



# MARVELLOUS MOSAIC UNVEILED AT BRAMLEY FIELDS, BASINGSTOKE

#### David Wilson Homes

CHILDREN from Everest Community College have unveiled a delightful piece of public art, created by themselves under the guidance of the internationally acclaimed artist Julieann Worrall Hood at Bramley Fields, a development by David Wilson Homes Southern at Marnel Park, in Popley, Basingstoke.

David Wilson Homes commissioned the project and hosted the recent unveiling ceremony which was attended by The Worshipful The Mayor of Basingstoke and Deane, Councillor George Hood and The Mayoress Davina Hood, Councillors, Julieann Worrall Hood, college staff, the children who worked on the project earlier in the year and who are now in year eight (aged 12 -13 years) and their parents.

Paul Crispin, managing director of David Wilson Homes Southern, said: "We wanted to celebrate the natural habitat at our development in Popley and commissioned 19 children at Everest Community College to produce a piece of art for The Plaza at Bramley Fields, close to the green public space. We asked them to work to a theme involving the great crested newt and, together with Julieann Worrall Hood, they have produced a marvellous mosaic. I would like to thank all those involved in this project and congratulate the children on a job very well done; I am sure the mosaic will be enjoyed by people for many years to come."

The art was produced as a mosaic in recognition of the area's Roman heritage, and marks the significance of the great crested newt in the local wood and wetland habitat where Popley Ponds provides an important breeding ground for this protected species. David Wilson Homes has ensured that the new residential development at Bramley Fields provides adequate protection for the newts, working closely with The Landmark Practice and Natural England. The housebuilder is also funding the long term maintenance of the newt habitat under a scheme managed by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council.

Julieann Worrall Hood (www.woho.co.uk), who is based in Pewsey, Wiltshire says: "The children completed a workshop where a series of exercises and games helped them to come up with ideas for a piece of public art. They worked with great dedication to produce a mosaic that shows two large newts and a series of newt footprints that suggest the newts are scampering across the Plaza area towards the green open space at the development. The children's work is most impressive and they should be very proud of themselves."

The mosaic has been constructed using matt ceramic tesserae, small square tiles, in colours of yellow ochre, green and black.

Sara Dodson, learning director for creative and performing arts at Everest Community College, says: "The children have found the mosaic project a very enriching and rewarding experience and relished the opportunity to work with Julieann. If these students opt to study GCSE art they could include mosaic work, as they now have a skill that otherwise they would not have been taught at the college. I would like to thank David Wilson Homes for giving them this wonderful opportunity."

# First neighbourhood agreement for residents launched

A new way of helping residents to get along in their communities has been launched by

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council this month (September).

The neighbourhood agreement has been set up by the Popley Community Wardens, David Mason and Vikky Lonie, to help iron out some issues with ball games being played in a variety of small grass areas.

Residents who have 'signed up' to the agreement have acknowledged that they need to get along by agreeing to work together to tackle some of the reasons for disputes, such as kicking footballs at the walls of houses, dropping litter and using offensive language.

The neighbourhood agreement is the first of its kind in the borough designed to approve residents' quality of life and it is hoped that if the scheme is proved successful it can be rolled out to other groups of residents struggling to get along.

Cabinet Member for Community Safety and Development Cllr Clive Sanders

said: "This is a great initiative and I hope it will see those affected residents live in harmony with one another.

"There is nothing worse that not being able to get along with neighbours, and often fairly innocent behaviour becomes a huge issue if neighbours aren't able to sort it out. But this agreement will only stick if the residents want it to and work at making it do so.

"This is the first agreement of its kind in the borough and I hope that if this is successful in Popley, we will be able to implement the concept in other areas where there are difficulties."

I reported this on Thursday late at night and by morning visits by Police, Community Wardens, Environment officers and the Gypsy Liason Officer for Hampshire County Council were made. The council usually give me regular updates and have responded quickly to any complaints. I am very disappointed Stagecoach did not extend the same courtsey. I received an email from a HCC Officer only a few days before Stagecoach decided to stop the number 5 one way for three weeks:- from 22<sup>nd</sup> September to October 12th. Passengers can get home on the number 5 but cannot get to the hospital. However the number 9 will get you home, but they only run around one every hour and a half.

We all know prices have risen massively in some cases by 40%. But some users paying by monthly direct debit have seen the amounts deducted from their bank accounts increase by up to 100%.

When I got my latest bills through I found I was £211.29 in credit for Electricity and £212.60 in credit for Gas. In both cases, I had been in credit for 6 months or more - yet the Utilities were continuing to take a combined £75 per month in direct debits from my bank account.

When I asked for an electricity bill refund from Southern Electric I was initially refused on the grounds that I did not have an up-to-the-minute meter reading

I asked to speak to the manager, saying that if I did not get this money back:

- 1 I would go public (as I am doing now)
- 2 I would stop the direct debit, switch to a new supplier, and start proceedings to recover the debt.


