but if you stop them from getting to that point, the plant will continue to produce while the conditions are right. Beans can be picked every other day and either cooked or frozen for future use, and the plant will merrily throw out more and more beans. Of course I am sure your family and friends wouldn't say 'no' to some fresh home-grown produce if you have a glut. Roses also benefit from dead-heading, and apart from preventing the mess of dropped petals, you may well find that they will have another flush of flowers later in the year, giving you value for money!

The same applies to flowering bedding plants. If you snip off the dead heads it will encourage the plant to produce more. If we do happen to have a few days of persistent rain, check for mould at the base of the plant as it will spread rapidly in warm wet weather and completely rot the plant in a matter of days. If you do see mould developing, clear out any dead flowers and foliage and cut off the rotten bits as best you can. If necessary take the whole plant out and throw it in the dustbin. Sometimes we get carried away and plant bedding plants too close together. This encourages these moulds as under the leaf canopy is a mini greenhouse keeping the air damp and warm – just the right conditions for moulds. Planting them further apart allows air circulation and discourages mould and mildew.


Feed your plants once they start to flower. This includes flowering vegetables like tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers. They will produce more fruit and have a longer picking season.

Weeds are the biggest bane of any gardeners' life. While the conditions are right for the plants we want, they are also right for the plants we don't want. They will merrily reproduce at a rapid rate during the summer months. While they are tiny they have tiny root systems, making it easier to pull them out. If the soil is damp, that will also help. Once a week put some time aside

to keep control of them and pull them out. Throw them in the compost bin to rot down. The only exceptions to this are creeping weeds like bindweed, which you should either burn or throw in the dustbin. The roots of bindweed are very pale and crisp in texture. They form a mat just under the surface of the soil if given the opportunity, and the smallest piece left in the soil will re-grow, so it needs to be carefully removed and disposed of. Bindweed, if left unchecked, will strangle plants above the ground, and starve them from under ground.

ARE YOU CONCERNED ABOUT YOUR NHS CARE?

Have you heard about ICAS - the Independent Complaints Advocacy Service?

ICAS has been commissioned by the Department of Health to provide confidential advocacy support service that is completely independent of the NHS. This service is open to anyone who wishes to make a complaint about aspects of his or her NHS care and treatment, whether from a GP, dentist, hospital or primary care trust, mental health/learning disability trust or ambulance service.

ICAS has been established to support patients, or relatives and carers on their behalf. It aims to ensure people have access to the support they need to articulate their concerns and navigate the complaints system, therefore maximizing the chances of their complaint being resolved quickly and effectively. The quality of health services should improve as a result.

ICAS is a client led service, delivering support ranging from the provision of a Self Help Pack, through to the assignment of an advocate who will work with the client focusing directly on helping with the complaints process.

ICAS cannot be involved in disciplinary matters or in any claim for compensation but we can signpost to relevant agencies.

On going works in Popley

'As you may be aware, Skanska McNicholas (working on behalf of Scottish and Southern Energy Power Distribution) is installing two 132,000 Volt electric cable circuits from Bramley to Basingstoke sub-stations. This cable scheme is essential in providing a secure, reliable electricity supply and in reinforcing the existing network to meet the increasing demand for electricity in the region.

During the course of the works, engineering difficulties have caused delays to the original programme and this has resulted in an apparent lack of activity in some areas, most notably in Popley. Skanska McNicholas and SSEPD would like to apologise to residents for any inconvenience this might have caused and to thank you for your patience. We would also like to reassure residents that work will begin again on the first cable circuit in Carpenters Down, Shetland Road and Popley Way by the end of June and is due for completion by the end of August. Work on the second cable circuit can then begin, with completion scheduled for November.

Again, we would like to thank residents for their patience and co-operation whilst these essential works are completed, and would assure you that all necessary measures will be taken to ensure the safety of the public with the minimum inconvenience.'


The new green area around Marnel Park is already

Check your deposit is safe before you move out, CAB urges private tenants Private tenants whose tenancies are coming to an end should act now to ensure their deposit is returned, Basingstoke Citizens Advice Bureau warned this week. The CAB is urging anyone who has given notice to their landlord, or who has been served

with a notice to guit, to check whether their deposit is protected before they move out, and to take action quickly if it is not. Since new laws on tenancy deposit protection came into force in April, all private landlords are required to protect tenants' deposits in a government-approved scheme that keeps the money safe. The schemes are backed up by a free, independent dispute resolution service to settle any arguments about whether the money should be returned at the end of a tenancy. Anyone who signed a tenancy agreement on or after April 6 should be covered by the scheme, and official figures show that one in four of all tenants living in privately rented houses and flats now have their deposit safeguarded – a total of 500,000 deposits in all. Landlords not protecting a deposit taken since April 6 are committing a civil offence which could make it harder for them to evict their tenants and lead to them having to pay tenants three times the value of the deposit. But if you find your deposit has not been protected you will need to take court action against them to get your money back.CAB staff said: "For years private tenants have had little or no protection if their landlord chose to keep all or part of their deposit at the end of a tenancy and we saw many people losing hundreds of pounds as a result. With the average deposit now running at £889, it is all the more important that the new deposit protection legislation is a success."That's why we are reminding people whose assured shorthold tenancies are coming to an end to check their deposit is protected. Once you've moved out it will be too late to benefit from the new law -you need to take action as soon as you give notice or receive notice to guit. If you find your deposit is not protected, get advice straight away on what you can do to get your money back. If your landlord is threatening you with notice to quit, check immediately that your deposit is protected. If it's not, get advice, as you may have a defence against eviction."
