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

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

## Julie's Gardening Tips

What a change we have seen in the weather this month! A few short weeks ago we were snowed in, and now we are wandering around in t-shirts. It's not wise to get too excited though as there are likely to be a few frosty nights yet.

Don't be tempted to buy outdoor plants unless you are prepared to bring them in on colder nights. You could spend a lot of money to find them destroyed by frost. Hanging baskets could be hung in a shed at night as long as you remember to put them back out during the day. If you can't hang them up indoors, stand them on the top of large pots indoors instead. If you don't plant to low down the sides they will be fine. Better still if you can bear to wait another month. During my wanders in town I have picked up some fruit bushes for my new garden very cheaply. I don't want to advertise, but they only cost me a pound each. Give it a couple of years and they should be providing me with enough soft fruit to see me through the year. Flowering shrubs are also available now. They may take a couple of years to give you a good show, but it is much more fun buying smaller plants and watching them grow than spending a small fortune on larger plants from garden centres.

The DIY stores often sell large bags and bales of compost which are pretty good value for money when you are filling loads of pots. If you can't carry that amount, there are special light weight alternatives, but expect to pay lots more for it.

As my house move gets closer I am starting to get quite excited. I have taken down my greenhouse ready to go, and managed it without breaking any glass. It would have been nice to have been using it properly this year, but no doubt I will find things to fill it with once it is rebuilt in the new garden. I am glad I have most of my plants in pots and will be able to take them with me, especially when I actually got a fig on one of my trees last autumn. Maybe the Popley climate will suit my olive trees better too. I did get lots of flowers last year, but no fruit. Ever thought about saving the seed from fruits you buy in the supermarket? Kids can have some fun with apple and orange pips, but even kiwi seeds will grow, so experiment a little. I have saved the seeds from some berry tomatoes I bought a few months back. They were about the size of currants and quite tasty too. I am hoping to get some seed in soon to see how they do. I will let you know.

Lots of you will have water metres these days. It can be very expensive using tap water on the garden, so think about investing in a water butt to collect rainwater from your gutters. You can cheaply buy a kit that connects to the down pipe and redirects the water into the butt. We should all be composting too, and although it might be easier to just throw the vegetable peelings into the wheelie bin, think about the satisfaction you would get if you used your own compost on the garden. There are various ways to compost garden and kitchen waste, so do ask at garden centres or find out more in the library. You can compost shredded paper too, making good use of those bank statements that you don't like to throw in the bin.

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
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*Councillors Page:* Many residents and readers will have noticed the new path in Abbey Road. It has been financed by developers' money and as part of the safer journey to schools. The aim is to get in readiness for when the new park is built. The first phase will start later this year. It is also designed as a measure to help stop the car sales on the corner of the road as it will be highway and breaking the law to drive over the verge. Parked cars there affected sight lines not only for traffic but pedestrians too.

The Surestart Centre "Pebbles" has its official opening on Thursday 9th April with lots to do from 9-30am till 1pm, with loads of activities, as a member on the board, I will be there as usual and hope to meet lots of you. There will be a visit and opening by the MP Marie Miller. I have received some plenary plans for a 60 bed Care Home to be built in Marnel Park. It is at the very first stages at the moment, I will keep you posted. We need less flats and more buildings like this where appropriate.

Popley Safer Neighbourhood Team had an open forum for residents on 27th March at Popley Fields and the committee will then meet on 1st April to determine from the residents and professionals at the top three priorities for the next three months. There will be a report and update next month.

## **Facing Redundancy?**

As the economic downturn begins to bite, more and more people are facing the threat of redundancy. If this is affecting you, read on for more info.

Redundancies happen when an employer reduces the workforce. An employer can make an employee redundant if there are changing circumstances in the business such as;

- The work the employee did is no longer needed because the business has stopped operating or is failing,
- The employee's skills are no longer needed,
- The employer has moved the business to another area or the business is taken over.

When an employer is choosing who to make redundant they must make the decision in a fair way. If you have been made redundant but you feel that you may have been dismissed for reasons other than those outlined above, please seek advice either from your union representative or the CAB.

There are rules that your employer must follow when making an employee redundant. The employer must send a written statement, telling you why you are being made redundant, hold a meeting with you to discuss the matter and then hold an appeal meeting if you appeal against the redundancy. Before an employer can change your working hours, patterns of attendance, your pay or other terms and conditions of employment they must have first consulted with you or your union and have reached an agreement.

## **Redundancy Pay**

If you have worked for your employer for at least two years you should receive statutory redundancy pay. The amount of redundancy pay you receive will be based on the length of time you have worked for your employer, your age and your weekly pay. You should check your own contract of employment as this may state that you are entitled to more.