Reluctantly he agreed to a refund.

I'd be interested to hear from any Popley residents who have had any similar experiences either being overcharged so their accounts are in credit or who are facing huge rises.

I've written off to Hilary Benn, Secretary of State for Defra, and tabled a Contemporary Issues Motion at the Labour Party Conference asking that the Government introduce caps to fuel price rises as they do in France and with rail fares in the UK.

We are suffering from rampant free market conditions and our most vulnerable consumers need protection.



Each year 20 people are killed and over 250 injured in blanket fires.

Faulty blankets cause more than 1,000 house fires a year.

Research has shown that electric blankets ten years old (or older) still in use in homes in Britain are responsible for 99% of the fires caused by electric blankets.

#### YOU SHOULD CHECK OR REPLACE THE BLANKET IF:

It displays the old BEAB\* safety mark - a round symbol. The new sign is white capital letters on a black background).

The fabric is worn or frayed.

Remember, older blankets are much more likely to have one or more of these faults.

There are scorch marks anywhere.

The tie tapes (where originally fitted) are damaged or missing.

The flex is worn or damaged.

Any connections are loose.

You are in any doubt.

#### BEFORE USING THE BLANKET:

Always read and follow the instructions carefully.

Older under-blankets, designed only for pre-heating, must be switched off and disconnected before getting into bed.

Never use an under-blanket as an over-blanket.

Make sure the under-blanket is kept flat. Tie it to the mattress where appropriate.

Never use the blanket if it is wet or creased.

Never switch it on to dry it out

### **Julie Gardening Tips**

After all this horrible weather, I doubt many of us have been able to spend much time in the garden this summer. Those that have grown beans and tomatoes may have had pretty good crops though. If you still have some tomatoes struggling to ripen, put banana skins on the soil near the plants, or pick the fruit and make chutney rather than waste it. Beans will be coming to an end now, but you can still get a few more pickings if you do it regularly. If there really isn't enough for a meal, keep collecting them and freeze what you pick. There is nothing nicer than home grown vegetables for Christmas dinner.

Most of the summer bedding plants will still have a little life left, just keep picking the dead flower heads off and trim back any dying stems to keep them going for as long as possible. If you want to make up winter baskets or pots, now is the time to start looking for plants for them. Pansies are a popular choice, and will flower even over the frosty winter. Spring bulbs are already in the shops, so look out for bargains there. The local Pound Shop sells bulbs which although not fancy varieties, will certainly fill a blank spot and give a splash of colour in the new year. Daffodils are sometimes sold in net bags which can be either same or mixed varieties, and will often prove better value than buying smaller amounts. If you like bowls of bulbs indoors over Christmas, the popular Paperwhite variety is an easy one to grow. The bulbs are available now, but hold on to them for a while before planting them. They only take around 6 to 8 weeks to flower from planting, so if you do it too soon, they will have already finished by Christmas. Prepared hyacinth bulbs can be planted in special vases which children love to watch grow, so they are always worth giving a go. And, of course the perfume indoors is lovely!


If you have any bald patches in the lawn, sow fresh seed there now to allow it to get a good root system before the bad weather sets in. Trim back the straying edges to keep the lawn tidy, and if you need to, use a feed and weed preparation to kill off weeds like dandelions and clover while feeding the grass. If it stays dry enough to cut the lawn, raise the blade on the mower to leave the grass slightly longer than during the summer. The growth of the grass will start slowing up now and will need cutting less often as autumn progresses.

The warm wet summer has brought the slugs out in force. Dispose of them as soon as you see them before they bury down in the soil to over-winter. Keep on top of them now to give you a lower population next year. Check roses and other plants likely to be infested with greenfly or black-fly. They suck the sap of the plant and can cause enough damage to kill smaller plants, or

weaken larger ones. Treat them with an appropriate insecticide or pick off the affected stems, disposing of them carefully.

I got my new seed catalogue this week, so I can start planning for next years plants soon. Take advantage of any special offers to try new things. Some seed catalogues have free offers which are well worth looking at, including trial varieties and multi-packs.

In the mean time, keep the garden as tidy as you can, picking out dead bedding plants, trimming back overgrown climbers and hedging. If you can, leave the last lot of seed heads on your plants to attract resident birds to the garden later. If you don't have much in the way of flowers to look at, you will have wildlife!

BCAB can advise on contacting a housing association, if relevant, or your legal rights if the matter is to do with your property. After a full interview with one of our trained advisors, if necessary, we can offer a free one-off appointment with a local solicitor. These appointments are always solely for advice; should action be required, this would be a private arrangement between the client and the solicitor.

We are obliged to perform a conflict of interest check to ensure that we are not advising both parties in a conflict. BCAB's services are fully confidential and free. The bureau offers a face-to-face and phone drop-in service Monday – Saturday, as well as appointments in person and on the phone. We do hope we can be of help.

