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

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Fire Service Restoration at Popley Fields
Community Centre

After a hugely successful five year pilot scheme in Basingstoke, Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service is set to build on the success of its temporary fire station at the Popley Community Centre.

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service took the decision in 2005 to run a pilot scheme which would see the Service operate a temporary fire station from the Popley Community Centre in Basingstoke. The pilot proved so popular that the temporary station remained in place for the following three years.

However all good things must come to an end and as a result of the works undertaken by fire service staff the number of incidents in this particular area of the Basingstoke and Deane area has decreased significantly. There is also a greater level of fire, road, and community safety awareness - as well as more properties fitted with smoke alarms than ever before!

Group Manager Dave Norgate of Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service said: "The pilot scheme has been a great success and we wish to thank everyone who has assisted us, in particular the staff of the Community Centre who have been most accommodating. Our final vehicle movement to Popley will be on Friday 12th February after which a period of restoration is required to return the site to its original condition.

However the Fire Service have been in discussion with the PFCC management and some of the original changes made to accommodate our staff will be retained on site as they benefit the Centre. Such facilities as the outside toilets, storage units and other ancillary items will be retained by PFCC to be used in the day to day running of the Community Centre. Other restoration works will follow once the actual portacabin unit has been removed but all works will be completed by the end of March.

Group Manager Norgate added: "We want to take what we have learned from Popley Fields and use this knowledge in other areas. We will still have a visible presence in the Popley area and of course, the Fire and Rescue service is only ever a phone call away. Residents will still see us carrying out Home Safety visits in the area, working in partnership with Forestry Commission wardens, and undertaking life-saving arson reduction activities in the community."

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

Councillors Page: The last review of a severe weather policy was in 2004, Hampshire, and in particular Basingstoke, has changed and grown with many new developments and roadworks. I will be demanding that a full and thorough review is done with Basingstoke getting a lot more of the attention it deserves.

There will be a large amount of damage to our roads with the bad weather creating many more potholes. If you see any then please contact me as I am compiling a list to present to Hampshire County Council.

There have been many complaints to me about poor and inappropriate parking all around the estate. One of the main problems is from parents and carers picking up the children from school, especially at St Bedes. Despite being asked by residents and school the problem is getting worse. I objected to the planning application on the lack of provision of a drop off zone, a solution needs to be found. Rev. Arthur Botham was kind enough to extend the use of St Gabriel's car park to be used, as long as they don't walk through the hedge. Popley West: As I write my report I remember the conditions in the bad snow conditions were treacherous. There just were and are not enough grit bins. Earlier this year we asked for more grit bins at full Council. We were told not to be ridiculous and waste the administrations time. Well I don't know about you but a lot of people's time was wasted. Lots of very vulnerable people were trapped indoors and dared not go out with all the icy surfaces. There was however some wonderful community spirit and people out there working to help others. There was some good advice and some that was wrong, for instance to use cat litter to clear the snow and ice. Although it does melt the snow it is based in clay and the water is soaked up then it goes slushy, it leaves a stain on your carpets that is almost impossible to move, and it can rot them too. Advice is now not to use it. The repairs to pathways in Tintern, Buckfast, Romsey, Fountains and Glastonbury will be done over the next financial year. I will be pushing for all the pathways to be repaired in a rolling programme. The environmental improvements from 1 to 213 Abbey including creating 7 more formal parking places there will also be completed this year.

Popley East: I hope all you readers had a good Christmas and a Happy New Year. It's the first Christmas I can remember in Basingstoke with snow on the ground. The bookies may define a "White Christmas" as one where snow is falling but to me if there's snow already on the ground that's good enough. What was not good enough was the farcical response by both Borough and County councils to the snow on Dec 21, when 2,000 cars were abandoned in Basingstoke. A lot of excuses in the press about how they did all they could, but the simple truth is they were caught out, with a woeful deficiency of planning. It's a miracle nobody died that night. In contrast, the people who helped out were real heroes, with many shelters set up on the spur of the moment. While HCC was blowing its own trumpet about the 5 centres it set up in the Basingstoke/Alton area, I'd like to pay tribute to those who put people up overnight in the hospital, the Apollo Hotel, Morrison's, and a long list of other places. Then on Jan 6 we had our worst snow since 1963. Thankfully it fell overnight and most people stayed at home, with memories still fresh about taking hours to get home two weeks earlier. If we had lost power across the town, a lot of people would have had no heat as central heating needs electricity to work, and some would not have access to hot food either - we could have had a major crisis on our hands. Cold winters appear to be getting more frequent. We were caught out in Feb 09 as well and no lessons appear to have been learned from then. 
Children's Soccer Academy

Concerned about paying your Fuel Bills?

Citizens Advice has the following top tips for people struggling with, or worried about fuel payments.