## **Entitled to Benefits?**

If you have been made redundant there are benefits you might be able to claim whilst you aren't working.

- Job Seekers allowance (JSA) - if you are looking for a new job
- Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) – if you are too sick or disabled to work
- Income Support (IS) - if you are a single parent with a child under 12, or a carer
- Housing Benefit- to help you pay your rent
- Council Tax Benefit – to help you pay your Council Tax

Even if you are working but are on a low income there may be benefits that you are entitled to, for example, Working Tax Credit, Child Tax credit, even Council Tax and Housing Benefit. To claim any of these benefits phone your local benefits office or go online to [www.direct.gov.uk](http://www.direct.gov.uk)

In workshops, led by Andy Channing, Hampshire's gamelan expert, students learn how to play several parts, ranging from very simple to fast and complicated. Students from other schools, including local primaries have also visited the College to take part in workshops. In the Indonesian tradition the gamelan is believed to have supernatural power with the instruments being guided by spirits. The music is gentle, repetitive and mesmerising. Gamelans are found in palaces, temples and theatres in Bali where the music is used to accompany ceremonies, dances and puppet shows.

## Diaries from The Old Codger



I was asked not long ago about some of the sayings we use in modern day life. Some have gone, but people still wonder where they come from, so apart from going onto websites to find out I will tell just one or two of my favourites. One very gruesome one was Sweet Fanny Adams. This was a young girl born, not far from Basingstoke, in Alton that was murdered and cut up by Fredrick Baker when she was just 8 years old back in 1867. It was so gruesome that the news spread across the country like wild fire. Later they even had a monument for her grave donated by the public. She was known to be such a sweet person and there was no reason for her terrible murder. It came into all sorts of other parts of our language Sailors would say Sweet Fanny Adams over not getting enough meat. By this they meant the poor girl had been cut up so bad there was very little left. Many in the East End of London used it not only as affection but also for a gofer woman, i.e. Fanny Adams get this or that, where is Fanny Adams, then in a loving way it was again turned round to regard a person as sweet especially the woman, my Sweet Fanny Adams. People also used the word for their dogs and other pets, by saying, come on Fanny Adams. It was reported that the police said this as they collected the many bits of her. In the East End it is a language in itself, and people can find it hard to know why they have sayings and Cockney slang as they say. With Cockney slang, especially if you really get going in front of some one that has not got a clue what you say can be funny. But sayings that many of us know are things like the cold shoulder. It came about if someone called to see you and you did not like them. You got out the cold shoulder of mutton. If you liked them, it was hot. So there you have it, giving someone the cold shoulder. Another one you may know is "don't let the bed bugs bite". I can remember them as I expect a lot of you can from the East End as they would be in the wallpaper. My Nan would get the eiderdown off the beds every day hang them over the washing line and beat the living daylight out of them. Just think, this happened in my life time, it was just a normal day to us. You did not have a fitted kitchen, it was a scullery. The loo was at the bottom of the back garden, and boy was that a cold place in winter! The working mans pint was a pint of mild, as it was the cheapest to buy because it was the mix of the slops from all the other beers in the pub put into a barrel. 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# Sherborne St John Parish News

The Parish Council had pleasure in co-opting Jonathan Eales to the Parish Council. Jonathan lives in Specklewood Road and will be representing Merton Rise/Marnell Park and Speckled Wood Road.

**A Safer route to Everest Community College** from Sherborne St John has been on the agenda for sometime now. The PC has raised concerns with the Head Teacher regarding the limited access for children accessing ECC from the SSJ. According to Education Authority regulations catchment children can only receive free transport if they live 3 miles from the school and without any pavements to Popley the PC are concerned about safe access. The Head Teacher agreed to bring the matter up at the next meeting of the ECC Board of Governors at the end of March. We shall keep you posted on anymore information we receive on this pressing matter.

**Traffic calming on the A340** is progressing well. As we said in December's Issue the PC have agreed to purchase a Speed Indicator Device which will be on a rolling 4 week programme around the Village. It will be positioned on Elm Road, Vyne Road, Cranes Road and a North and a South bound point on the A340. The 30mph limit has also been extended back to the Gateway feature southbound which is excellent news.

A new **Notice Board** will soon be ready for the wall by Church Path to replace the current (very old) one. Please remember to include any notices you feel will be of benefit to the Village – for notices for the Village Hall there is a Notice Board with access to the right hand side, which shall soon have an easier board to pin up your notices as had been requested.