# DONT FOOL AROUND & NEVER THROW FIREWORKS ONTO A BONFIRE!!

Always follow all instructions and always put safety first.

Always store your fireworks safely: in a closed box & out of reach of children.

Always keep children well away from fireworks, and never let a child handle or light one. Even sparklers can be dangerous if unsupervised!

#### Tips:

- \* Have a full bucket of water han<mark>dy for any eme</mark>rgency & for putting used sparklers in.
- \* At the end of you<mark>r display, douse any 'dud' fireworks with wat</mark>er, then completely bury them in the ground. Alternatively, ask your Fire Brigade for advice as soon as possible.



#### SHERBORNE ST. JOHN PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish of Sherborne St. John had two wards at the spring elections. These are the SSJ village ward and the Speckled Wood Road ward - which now includes much of the new Marnel Park and Merton Rise developments. The PC are keen to ensure we cover our responsibilities to all areas of the parish and are inviting a local representative for the Speckled Wood ward to be co-opted to the council to better represent these locations. We are already interviewing candidates so if you would like to apply please contact Clover, our Parish Clerk.

The Hampshire County Council's A340 traffic calming project proceeds slowly but at last the new gateway feature has been installed to the south of West End. There is an intention to move the 30mph limit sign back to this gateway once the various protracted legal processes for this change are implemented. A replacement traffic island (near the bus stop) is planned for the turn of the year and we are pressing for a new BDBC scheme to install and maintain Speed Indication Devices (SIDs), with one sited at this location.

A survey by the PC has listed numerous unnecessary and misaligned road signs in our village and we are asking for their removal/adjustment. Requests for highway mirrors to be installed, to aid visibility for emerging vehicles, at the junction of Cranes Road and Manor Road and also in the village square have not been fruitful. HCC will not install mirrors as a matter of policy.

A number of residents attended the last PC meeting to advise that thoughtless parking is becoming a serious problem for the elderly and disabled in our village. In particular Vidlers Farm has seen parking in front of garages preventing access and parking over dropped kerbs causing problems for those in wheelchairs. Cars parked in turning points at Dancers Meadows prevent others turning cars safely and some parts of Spring Close are at times blocked with cars. Please consider your neighbours, the elderly and disabled and park vehicles thoughtfully....

...and whilst on the subject of good neighbourliness, BDBC have advised us that they will take action against those who persist in leaving rubbish bins on pavements on days after the bin collection day. This is unsightly, dangerous and obstructs the safe passage of pedestrians — we have been warned!

In recent years we have received a number of complaints regarding the length of grass in the open cemetery and with a wet summer this year's maintenance costs have soared due to difficulties of cutting and strimming. The PC have been picking up all the costs of maintenance for many years but have now established that maintenance is legally the Parochial Church Council's responsibility. We will be seeking a meeting with the PCC in September to sort out an equitable arrangement.

...and finally a victory for the common people. On the first day of August BT decided to erect a telegraph pole on the island opposite our post office. The contractor carrying out the work advised this was to avoid buses bringing down the low hanging communications line to the Post Office. Despite erecting this massive post in a conservation area and on a locally valued and distinctive feature in our village it transpired that BT had not sought the necessary approvals! With the help of George Young MP, Councillor John Leek and Georgio in BDBC Planning Control I learned yesterday that BT will be removing the telegraph pole.

#### Volunteering at the Melrose Community Hall

I volunteer to do gardening at the Melrose Community hall. The Hall is used for many different functions and is a central point for the community. I am part of the team working towards the re-development of the flower beds and the gardens circling the outskirts of the hall.

At first I wasn't sure whether I was doing everything right but at the end of my first day I could see how my digging would create space for flowers to be planted. Richard King, a community re-contribution gardener opens up the hall when I arrive and I get out which tools I need to do the jobs I want to do. 'Andrew's commitment to every task he does is amazing, he's so focused and really enjoys digging up weeds & bushes because he likes the jobs that really challenge him'.





I usually split the time I spend gardening by doing two or more different things. Sometimes I'll do a bit of litter picking first or weeding and then start digging up bigger unwanted weeds. I like to work hard and really put all my effort in to the digging, I want to make sure I am tired afterwards so I get a good night sleep!





Volunteering at the Melrose community hall is a lot of fun because Richard King gives us a goal for each time we're there. We get a tea break too!





At first I had to get lifts in a car to my placement but now I've worked out which buses to get to and from there and which bus stops to go to. 'Every week Andrew seems to get stuck in more and more and now we can all see the progress he's making and the gardens at Melrose hall, its great'.

I help clear up afterwards by dumping all the weeds and rubbish in a place where it can be collected. I make sure all my tools aren't too muddy and they are put back in the right place! Volunteering here is something I look forward to every week.