1 You might be able to reduce your costs by changing fuel supplier.

Shop around for the best deal and compare by telephoning suppliers in

your area or using one of the approved online comparison services (listed on www.consumerfocus.org.uk) Ask about different tariffs and ways to pay, and make sure prices quoted include VAT. If you do decide to switch suppliers contact the new supplier and they will take responsibility for organising the switch. The whole process can take up to 6-8 weeks, during which time your gas or electricity will continue to be supplied by your old supplier. You should take a meter reading in the day you change supplier.

2 Even without changing supplier you could save money.

Speak to your existing supplier and check that you are on the best tariff for you. You may be eligible for what is called a 'social tariff' which offers cheaper prices to low-income or vulnerable customers, such as older people, or people with long-term ill health. Check if you can reduce costs by using a different method of payment e.g. Direct Debit, card, key or token meter. For more information, contact your fuel supplier.

3 You may be able to take advantage of one of the various energy efficiency schemes and grants that are available, such as the Warm Front scheme.

There are various energy efficiency schemes and grants that are available. The main scheme in England is a home energy efficiency scheme known as Warm Front. The scheme is government funded and provides energy advice and grants to help with the costs of home insulation. It also helps to improve energy efficiency for certain groups of people including those on low incomes. The scheme covers both owner-occupiers and people renting accommodation. In some cases, the maximum grant available does not cover the full cost of the work and you have to pay something towards the costs. You can get more information about the Warm Front and details about how to apply by going to the Warm Front website at: www.warmfront.co.uk, or by calling eaga on freephone 0800 316 2805.

4 If you're on a low income you might be entitled to extra help during the cold weather.

You might be able to get a cold weather payment for every week of very cold weather in your area. It doesn't matter what you spend the money on, and you don't have to pay it back.

This year, the Cold Weather Payment is £25 for each period of cold weather.

To get a Cold Weather Payment you have to be receiving certain benefits. If you are and the weather is cold enough in your area you will automatically receive a cold weather payment. You don't have to apply for the payment.

If you think you should get a Cold Weather Payment but you are not paid, you should contact your pension centre or Jobcentre Plus. You can also find out more about Cold Weather Payments and check whether a payment is due for your area on the Directgov website at: www.direct.gov.uk.

5 If you are 60 or over, you can get a Winter Fuel Payment to help with your fuel costs.

The Winter Fuel Payment is a tax-free payment paid every year over the winter months. For the winter of 2009/10 the Winter Fuel Payment is £250 per household (£400 where you or your partner are aged 80 or over). Most people who are entitled to a Winter Fuel Payment do not need to make a claim. You will automatically get a payment if you get Retirement Pension, Pension Credit, or one of a number of other benefits in the qualifying week.

The children have shown a great interest in building and construction so we have built our topic word around that. The children have spent a lot of time

Helping our clients to achieve

'Good fences make good neighbours?'

If this title of one of Robert Frost's best known poems does not quite ring true, you may be one of those people heading for a boundary dispute. Property ownership is an emotive subject and what starts as a minor disagreement can quickly escalate into a full-scale boundary battle that can spiral out of control, resulting in astronomical court costs and acrimony that can ruin your home life. A boundary can change over time for many reasons: a diverted water course, or a wooden fence that moves slightly every time it is replaced. So how can you be sure where your boundary is and what should you do if your relationship with your neighbour is rapidly going downhill?

Call the experts

Your first move should be to ask a boundary expert, such as a chartered surveyor, to work on your behalf and advise you on whether or not you have a case. For example the red line drawn around a property on your Land Registry plan only shows the general boundary, it does not identify whether the boundary runs along the centre of a hedge or along one side of it.

They will look at the problem, prepare any technical data that may help solve the dispute at an early stage and, if necessary, work with your solicitor to provide a court with the appropriate advice and information needed to make a judgement.

It's much better if you can settle the matter before going to court, but if you can't, the court will define a boundary line and write out an order. This means that the boundary line is then set in stone and you can if you wish ask the chartered land surveyor to supervise any fencing or building contractors to make sure there are no further arguments. You should also ensure that they prepare a new plan, to the required specification, showing the agreed boundary line for submission to the Land Registry.

But there is another way

The best way to avoid going to court is to ask your solicitor to help you with alternative dispute resolution, such as mediation – this works by getting both parties together, resolving the dispute and defusing allegations concerning one another's conduct, which can often get out of all proportion. So if you feel the temperatures rising, don't take an entrenched position, take some good legal advice. Howard Gardener, senior partner and civil mediator at Phillips says "The financial value of the boundary often bears no relation to the importance of the dispute to the client but good advice and, even better, a good mediation can result in both parties ending up as good neighbours and saving the costs of going to court".

I would like to take this opportunity to make you aware of the Popley Safer Neighbourhoods Panel (PSNP) and the work we do in the community. The Popley Safer Neighbourhoods Panel is a group of individuals from all backgrounds and working environments set up to help you the residents of Popley decide on three issues the team can work towards over a quarterly period. The panel includes Popley residents, local businesses, local Headteachers, local Councillors and Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators. The team also includes various agencies dedicated to assisting us with the Panel. These agencies include the local Police team, CSPO (Community Safety Patrol Officers), Housing Association representatives and local council representatives. Each quarter the Panel meet at one of Popleys Community Centres in order to discuss proposed issues from residents and vote on 3 new priorities which will be worked on by all members. For example if "Anti-Social Behaviour on a certain road" was voted for by PSNP members then all of the team would discuss ways at which these issues could be prevented and stopped.