It was a pleasure to see so many join the **Open Forum** at the February meeting. The Telephone Box opposite the Post Office was brought to the discussion. The Parish Council confirmed that we shall be writing to English Heritage in support of the application for Temporary Building Preservation Notice becoming permanent. However, the PC still have concerns regarding cost implications of its maintenance and insurance if it does not become listed. Again we welcome all your comments on this matter.

The lack of **Bottle Banks** in the Village was also brought to the Forum. Last year we had to remove the bottle bank since the noise was breaking Environmental Health Regulations due to their proximity to residents. The Parish Council are very keen to bring glass recycling back to the Village and have been in consultation with BDBC regarding a quieter version. We are very hopeful that we will find a solution with regards to location and noise and shall keep you informed of our progress.

The PC and the Clerk receive many complaints regarding **Highways Issues**. The Clerk is always happy to report these on your behalf, but it really helps if individuals do it too, the more times it is reported the quicker it might get sorted! ## St. Michael's Hospice Launches New Service

St. Michael's Hospice (North Hampshire) is excited to announce the launch of their new Hospice at Home service which will be provided to the community of North Hampshire. In essence, the new Hospice at Home service will take the skills, ethos and nursing care associated with the Hospice into the home environment together with providing patients out-of-hour's access to palliative nursing care, support and advice.

Given the choice, many people prefer to be cared for in their own homes with everything that is familiar around them. St. Michael's Hospice at Home Nurses and Healthcare assistants will work with patients to ensure they receive the necessary emotional, psychological and nursing care to die at home, if that is their wish. The Hospice at Home service will be provided free of charge to support patients across North Hampshire and those people caring for them.

To run the Hospice at Home service St. Michael's has contracted four nurses, who along with a team of bank nurses provide planned day and night time care and support to patients. St. Michael's anticipate that from May 2009 two senior Hospice at Home nurses will also be running an out-of-hours palliative care nursing service. This out of hours palliative care nursing service will run from midnight until 8am and is the only nursing service available to patients with palliative care needs through the night and an on call basis. This service will ensure that patients and their carers can reach a Hospice at Home nurse at night as the need arises. The Hospice at Home nurses can then go out to patients to help them with relief of symptoms and alleviate anxiety of patients and their carers during the night time by providing a reassuring presence. This will help to reduce unwanted admissions to Hospital during the night when carers feel they may have no alternative but to call out an ambulance.

Back in 2001 St. Michael's Hospice was approached to take over the local Marie Curie service for provision of palliative care in patient's homes across the whole of North Hampshire. Hospice at Home has evolved from this Community Nursing Service which has been provided by St. Michael's Hospice over the last 8 years.

St. Michael's Hospice at Home has been developed in line with the NHS End of Life Strategy, released in July 2008 which is about providing choice to people about where they choose to live and die. A growing number of Hospices' across the country run Hospice at Home services although they are largely operated in different ways as each service is tailored for the local area.

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## Step Out and Support Your Local Hospice!

Last year St. Michael's Stepping Out event attracted 393 walkers and raised in excess of £12,000 for the Hospice. This year the event will be held on Sunday 19th April and the Hospice is hoping to welcome along even more local walkers to make the event even bigger than before!

So why not put on you walking boots, head along to Farleigh Wallop and enjoy the beautiful countryside of the private Lord Portsmouth Estate, with stunning views of rolling fields and bluebells. Walkers start/finish at Home Farm on the Lord Portsmouth Estate, Farleigh Wallop, Basingstoke and set-off between 9.30am and 11.30am. Participants can choose which of the 5, 8 and 12 mile routes they would like to follow. Whichever route people choose to walk they can be promised a mixture of fantastic trails, beautiful scenery and enthusiastic support from St. Michael's staff and dedicated volunteers.

The walk is open to people of all ages and dogs on leads are very welcome too, however unfortunately the route isn't suitable for pushchairs. To register for Stepping Out it costs £4 per child and £8 per adult. ## Hoax Calls - They cost lives!

### **FACT:**

Every day the Hampshire Fire & Rescue Service control room receives calls to incidents that do not exist - these are HOAX calls. .

Hoax calls commit fire crews to incidents that do not exist. This places genuine callers lives in danger, as the number of fire engines available in the county is reduced whilst crews are investigating these hoax calls.

In a fire situation seconds can cost lives. Hoax calls also puts the responding firefighters at risk whilst travelling to these incidents.

### **YOU HAVE BEEN WARNED!**

Fire Control Staff have immediate access to the number of the phone used to make all emergency calls. All calls are digitally tape-recorded. In the case of hoax calls these details can be passed to the Police for prosecution.

Should multiple hoax calls be received from mobiles, HFRS Control staff will contact the network provider and get the mobile cut off so that it will not be able to make any more calls.

In the past year Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service has issued numerous warnings and had many phones disconnected.