The Popley Safer Neighbourhoods Panel (PSNP) relies heavily on our residents input whether this is by residents informing the local Police team of issues or concerns in the area, or by residents sitting on our panel and discussing these issues and assisting the team with voting. The Popley Safer Neighbourhoods Panel are currently seeking new community members to join our Panel. Joining the Panel is a great opportunity for community members to get their point across to other organisations and make their voice count. You could be responsible for identifying a problem in the area and work with the other members of the team in order to solve this. When did you last visit the Willis?

Located in the former Basingstoke Town Hall, the listed building dating back to 1832 on the north side of the Market Square, the Willis Museum is one reason why our town is a place to be proud of.

If you haven't been there recently you have yet to see the results of the extensive make-over carried out in 2009. You really must see the new Sainsbury Gallery on the ground floor. Here the Willis is able to show high quality touring exhibitions that only selected museums are allowed to take; *China; Journey to the East*, from the British Museum, no less, that finished on December 24 was a real coup for Basingstoke, but the next major touring exhibition (from January 23 to March 20) promises to be equally exciting: *Celebrity – Up Close and Personal* will feature personal belongings once owned by famous show-biz personalities including one of Marilyn Monroe's dresses, Fred Astaire's shoes, and Chuck Berry's guitar. Then comes a celebration of 60 years of holograms from April 3 to June 9.

After you have seen these exhibitions, how about stepping through to the *Mayor's Parlour*, the Willis's new coffee shop for a cup of tea or coffee and a slice of delicious home made cake? There are interesting local things on sale there too.

Part of the first floor has had a make-over too. It has become the Community Gallery where local societies or individuals now put on exhibitions that change monthly. 2010 begins with *Stitched Inspirations*, an exhibition of textile interpretations of the Willis Museum Collection, and the Basingstoke scene, by the Basingstoke Embroiders' Guild (January 9 to February 6). This is followed by *Eclectic*, expressive works by local artist Peter Davis, inspired by isolated seascapes and bustling cityscapes (13 February to 13 March), and *Made to Fit*, a celebration of International Women's Day by local organisation *Women's Work* (March 20 to April 17).

There is much more to see on the first floor in the *Time Tunnel*, the Willis's imaginative permanent exhibition of the town's history.

Go up another floor and you will come to where the *Archaeology Gallery*, formerly on the first floor, is to be re-displayed from March. This is also where the Friends of the Willis Museum hold their monthly meetings. This body was formed in 1978 "with the object of promoting, supporting, assisting and improving the Willis Museum". The meetings, held on the third Thursday evening of the month, starting at 7.30pm (except in August), are very friendly get-togethers where a talk is given about practically anything of historical or local interest. Anyone can go to one of these talks for a small fee payable on entry, but if you enjoy good company and learn more about the world about you in an entertaining way, and like to play your part in making Basingstoke "a place to be proud of", we think you will want to join the Friends for free admission and discounts in the museum shop.

‘Legal Corner’



Question

I've been snowed in and couldn't get to work – what are my rights in regard to taking time off and my pay?

Answer

Kelly-Jean Rayner, employment solicitor at Phillips Solicitors, replies:

There is no 'cut and dried' answer to this as there is no standard policy or position in respect of people's inability to get to work in adverse weather conditions. There is no legal provision which obliges your employer to pay you if you are unable to get to work, although many employers do exercise some discretion to do so in these circumstances. There are many different reasons why people can't get to work in adverse weather. Some employees live far away and may be subject to impassable roads or public transport failures; others may live nearby but have a physical condition which precludes them from walking in snowy or icy conditions; others may have childcare responsibilities when schools are closed or be carers for an elderly or vulnerable adult. Your legal rights will differ depending on your individual circumstances.

There are legal provisions which allow time off for parents to care for children or carers time off to care for dependants which would be required by many employees in bad weather. These are however rights to unpaid leave only. What is also clear is that employers cannot and should not force someone to come to work if they are concerned about their health and safety, or discipline or dismiss someone if they are not able to get to work due to the weather conditions or personal circumstances caused by the weather (unless of course they are seen about town when they are supposed to be stuck at home!).

Employees need to know where they stand and employers need to consider how best to balance running a productive business against the difficulties encountered by their most valuable resource, their staff. There are no hard and fast rules as every business will have its own unique operating requirements. Some employers are giving options to staff to make the time up on returning to work or to work from home where feasible. Others are allowing employees the choice of taking the time off as paid annual leave, though this shouldn't be forced on employees. At the end of the day, any policy that is implemented by an employer should be tailored to fit their business and communicated clearly to employees so they know where they stand.
